NEW AWARD ANNOUNCED

The Grand Council has announced the establishment of the Gary A. Anderson Award. The award will be presented for the first time at the 1987 National Leadership Conference at Bethany College, and will recognize the chapter of the Fraternity with the most outstanding program of pledge education. The criteria has not been fully established, but most certainly will include an evaluation of how effectively a chapter integrates its pledges into the brotherhood. "Gary was very much interested in developing effective techniques for educating new members," says Executive Director Robert M. Sheehan, Jr., "and one of his greatest contributions in this area was his collaboration with Evin Varner in the development of To Better The Man." Gary served the Fraternity as Chapter Consultant from 1974-1976 and as Exective Director from 1976-1978. Subsequently, Gary was a teacher in an elementary school in Arizona when he was stricken by cancer, and after a lengthy illness, passed away last October.

News You Can Use

STUDENT USE OF COCAINE IS UP, USE OF MOST OTHER DRUGS DROPS
Cocaine use has remained high among high school and college students while the illicit use of marijuana, the most prevalent drug used, dropped from 1980 to 1984 and leveled off in 1985, according to a survey made public in July.

The National Institute on Drug Abuse, which financed the survey, and the Institute for Social Research at University of Michigan, which conducted it, reported that thirty per cent of all college students will have used cocaine at least once by the end of their fourth year in college.

The illicit use of many other drugs fell by half over that period, the survey reported.



"The most serious current problem clearly is the fact that cocaine use remains at peak levels in this population. This is also true among high school students and young adults generally, not just college students," reported Dr. Lloyd D. Johnston. Dr. Johnston also stated that students report cocaine to be readily available and, until very recently at least, the great majority saw little risk in experimenting with it.
