(And he hasn't been faced with a great deal of material from you out there!) The editor apologizes. And if you'll send in the news, he promises to send out The Gazette; (Listings of pledges and initiations are current through October, 1976. They will be brought up to date in the next issue.

MEMBERSHIP UPDATE, COAST-TO-COAST

Rush For the fall period, up to December 1, 1976, there were 288 men pledged to Alpha Sigma Phi. For that same period a year ago, there were only 247.

For the fall period, up to December 1, 1976, there were 141 men initiated. For that same period a year ago, there were 164. With pledging up, however, it would follow that initiations will also increase.

THE CASE OF THE MISSING PAPERWORK

HEADQUARTERS PRACTICES WHAT IT PREACHES!

Service When you send a letter to Alpha Sigma Phi Headquarters, you're helping mankind!

The staff at Headquarters collects all cancelled postage stamps of all kinds that come in. These are turned over to Church World Service which sells them to a collector's company. The money is used to help people worldwide in poverty or disaster situations.

Holly Flahive heads up the collecting in the office. And she turns the stamps over to Executive Director Gary Anderson's grandmother who is active in Church World Service.

Holly has a suggestion to all Chapters:

Put a can or box at your mail drop area. Ask everyone to tear the stamps off their letters. All stamps - they don't have to be fancy or different. When the container gets full, send them to Holly.

Don't peel the stamp off the paper, says Holly. Cut or tear the corner of the envelope, leaving a good marfin around the stamp.

Holly suggests that you might talk all Fraternity houses, sorority houses and residence halls on your campus into helping. Perhaps a special little box placed at each that says: "Alpha Sigma Phi wants to stamp out cold, hunger, and pain." It's a very easy way to do a lot of good.

A MILESTONE FOR THE "OLD GAL" AND THE GREEKS!

A 200th anniversary is rare. But the American Fraternity System celebrated one in 1976. And the highlight of the year was a major conference last month in Williamsburg, Virginia.

Meeting there was the National Interfraternity Conference, the National Panhellenic Conference, the Professional Interfraternity Conference and the Professional Panhellenic Conference. For the first time, a cross section of the entire Greek system was in one place at one time!

And it was a proud day for Alpha Sigma Phi.

Because Ralph Burns, Executive Secretary Emeritus, was honored by the nation's Greek system when he was awarded the NIC's coveted gold medal-the Nobel prize of Greekdom. The medal recognizes outstanding service to youth and the Fraternity system.

Official delegate to the NIC was Grand Senior President George Lord. Alternate was Executive Director Gary Anderson.

Brother Burns was also on hand as an official member of the American Fraternity Bicentennial Commission. The blue ribbon panel has spent a year preparing a special study concerning the direction and future role of the American College Fraternity. Also a member of the Commission was past Grand Senior President George Trubow.

SOME "HOW-TO" HELP WITH ALUMNI

Alumni Two manuals have been published that detail how alumni can be organized in Alpha Sigma Phi. One concerns itself with the Chapter alumni association or corporation - how it should be organized, its role and responsibilities.

> WAKE FOREST - Beta Mu found a great place for a party - the local Schlitz brewery. Guests at the party were members of the Alpha Sig colonies at UNC-Charlotte and N. C. State, their dates and Little Sisters. A feature of the evening was a special roast of Beta Mu senior Randy Lee.

> PURDUE - Alpha Pi Chapter sponsored during the political campaigns, a series of dinner-discussion encounters of political candidates. Among those attending was Sen. Vance Hartke. The series attracted a lot of attention on campus and in the press.

> EASTERN MICHIGAN - Gamma Upsilon will once again see the presentation of the Stuart W. Anderson Scholarship to a Chapter member. The recipient is chosen by the Alumni Association. It is awarded based on service to the Chapter and individual scholarship. The scholarship is made possible by Brother Stuart Anderson who has also made possible several national awards for excellence in publication work.

> WASHINGTON - Burt Joseph of Mu Chapter reports that eight men of Mu traveled down to Psi late this fall for a Conclave. Somehow, between parties and a Washington-Oregon State game, there was time for constructive meetings. Social programs, extension, rush and alumni relations were the primary topics. A continuing exchange program is being discussed between the Chapters.

