# Every Chapter has added to the rich heritage of Alpha Sigma Phi

Few fraternities can match the remarkably rich history of Alpha Sigma Phi.

Any pledge worth his salt can retell colorful events from the "Old Gal's" past: The founding in 1845 at Yale; Delta Beta Xi continuing the traditions sub rosa in 1864; loyal Cincinnati alumni keeping Delta Chapter at Marietta alive in 1880 with the first Sig Bust; the second founding in 1906 at Yale which led to Alpha Sigma Phi becoming a truly national fraternity.

So perhaps it is understandable that not quite as much is made of the histories of individual Chapters. Yet each Chapter has a story that is worth repeating.

lota, Cornell University, for example, should have been initiated on March 26, 1909, when a group of ten men went to Yale for the ceremonies. But one man became separated from the rest, and the night was spent in search for him. He was found, sleeping in a Yale brother's room, waiting for instructions. The group was initiated on March 27

Wayne M. Musgrave, who led the Fraternity from 1907 to 1923, is credited in orchestrating the founding of 20 Chapters during his leadership. Chapters such as Mu, University of Washington, Zeta, Ohio State University, Eta, University of Illinois and Theta, University of Michigan, are direct results of Musgrave's contributions. Both Eta, formerly the Eos Club, and Theta traveled to Marietta in 1908 to be officially initiated.

Four of today's active Chapters became part of Alpha Sigma Phi with the 1939 merger with Phi Pi Phi. Alpha Mu, Baldwin-Wallace College, began as Mu chapter of that fraternity in 1926. Alpha Nu, Westminster College, where they are still called "Phippies", started as Nu of Phi Pi Phi. The Fraternity's Gamma chapter was installed in 1923 at the Armour Institute of Technology and the Chapter is now Alpha Xi of Alpha Sigma Phi at the Illinois Institute of Technology. Alpha Pi, Purdue University, proudly displays its 1930 charter as Phi of Phi Pi Phi.

According to Grand Historian Frank Krebs, Mount Union '29, 17 active Chapters and the Beta Delta Colony at Marshall University were part of Alpha Kappa Pi, making the 1946 merger one of the single greatest contributors to the growth and continuance of Alpha Sigma Phi. "It was a good marriage," says

Alpha Sigma Chapter at Wagner College gave Alpha Kappa Pi its name when that local joined with a local at Newark Technical College in 1926 to form a new national fraternity. Since the Wagner group had the honor of providing the name, the Newark group was given the Alpha designation and the Wagner chapter became Beta.

Alpha Tau, Stevens Institute of Technology, began as a local fraternity called Phi Nu, which became Gamma of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1926. Lambda Tau Delta, a local at Coe College became Zeta in 1928, then Alpha Chi during the 1946 merger with Alpha Sigma Phi. Alpha Psi, Presbyterian College, began as Phi Delta Tau, a local, and become Eta of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1929.

Howard Hall, a group at Lehigh University,

became Nu of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1930 and is now Beta Epsilon

Beta Zeta, North Carolina State University, began as the Alpha Klub in 1929, formed by Albert E. Nebett, an Alpha Kappa Pi transfer from the Newark College of Engineering. In 1930 it became Xi of Alpha Kappa Pi. By remarkable coincidence, Phi Pi Phi chartered the Sigma Delta local at N.C. State as its Xi chapter! That local had been established in 1920. In 1927 the Phi Pi Phi chapter lived in a house at 10 Enterprise Drive almost half a century later, the reactivated Beta Zeta Chapter-with no knowledge of the house's history-moved into 10 Enterprise Drive!

Alpha Kappa Pi acquired many local fraternities during its history. Some of these went on to become Chapters in Alpha Sigma Phi. Phi Lambda Sigma was founded at Rutgers University in 1926. It became Rho of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1931 and now stands as Beta Theta.

Lambda Tau fraternity at Wake Forest was installed as Chi of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1932. Today it is Beta Mu. Hartwick College got its first national fraternity when Alpha Sigma Chi local became Alpha Alpha of Alpha Kappa Pi. At the 1946 merger it became Beta Xi. Beta Omicron, Tri-State University, traces itself to Alpha Delta Alpha, founded in 1924, which became Alpha Beta of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1935.

Phi Epsilon Alpha fraternity was born at American University in 1937 and became Alpha lota of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1940. Today it is Beta Chi.

Two national fraternities played important roles in the growth of Alpha Kappa Pi. Theta Nu Epsilon, founded in 1870 as a sophomore society at Wesleyan University in Connecticut, had a turbulent history which led to its disbandment in 1940, gave Alpha Kappa Pi two chapters. Lambda of Theta Nu Epsilon, started

in 1882 at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. became Alpha Kappa of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1940, and is now Beta Psi. Ohio Northern University was the birthplace of Theta Nu Epsilon's Omicron chapter in 1923, which became Alpha Lambda of Alpha Kappa Pi in 1924. The Chapter is now known as Gamma Alpha.

Sigma Delta Rho was the other fraternity that played a prominent role. Zeta Omicron, founded as a local in 1921 at the University of Toledo, became Gamma chapter of Sigma Delta Rho in 1924. In 1925 Kappa Alpha Chi local was born at the University of Cincinnati. It became Epsilon of Sigma Delta Rho in 1927.

