Alpha Sig excellence

Time... most people never seem to have enough to accomplish all that they would like, yet like the old adage suggests it is what we do with it that counts. Robert A. Wade, Bowling Green '83 is a shining example of making the most out of his twenty-four hours each day. Brother Wade has devoted himself to a variety of activities and organizations cultivating a long list of accomplishments and experiences. One of his notable achievements was to have served as National Chief of Order of the Arrow.

Brother Wade became the National Chief of the Order of the Arrow in 1983. The Order is an integral part of the Boy Scouts of America with a purpose and principles that are in many ways similar to Alpha Sigma Phi. Order of the Arrow is an honorary organization recognizing Scouts, Explorers and Scouters who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives. The goals of the Order are to develop and maintain camping traditions and spirit, as well as to crystallize the Scout habit of leadership in service to others and to spread the spirit of Brotherhood, not just among its members but to all people. There are over four hundred Order of the Arrow lodges affiliated with Boy Scout Councils across the country. The goals and objectives of the organization are accomplished through a variety of local, regional and national programs.

The Order conducts National Leadership Seminars in each region to educate lodge youth officers and adults. There is also a National Order of the Arrow Conference attended by several thousand members every year. As National Chief, Wade had the opportunity to participate in many of these programs, as well as to have served on a delegation making the annual report to the nation in Washington, D.C. The delegation had the honor of meeting with President Reagan during their visit to the nation's capital.

Brother Wade is a native of Delta, Ohio where he began his scouting career as a member of Cub Pack 72. He is an Eagle Scout

with three palms (representing 15 merit badges beyond the 21 required for scouting's top rank). He has attended the Philmont Scout Ranch, and has served three seasons on the council summer camp staff. He also represented the Shawnee Council in a Boy Scout of America Report to the Governor program.

He is the winner of the unit, council, and area public speaking contests conducted by the Boy Scouts in cooperation with the Reader's Digest Association. He has been presented with the Order of the Arrow's Founders Award recognizing his outstanding work for the organization. Without question Brother Wade's involvement with the Boy Scouts has claimed a great deal of his time and attention the past few years; nevertheless, he has enthusiastically supported numerous activities and organizations at Bowling Green State University.

As a member of Gamma Zeta he has served as scholarship chairman, vice president and during the past academic year as pledge educator. He revised the pledge education program with a greater emphasis on brotherhood and leadership development. His new program will provide Gamma Zeta with great brothers for years to come. His activities outside the chapter at Bowling Green also carried a great deal of responsibility; a feat time management specialists would marvel at.

During the 1984-85 school year, Brother Wade served as president of the student government association. He effectively developed solutions to a variety of problems during his tenure. The university and local government had been having problems with parties held in the neighborhoods adjacent to campus during the previous spring semester. These parties were described as nearly turning into drunken riots. Where others saw a problem, Brother Wade saw an opportunity. He created and organized BGSU's first "Spring Fest," a huge outdoor celebration within a controlled area. The event consisted of seven

bands and other outdoor activities. The Student Government originally estimated they would make approximately \$8,000, but when the event was over they had raised over \$20,000. The Spring Fest was such a huge success in alleviating the problems of the previous year that the mayor of Bowling Green asked him to coordinate the program again this year.

Brother Wade has been such an outstanding representative of Alpha Sigma Phi that the Grand Council invited him to be one of the undergraduate speakers at The Third Founding Celebration of Excellence Banquet this past Founders' Day in Washington, D.C. He spoke on The Third Founding Endowment Campaign's importance to America in developing future leadership.

This remarkable young brother graduated this spring from Bowling Green with a degree in political science and business administration, and again it is no small feat that he graduated with high honors. Brother Wade is currently planning to attend law school in the fall and hopes to be involved at some point in politics on the federal level.

All of these achievements are certainly worth a great deal of admiration, yet you soon realize that it is not a well organized date book that has enabled him or anyone to accomplish so much, but rather a strong belief that organizations such as Boy Scouts, Alpha Sigma Phi and Student Government provide the opportunity to grow and become a better persons.

Nu University of California


This spring found Nu Chapter hosting the Province I Conclave. All chapters attended and shared ideas on rush and province unification.



Beta Delta Marshall University



The brothers are actively searching for fundraising ideas to help raise money for new furniture in their chapter room. The university is helping to make their accommodations more comfortable for the brothers.



Province VIII



The chapter is dedicated to excellence and looks forward to another great year at Penn State as well as a great football season!


Beta Xi Hartwick College
