Community service highlights '84-'85 chapter reports

The 1984-85 academic year was highlighted by numerous chapter community services and charity activities. The true spirit of the Alpha Sig purpose "to maintain charity" has never shone brighter!

Upsilon Chapter at Penn State brought great pride to our brotherhood by winning the IFC Dance Marathon for the second year in a row! The Penn State Marathon raised over \$178,000 for the Four Diamonds Children's Cancer Fund at Hershey Medical center and is the largest college philanthropic event in the country. Of the total \$178,000 donated, Upsilon Chapter raised \$80.000!!!

The Upsilon brothers were paired with the Alpha Sigma Alpha Sorority for the 48 hours of non-stop dancing. During the weeks before the dance brothers canvassed local metropolitan areas for pledges and donations, and even mailed businesses requests for gifts using rented word processing equipment. As a result, the nearest competitor only raised \$54,000 and third place raised \$18,000!

Alpha Nu Chapter at Westminster put its creativity to work and transformed the chapter house at 129 Waugh Avenue into a "Haunted House" during Halloween last fall. Parents brought their children to New Wilmington to pay the 50 cent admission and take them through the rooms full of ghosts, goblins and other spooks!

Even though the transformed house made it difficult for sleeping and living, the payoff came with lots of great publicity. The chapter donated their \$500.00 proceeds from the event to the New Wilmington Rescue Squad Fund.

Alpha Pi Chapter at Purdue added a new "twist" to their service program this year. Early in the fall, they "adopted" the Heritage Health Care Home in West Lafayette. Brothers regularly visited the residents just to share the joys of companionship.

When the time came in February for a fundraiser benefitting the American Heart Association . . . why not! A "Twist-A-Thon" was held at the home with the residents—many of whom participated in wheel chairs!

Delta Theta Chapter at Radford continued a four year tradition by holding its annual "Dime Roll" for the March of Dimes. The brothers have constructed a six foot in diameter, wooden "dime" which they roll the 54 mile distance between Radford and Roanoke, Virginia. This year the brothers were joined by a local radio station which provided annual updates on their progress to listeners.

Local businesses along with students and area residents made pledges per "mile rolled." The final result was a hefty \$2,000 check for the local March of Dimes!



Foundation sponsors "Quest"

Leadership training, educational workshops, and ritual presentations will highlight the 1985 National Educational Conference, sponsored by the Alpha Sigma Phi Educational Foundation, this August 8-11 at Penn State. The theme "Quest for Excellence" has been chosen to highlight Alpha Sigma Phi's goal to constantly improve our quality of life.

The goal of the Conference is to inspire the 125 or more undergraduate leaders in attendance to seek higher standards of brotherhood and operation, and to provide educational workshops and training to help them meet their new goals.

According to Executive Director, Robert M. Sheehan, Jr., a key presentation will be made by Dr. Edward King, Dean of Men at Bradley University. Dr. King will speak about the importance of ritual in fraternity life and everyday living. "Dr. King is the premier speaker in the country on fraternity affairs and ritual. He was by far the highest rated speaker at our 1983 conference, and speaks annually to thousands of fraternity men across the nation" says Sheehan.

"We believe that the ritual is the most important aspect of fraternity life. If we all live up to the standards and ideals set in the ritual we will achieve **excellence**. Dr. King's inspirational presentation motivates all who hear him to reach those standards. We are pleased and proud to have him on our program again this year."

Other highlights of the conference include the Final "Salute to Scholars" Banquet at Penn State's Nittany Lion Inn. The featured speaker for the evening is John F. Johnson, Tufts '60, who is President of Lamalie and Associates, a major national executive search firm. Brother Johnson will speak on the importance of scholarship to a career search and give brothers ideas on how they can develop skills through their fraternity experience useful to them in their future careers.




