### ALPHA SIGMA PHI LEAVING STANFORD, EASTERN MICHIGAN

At its January, 1983 meeting, the Grand Council of Alpha Sigma Phi withdrew recognition of Tau Chapter, Stanford University. The chapter had been under suspension since January of 1981 for constitutional and ritual violations. Since that time the Fraternity staff, national officers and alumni have worked with Tau, outlining plans that would allow the chapter to continue. While some progress was made, the undergraduates finally decided they could not adhere to the Constitution of the Fraternity.

Tau Chapter was installed in 1917 by Nu Chapter at the University of California, Berkeley. During its 65 years Tau produced a steady stream of loyal brothers and leaders of the Fraternity, including former Grand Senior President Emmet B. Hayes (Stanford '31), and former Grand Councilor Floyd Mosiman (Stanford '17). These two brothers are also recipients of the Fraternity's Distinguished Service Award. In addition, some 25 Tau brothers were awarded the distinction of Delta Beta Xi. Activities to maintain fraternal ties among the brotherhood will be the new focus of the Tau Corporation, according to chapter alumni.

The Grand Council also voted to begin proceedings for revocation of the charter of Gamma Upsilon, Eastern Michigan University. Frequent efforts by Fraternity volunteers, nearby chapters, and the Headquarters staff to strengthen the Eastern Michigan University chapter were not successful. The chapter had already been on suspension for failure to meet the Fraternity's Minimum Standards of Operation.

Gamma Upsilon became part of Alpha Sigma Phi in the 1965 merger of Alpha Gamma Upsilon National Fraternity. Tracing itself back to 1948, this once strong, dynamic chapter will remain inactive until such time as conditions are conducive to a successful reactivation.
