## Valley Forge '78: charting the course for the next two years

Guests and staff of Stouffer's Valley Forge Inn kept doing double-takes August 16-20.

In hallways, rooms, in every corner it seemed, they kept encountering small groups of men in serious discussion.

No mystery.

It was Convention '78 at the Pennsylvania resort. And those groups were 14 official committees of Alpha Sigma Phi at work. While it is on the floor of the Convention itself that vital decisions are made, it is within committees that direction is set.

Delegates to Convention '78 were a hardworking group that worked well together, carefully shaping the course of the Fraternity for the next two years.

The group elected a new Grand Council, restructured the Province system, extended tentative recognition to a group in the Philippines, increased awards of the Fraternity, adopted standards for new colonies, recognized a self-help organization for Chapter newsletters, increased undergraduate annual dues and set the groundwork for a revitalized scholarship program.

Convention is also an education experience. There were many sessions designed to give delegates information and techniques to take back to their Chapters.

Chapter Consultant Larry Philippi led programs on pledge education and rush. Dennis R. "Skip" Parks, Baldwin-Wallace '72, Memphis State University's advisor to Student Organizations and Greek Activities, spoke on interfraternity relations. In an outstanding example of interfraternal co-operation, Glenn Welch, Executive Director of Phi Kappa Sigma Fraternity and Roy Martin of his staff made a presentation to the Convention on an outstanding case history of what a vital Interfraternity Council can do on a campus.

A how-to session on Chapter publications was led by Evin Varner, Tomahawk editor. "Fraternity Row," a film, was shown and served as a springboard for discussion concerning

There were mixers. And song sessions led by Larry Lukas, Ohio Wesleyan, '42. There was exemplification of the ritual under director of Frank Sine, Lehigh '77. Kevin Kinney, Widener '77, had charge of a full range of sports activities. There was even time for a bus tour of historic Independence Square. Plus brunches, banquets and gatherings at the hotel pool.

It was in the after-hours groupings and gatherings that flowed and ebbed about the hotel where much of the spirit of the Convention developed. "The Phoenix Takes Flight" was the theme of Convention '78. And it was in the sharing of brotherhood in informal times that the determination and spirit gathered to send the Fraternity soaring during the next two years.

Here is a summary of the Convention action:

The new Grand Council of Alpha Sigma Phi will be headed during the next two years by Richard A. Dexter, Oregon State '60, as Grand Senior President. Dexter is an executive with the Bell System and lives in Westfield, N.J.

Grand Junior President is Richard R. Gibbs, Oklahoma '51, Tulsa. He heads his own manufacturers representative firm. Grand Secretary is Louis DeLuca, Wagner '58, executive secretary of the American Parkinson's Disease Association, New York City.

Grand Treasurer Richard S. Sanders, Missouri Valley '62, Cleveland, Ohio, is Assistant Vice President of Sales for Merrill Lynch, Pierce Fenner & Smith, Inc. Grand Marshal Evin Varner, Presbyterian '58, Charlotte, N.C. is an advertising man and the Fraternity's Director of Publications.

Grand Council Michel A. Coccia, Illinois Tech '42, Chicago, is a senior partner in the law firm of Baker & McKenzie. Grand Councilor Peter L. Tourtellot, American '57, Greensboro, N.C., is president of Sedgefield Sportswear Company and Alpha Sigma Phi's Director of Expansion.

Delegates realigned the Fraternity's regional groupings, reducing the number of Provinces to nine. A complete listing of the make-up of the new Provinces is included in the directory in this issue.

Duties of the Province Program Coordinator were spelled out in detail, as well as those of Grand Province Chiefs. A new office is that of undergraduate Province President. These men will chair the Province Educational Conference and will serve as advisors to the Grand Council in addition to carrying out special projects for Headquarters. (In creating this office, the Convention delegates did away with the previous position of Undergraduate Advisors to the Grand Council.)

Province Presidents will be elected for one year terms at National Conventions and National Educational Conferences. They will chair a Province Executive Council that meets twice a year and that is made up of one representative from each Chapter in the Province.

The following men were elected as Province Presidents to serve until the 1979 National Educational Conference unless replaced sooner by an election at a Province meeting:

I-Dennis Simmonds, Oregon State; II-Todd Harris, Iowa State; III-Bill Hasse, Purdue; IV-Jeff Hill, Toledo; V-Jeff Hendricks, Bowling Green: VI-Paul Naffin, Westminster; VII-Lang Brown, Presbyterian; VIII-Dean Fullerton, American; IX-Bill Doyle, Penn State.