When the Great Depression began, Sigma Delta Rho, which had never been a large national, began to suffer and actually failed. In 1937 the Toledo chapter became Alpha Delta of Alpha Kappa Pi and the Cincinnati group became Alpha Epsilon chapter. With the 1946 merger with Alpha Sigma Phi, the Toledo group became Beta Rho Chapter and the Cincinnati group became Beta Sigma

Alpha Sigma Phi was boosted with a third merger which took place in 1964 with Alpha Gamma Upsilon. Today three Chapters resulting from that merger are still active in Alpha Sigma Phi. Alpha Gamma Upsilon's Nu chapter, founded in 1951 at Lycoming College, became Gamma Rho at the merger. Alpha Sigma Phi's Gamma Upsilon Chapter at Eastern Michigan University was Alpha Gamma Upsilon's lota chapter founded in 1948. Gamma Psi Chapter, Lawrence Institute of Technology, was Epsilon of Alpha Gamma Upsilon, established in 1933. Following the 1964 merger, the group had to wait four years for accreditation of their institution before being chartered in Alpha Sigma Phi.

Several Chapters of Alpha Sigma Phi have their roots in social clubs and local fraternities as did Delta Delta, Slippery Rock College, and Delta Epsilon, Rio Grande. Many of these groups operated for several years before becoming part of the national. Omicron,

University of Pennsylvania, grew out of the Comedy Club. Seven members went to Yale on May 14, 1914, for initiation, and then on to New York City where the Chapter was formally installed by Wayne Musgrave.

The Alvarado Club at Stanford University became Tau Chapter in 1917. The Viking Club met for six years before it received its charter as Upsilon Chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi in 1918 at Penn State University. Many traditions in use today at Psi Chapter, Oregon State University are traced back to the Aztec Club founded in 1912. Psi received its charter in

Alpha Alpha Chapter at the University of Oklahoma was chartered in 1923, but began as Delta Kappa Rho local fraternity in 1921. The Tri-C Club at Missouri Valley College first met in 1927 and later changed its name to Alpha Delta Kappa. In 1945 the local was granted a charter as Alpha Omicron.

Delta Sigma, a local at Davis and Elkins College, was founded in 1946 with the intent of seeking national affiliation. In 1947 the group petitioned Alpha Sigma Phi and was granted status as Gamma Delta in 1949.

The Rover Club at Bowling Green State University was founded in 1946. Out of that club came the Chi Alpha local fraternity which petitioned for Chapter status in 1950 and was granted the designation Gamma Zeta.

Gamma Lambda, Atlantic Christian College, was the first local fraternity on campus-Sigma Alpha. In 1958 the group petitioned for and was granted a charter in Alpha Sigma Phi. Findlay College was the home of Alpha Kappa Omicron, a local founded in 1961. By 1964 the local had become Gamma Pi of Alpha Sigma Phi. Sigma Delta Phi was a local with a ten year history at Loyola University before it became Delta Alpha Chapter in 1968

Two Chapters are the results of splits in local fraternities. Phi Alpha Chi at Concord College could not decide which national they wished to join. In 1964 the group that wanted to become part of Alpha Sigma Phi split off, (continued next page)

becoming Sigma Delta Phi and remained local for another two years before being chartered as **Gamma Phi**. Only part of Delta Omega Nu at Northern Michigan wanted to go national. The Alpha Sigma Phi Club was founded in 1967 and gained its charter as **Delta Beta** in 1968.

In more recent years several Chapters of Alpha Sigma Phi were begun as locals or clubs with the original intent on becoming a part of the Fraternity. Some like **Gamma Mu**, University of Charleston (formerly Morris Harvey College), first started in 1950 as Sigma Delta Phi and remained local for ten years before gaining Chapter status!

Lambda Zeta Rho was formed at PMC now Widener College—in 1961 intending to become Alpha Sigma Phi. **Gamma Xi** was the designation given to the group in 1962.

With the aid of **Stan Miller**, **Purdue** '64, then a graduate student at the University of Indiana, Sigma Phi local was formed in 1966. The members were pledged to Alpha Sigma Phi in 1967 and in 1968 was chartered as **Gamma Chi**. Stan Miller now serves on the Grand Council.

With the 1970's came the "Old Gal's" drive to establish new Chapters and to revive inactive ones. **Delta Zeta**, University of North Carolina at Charlotte, received its charter in 1979, but began its drive for Chapter status as a local, Delta Kappa, in 1975. In fact, Delta Zeta's activity led to the forming of the group that reactivated Beta Zeta Chapter at N.C. State.

Delta Eta, East Carolina University, was first formed as the Nu Chi Colony in the spring of 1978. In December of 1979, it became one of the newer members of Alpha Sigma Phi.

Gamma Omicron, Tulane University, first founded in 1964, was reactivated in February of 1980, after an eight year absence.

Three of Alpha Sigma Phi's Colonies are reactivations of Chapters. Alpha Theta, University of Missouri, first founded in 1929; Gamma Theta, University of Miami, first founded in 1952; and Marshall University's Beta Delta. And two Colonies—Delta Theta at Radford University and Phi Zeta at Longwood College—are eagerly building their own histories in becoming a part of the brotherhood of Alpha Sigma Phi!