PENN STATE - Upsilon is on the move, reports Mark Richmond. Outstanding pledge classes that have The Chapters been really psyched is the reason, he says. A great turn-out at homecoming was exciting, too. "The return of alums helped redefine what Alpha Sigma Phi is all about. The presence of Ducky Yahn '23, was especially felt. His ideas and his spirit touched us all." Brother Richmond also reports that "... the house is becoming closer and starting to become more involved with both the school, the town and neighboring fraternities. Much credit must go to HSP Charlie Elliott."

> BOWLING GREEN - Gamma Zeta was led to its first football championship in six years, by Bill Dallas, president of the Chapter. Dallas is Southwestern back of the year, an all-state defensive back and the guy who accounted for 13 TD's in three playoff games for the "Old Gal." Gamma Zeta upset defending champion Sigma Chi, 26 - 13. Dallas is a scholar as well as a sportsman. He maintains a 3.8 average. He plans on attending law school.

> WESTMINSTER - Alpha Nu Chapter welcomed over 200 to its homecoming luncheon. Highlight of the day, according to Fred Rehm, HJP, was the presentation of the Alpha Nu award. It was presented for the first time this year. To Gary A. Anderson, Executive Director of Alpha Sigma Phi. The award is inscribed: "In recognition for those who have upheld the Brotherhood, held our ideals high and lived within the Sacred Halls of the Alpha Nu Chapter."

> ILLINOIS INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY - Alpha Xi reports improved scholarship performance . . . and the Chapter budgets for the scholarship chairman. The current money is going toward improvements in the Chapter library. The Chapter invited the families of all members to attend a special Christmas party and help decorate Alpha Xi's tree. The Mother's Club has decided to provide new pots and pans for the Chapter kitchen as its project this year.

> ATLANTIC CHRISTIAN - Gamma Lambda Chapter lost a special brother in an automobile accident. James Dendy had been very active in the Chapter and was HJP at the time of his death. The campus newspaper called Dendy "A good friend, a good man and a good Alpha Sig." The article stated: "...he squeezed more life and love into 20 years than most will experience in a hundred years."

> MISSOURI VALLEY - The news at Alpha Omicron includes the election of Brother Bob Guzman as student body president . . . the publication of the Chapter's newsletter for the first time in three years . . . the Chapter provided 35 miles of the 125 mile torch run, a traditional Missouri Valley homecoming event . . . over 250 attended the annual homecoming banquet for alumni and friends of the Chapter. The Alpha Sigma Phi "Tunnel of Terror" at Halloween raised money for the local teen club plus a mural for the children's room at the college library.

> RENSSELAER POLYTECHNIC INSTITUTE - Robert Jones, HJP, reports on something that all of us could give some thought to. "Due to the tragic dorm fire at Skidmore College last spring, more stringent fire safety measures are being taken. Beta Psi was recently inspected by local fire and building authorities. They found small discrepancies in most rooms, but said that overall, we looked better than the other houses. We had already ordered a smoke detection alarm system. And we're currently working toward making our houses fore fire-safe. All chapters should invite the local authorities to inspect. Their suggestions, if followed, may save a life or two some day."

FRATERNITIES IN THE COURTS

Fraternity presidents who fail to prevent illegal acts by their members may find themselves in court. An Ohio judge recently ruled that a fraternity president can be held responsible for criminal acts committed by their chapter members. The decision stems from a case in which fraternity men discharged fireworks illegally. None of the offenders could be identified, but the chapter president was convicted of criminal liability for the actions of his members. Lawyers indicate that in light of this ruling, responsibility for incidents of hazing, possession of narcotics or illegal use of alcohol by fraternity/sorority members may also be attributed to the president.

FILES - THEY'RE IMPORTANT!

Just ask any officer or committee chairman who has to take on a Chapter job with no background information. It's like having to re-invent the wheel. Keep good files. And that means more than just copies of correspondence and minutes. Add notes on experience — what worked and what didn't work. Lists of good suppliers. Suggestions on short-cuts or good approaches to any problem.

Every Chapter should have a good background file on every office, committee and activity. It'll pay off in better, more efficient operation.

ODDS AND ENDS

Theta, University of Michigan is using a theme this year in rush. It's "Scholarship and more."

Some secretaries have trouble taking minutes of Chapter meetings. Ever try recording them on tape and transcribing later? Same with officer meetings and Prudential Committee meetings.
