If you haven't filled out the questionnaire and provided the other information requested, do so right away. If you've misplaced the request, ask for another copy from headquarters.

A PLUS POINT IN TALKING WITH PROSPECTS

Research results recently released show that 75% of the members of fraternities graduate on schedule which is significantly higher than for non-Greeks (about 40%). The three-year study, under the direction of the Texas College of Arts and Industries, involved 60 national fraternities.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE SENIORS OF ALPHA SIGMA PHI

Congratulations! You're on the home stretch of your college career. As you move into your senior year, there are some thoughts we'd like to share with you. This is an important time in your life, and we want to see you make the most of it.

Perhaps foremost in your mind is getting a good job. You may already be well into the business of writing your resume, contacting employers and taking interviews. We wish you all possible luck in this concern. Be sure to mention in your resume your experience as a Chapter member. Being part of an organized, self-governing group is generally seen as a plus by an interviewer. If you've been an officer, make special mention of that. Leadership and success will stack a lot in your favor.

To help you with your job search, Alpha Sigma Phi has for the past two years been creating a program of career development and placement. Brother Al Sternbergh, director of the program, has prepared a good handbook on how to prepare for, and deal with, moving from college to employment. You can receive a free copy by writing to the Headquarters and requesting it. The handbook gives guidance on selecting your career interests, preparing your resume, being interviewed, and more that relates to getting that first job or moving up to something better. Also available free upon request is the booklet "So You're Looking for a Job?". This is a professionaly produced booklet that lets you practice some selfanalysis, so you'll know more about yourself before you start explaining yourself to job interviewers.

The other thoughts we'd like to share have to do with the impact you have on your Chapter during your last undergraduate year. Seniors carry a lot of weight in the eyes of the underclassmen. The attitude you display will be a model for them. By being active this year with offices, committees and other Chapter activities, you can set the standard that will keep your Chapter growing and developing.

There have been occasions at some Chapters when "Senior Slump" did real damage to morale and operations; so, we felt a word of encouragement would be in order.

Grand Council The A-S-P Corporation has new directors. They are GSP Rick Dexter, GJP Richard Gibbs and past GJP Alfred B. Wise . . . GSP Dexter attended a meeting of Tulane alumni and has been actively working to increase volunteer alumni involvement throughout the Fraternity. GC Peter Tourtellot continues to direct the expansion program of the Fraternity.

POINTERS ON PRODUCING A RUSH PUBLICATION — by Tyler Cox, Wake Forest

You may ask, "Why a rush booklet?" The purpose of a rush booklet is to introduce a rushee to the men of your chapter and their activities. Booklet form is good because it gives the rushee something to read that he can keep and show to others.

Another advantage is the fact that the "power of the printed word" is convincing. Also, with a miniature composite inside, a rushee can learn the names of Brothers he meets.

At Wake Forest we found that delivering a rush booklet helps to "break the ice" between the rushee and the Brother. In other words, it gives you a chance to stop by a rushee's room, to get to know him better, to answer his questions, etc.

You're probably wondering about cost. Since cost will vary from printer to printer, check around and get several estimates if possible. A fourteen page booklet that is not professionally typeset with pages $5\frac{1}{2} \times 8\frac{1}{2}$ in size should cost about \$150 for 300 copies. A little fancier booklet that is typeset with 20 pages, each $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ in size, should cost about \$350.

How do you construct a rush booklet? After you choose the number of pages you want, you need to write down what you want to say in the booklet. You should include a description of your social life, sports, traditions, history, service projects, and the like. You may want to include sections on academics, an open letter to rushees from the rush chairman, and a section on pledging and pledge education. The idea is to tell the reader in a few pages what it's like to be an Alpha Sig fraternity man. These are categories our chapter chose for our booklet — feel free to add or delete your own.

The next step is to illustrate what you've written. You'll need pictures. Pictures of parties, intramurals, dinners, the trip to the beach, car washes, beer blasts, your sweetheart, etc. Look through your scrapbook and find pictures of Alpha Sigs having fun. And if you can't find enough, try to "stage" some pictures for whatever you need. Glossy black and white pictures are best for reproduction, but color shots with good contrast can also be used.

When you have written your copy and have collected enough pictures, you lay out the booklet in a logical order of thinking. In other words, decide what goes on each page and in what sequence. Your printer should be able to help with this.

If you can afford typesetting, give the written copy to your printer. If not, type your copy on white paper, preferably on an IBM typewriter with a carbon ribbon. Show the printer where each picture goes and whether enlargement or reduction work will be necessary.

You may save some money if some of your Brothers offer to help the printer assemble, staple, package, etc. You have the manpower, so use it.

It should be stressed that a rush booklet alone is not a substitute for dedicated rush work on the part of every Brother in your chapter. But when added to a total rush effort, it should help you tremendously in getting quality pledges.