Convention delegates created a number of new Fraternity recognitions. On the Chapter level, these are the Outstanding Undergraduate Award (up to three per year per Chapter); Outstanding Alumnus Award (up to three per year per Chapter); and Friend of the Chapter Award, selected by Chapter and number determined by the Chapter, to go to parents, friends, neighbors, administrators, faculty or others to show appreciation for support or services rendered.

The Grand Province Chief Award, selected by that individual and up to three per year per Province, given to undergraduate or alumnus Brother who has excelled in aiding the Fraternity.

On the national level, the following will be granted by the standing Awards Commitee:

Alpha Sigma Phi Community Development Award-recognizing those Brothers outstanding in their work with service and civic organizations.

### Convention report

Recognized at Convention '78 were the winner and top runners-up in the first annual National Sweetheart of Alpha Sigma Phi competition. Kathy Edwards Amatriain, left, was at the Convention to receive a special plaque and the applause of delegates as National Sweetheart. Kathy was the nominee of Alpha Psi Chapter and is now the wife of former Alpha Psi HSP James Amatrian.

Alpha Sigma Phi Professional Man of the Year-up to ten per year, recognizing outstanding professional achievement. Recipients become eligible for the Distinguished Merit

Grand Senior President Citation—given by the GSP for accomplishments or contributions not specifically covered by other recognition programs.

For individual scholastic achievement, the following awards will be granted by the trustees of the Memorial Fund:

Outstanding Scholar of the Year in Liberal Arts-number and standards for excellence to be determined by the Fund's trustees. This award includes the fields of business, education and the humanities. The top achiever will receive the already existing Friends of Rho Award and Grant.

Outstanding Scholar of the Year in Science -with the top achiever receiving the existing Friends of Alpha Gamma Award and Grant. These awards will include the physical, biological and chemical sciences.

Outstanding Scholar of the Year in Technology-including vocational arts, engineering and industrial arts. Delegates instructed that funding be sought to underwrite a grant for the top achiever in this area to match those for science and liberal arts.

Also created was the Outstanding Chapter Alumni Association Award, two for the twoyear period between Conventions, one to a Chapter with a large number of alumni and one to a Chapter with a small number of alumni. The numerical breaking point is to be determined by the Standing Committee on Awards.

Delegates also instructed that an award be developed to recognize Chapters that are outstanding in their contributions to campus life. Input on these awards would come from deans or campus fraternity advisors.

The current program of the Fraternity received a resounding vote of confidence. Delegates created the position of Regional Expansion Coordinator, an alumnus, for each Province. They ruled that a colony may have up to two years to achieve the minimum standards for Chapter operations. Those standards must be reached prior to chartering.

The existence of an undergraduate fraternal organization in the Philippines that operates under the name Alpha Sigma Phi has been reported earlier. Delegates voted a tentative recognition to the group as an international associate. This will provide for exchange of information and publications, with a certain amount of reporting required. This will allow for further study of possible future affiliation.

Delegates wrestled with the problem of balancing the budget of the Fraternity, consulting with Grand Treasurer Richard Gibbs and Grand Junior President Al Wise for opinions and guidance.

Undergraduate annual dues were set at \$7.00 per year per man. This was moved, seconded and passed for addition to Article XIII, Section 9 of the Bylaws of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

Delegates recommended that future Con-

ventions be shortened by a day to reduce deficits. They also asked that there be additional efforts to increase giving to the annual Loyalty Fund of the Fraternity in the hopes of offsetting deficits.

Anticipating increased costs, it was recommended that 25% of the income of the Tomahawk fund be reinvested each year.

**Publications** 

Delegates asked that a study be undertaken concerning the current lifetime subscription to The Tomahawk, with alternatives to that plan to be considered at the 1980 Convention.

Chapters were urged to elect and support an HAE and to make better utilization of The Old Gal Gazette

An updated and expanded ritual was ordered with the language of the pledging ceremony clarified so that it may be administered in either an esoteric or exoteric manner, as determined by the Chapter and in keeping with the Fraternity's Constitution.

Priorities were placed on manuals and other publications deemed needed by the Chapters as funding becomes possible.

The Convention asked that the Fraternity further develop the Phoenix design of the 1978 Convention for application in many ways as a

national symbol for the Fraternity. Revision and updating of "Operation Manpower" was also requested.

#### **Public Relations & Community Service**

The Convention recommended that Chapters start a program of inviting faculty, administration officials and persons from the general community to speak at dinner or Chapter meetings. As much as possible such meetings should be open to the campus and community. Research was ordered on possible fund-raising projects for charity to be carried out at the Province level.

#### Scholarship

Chapter scholarship chairmen are now to report regularly to the Director of Scholarship who will assist in the development of individualized scholarship programs for each Chapter. A major goal is to gain awareness that a scholarship program involves much more than a collective grade point average.

Case histories of work carried out by Chapters will eventually be utilized in an updated manual.

#### Newsletter Association of Alpha Sigma Phi—NAASP

A self-help organization, made up of Chapter newsletters, was created by the Convention. It will seek to promote the exchange of ideas and how-to information on newsletters. It will operate under the direction of Brother Stuart W. Anderson who assisted in developing the concept. Charter members of the group are

#### Housing

Delegates asked that alumni volunteers be sought who could serve as resource people to Chapters in housing problems: legal, constructing, maintenance, architecture, insurance and financing.

Brother Robert McDowell, Indiana '70, was commended for starting the development of loss prevention and property and liability insurance which will eventually be shared with Chapters.

Convention highlights

Something was missing at Convention '78: Executive Secretary Emeritus Ralph Burns. Illness at the last moment prevented Brother Burns from attending. It was the first Convention he has missed since 1936. A letter from him to the delegates was read to the group at the awards dinner. The Convention adopted a resolution in Brother Burns' honor, commending him for his service to the Fraternity, and wishing him a speedy recovery.

Awards are a special part of Convention, especially the top Chapter awards. The Grand Senior President's Award goes to the Chapters judged the most outstanding during the period between Conventions. Two are presented at each Convention, based on campus size. Proudly taking home those conveted awards were Psi Chapter, Oregon State and Beta Mu Chapter, Wake Forest University.

The Alpha Gamma Upsilon Award goes to the most improved Chapters, with two awards granted, based on campus size. For 1976-78, these top awards went to Theta Chapter, University of Michigan and Alpha Tau Chapter, Stevens.

The top publication awards are the Stuart W. and Bruce R. Anderson Jr. Awards for Editorial Excellence. Making the presentations was Stuart W. Anderson, principal of the awards. The Tomahawk Award went to Beta Mu Chapter, Wake Forest. The Old Gal Gazette

Award winner was Theta Chapter, Michigan. and the Chapter Newsletter Award honored Gamma Chi Chapter, Indiana.

Award of Service to campus and community went to Alpha Pi Chapter, Purdue. The National Province Leadership Award '76-78, recognized Alpha Xi Chapter, Illinois Tech.

Scholarship Awards for individual achievement were presented. (Due to new privacy laws, it is no longer possible to obtain Chapter scholarship rankings so only individual awards are currently made.)

William B. Weber Jr., Toledo, was presented a scholarship grant as the Fraternity's Scholar of the Year.

Friends of Alpha Gamma Chapter Award (Science); Marty L. Willadsen, Friends of Rho Chapter Award (Liberal Arts); Steven Chegash, Lawrence Tech, runner-up, Friends of Alpha Gamma Award; Douglas G. Borsich, runner-up, Friends of Rho Award; and Michael J. Honeyman, an award by the Trustees of the Memorial Fund.

At the awards banquet, the large delegation from Beta Zeta Chapter, North Carolina State, displayed to the Convention items received at their recent chartering—the New Chapter Baby Blanket and the Alpha Badge. The group received a resounding ovation after telling the story of their work to become a Chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi and their feeling upon reaching that goal.

Final banquet—Brother Larry Lukas presented his Convention Chorus singing Fraternity songs in fine voice. An impromptu Grand Council Chorus then performed—not necessarily in fine voice. It was the closing banquet of Convention '78 and indeed the Phoenix took flight.

Retiring Grand Senior President George Lord received his past GSP medallion and gavel to an affectionate ovation from the crowd. The delegates saluted his wife Sue for her outstanding support and co-operation and presented her with an Alpha Sigma Phi rocking chair.

Remarks by retiring Grand Junior President Alfred B. Wise, gave to the undergraduate audience an insight into the rewards of long and active service to the Fraternity.

The Distinguished Service Award, the top recognition of the Fraternity, was presented to two surprised alumni. For 1977, the award went to past Grand Senior Piesident George B. Trubow, Michigan '53. For 1978, the award was presented to Stuart W. Anderson, Eastern Michigan '73.

Following the introduction of the new Grand Council, the medallion of office was placed around the neck of new Grand Senior President Richard A. Dexter. He outlined the Fraternity's opportunities and needs and challenged the group to make the next two years outstanding ones for the "Old Gal."

## **Enthusiastic Beta** Mu alumni return for banquet, talks and 'Hall of Fame' awards














"After 23 years in this Fraternity, I've never seen more Wake Forest Alpha Sigs gathered together like this," commented James Turner, Wake Forest '55, Beta Mu's new alumni chairman.

It was Alumni Day '78 and more than 100 persons attended an afternoon reception and banquet at Winston-Salem's plush Hyatt House Hotel. A football game and band party followed that evening.

The reunion was an effort by the undergraduate brothers to enable more alumni to re-establish ties with the Fraternity. Returning members were delighted with the event as was David Thomas, undergraduate chairman. "We hope to have the alumni back now at least twice a year," said Thomas.

The friendships you make there are lifelong."

Ed Bridger, Wake Forest '49, presented three "Hall of Fame" awards to alumni. These went to Arnold Palmer, Horace Kornegay and James Turner. An additional name will be added each year.



## Alpha Sig editor now aims at television

Harold T. P. Hayes, Wake Forest '44, probably gave little thought to environmental concerns as a Beta Mu undergraduate.

Today the former editor of Esquire Magazine is involved in raising \$3 million to produce an eight-part documentary for public television on the Predicament of Man and His Planet.

The New Yorker sees the series tracing life from its appearance in the simplest form three billion years ago to man's arrival five million years ago.

According to Brother Hayes' concept, "Now, in the late 20th century, this intricate, interdependent, infinitely complex, biological process is in jeopardy."

Hayes helped mold Esquire into a major magazine, immersed in issues of the present and showcasing some of the best journalism published.

Heir apparent to the publisher, he left Esquire over a conflict about editorial control.

"The question was did I want to be an editor or a businessman?", Hayes recalls. "I have never enjoyed or been particularly good at being a businessman so I got the hell out."

So he became a magazine consultant, a television talk show host and a writer.

It was an assignment from New Yorker Magazine that took him to Africa and the Serengeti Plain, a 15,000 square mile of Tanzania and one of the last places on earth where beasts; not man, still rule.

While vast numbers of animals of many species roam the arid grasslands of the preserve, living in perfect harmony with their environment, man has turned the surrounding territory into an overgrazed wasteland from which he ekes a bare subsistence.

The New Yorker profile grew into a threepart piece and then finally appeared earlier this year as a book. (The Last Place On Earth, Stein and Day, 7 East 48th St., N.Y., N.Y. 10017. 285 pages. \$10.00.)

Now Hayes is seeking to turn those same issues, the fragile co-existence man must attain with his environment, into the documentary series. Plans call for production to begin early next year and take two years. The Rockefeller Foundation has already provided a grant towards production.

Brother Hayes serves Wake Forest University on its Board of Visitors and chaired that group until recently.

Why television for a print-oriented man?

"Television is the medium that surrounds us today like nothing else does—you can't escape it. But you can choose not to read a book."

Dr. Frank Krebs, Mount Union '29, is Grand Historian of Alpha Sigma Phi. As a historian, he is constantly at work delving into the past of the Fraternity. Currently he has been doing research on Founder Louis Manigault. He has been finding materials in the libraries of the University of North Carolina, the University of South Carolina and Duke University that are helping fill in some gaps in our early recorded history.

And the Charleston, West Virginia resident also advises National Headquarters regarding our archives, particularly when a member contributes materials that relate to the past of a Chapter or of the Fraternity itself.

Brother Krebs "retired" as vice president for student affairs and dean of students at Morris Harvey College in 1973. He continued to teach history and sociology part time until this year.

But as his contributions to Alpha Sigma Phi indicate, Dr. Krebs is anything but retired.

For example, every Monday, he and his wife Ruth deliver meals to elderly and shut-ins in the downtown Charleston area.

He spends one day each month recording tapes for the blind.

And his post as managing editor of the Education Foundation, Inc., requires at least half a day each week. The foundation is a non-profit corporation that prints books about West Virginia and by authors of the state. One of the foundation's book is used in the junior high schools of West Virginia.

For Alpha Sigma Phi he has arranged to microfilm the Manigault diary. He is also on the administrative board of his Methodist Church and heads its senior citizen program.

Krebs was a district governor for the Lions Club in 1975-76 and he and his wife traveled over 20,000 miles in the state, making 103



visits to clubs. He remains active in Lions and often speaks or inducts new clubs.
