BROTHERS STEALING FROM BROTHERS



However, two chapters of Alpha Sigma Phi, Alpha Xi at Illinois Institute of Technology and Gamma Zeta at Bowling Green State University, have suffered devastating blows this year. Each chapter had placed a Brother in a position of trust, the office of HE, and then, actually had this person steal money from the chapter accounts. The reason it was possible was simply because both chapters were not careful about two signatures for all chapter accounts. It was the practice in one chapter for the HSP to sign blank checks! Neither chapter could possibly have known such a practice would have created too great a temptation, and the trust those two individuals enjoyed unfortunately was not a strong enough barrier to protect the chapters' accounts.

At the suggestion of the Fraternity's insurance carrier who bonds all chapter treasurers, the headquarters staff will now help chapters during visits to make plans for a conversion to dual signatures should it not already be required. Remember, Brotherhood is helping one another avoid mistakes -- two signatures removes the temptation to do something two Brothers already will regret for a long time to come.

Because of an overwhelming interest by Brothers graduating in December of 1987, **Robert M. Sheeham, Jr.,** Westminster '76, Executive Director has announced that the Fraternity is considering hiring a **Chapter Leadership Consultant Intern** in addition to the staff positions currently being filled for 1987-88. The Chapter Leadership Consultant Intern would work and train at the National Headquarters during June, July, and August helping coordinate summer projects, prepare for the National Leadership Conference and undergo extensive training. The Consultant Intern will then return to school in the fall to complete his undergraduate degree, and begin working full-time for the National Headquarters making chapter visits in January of 1988.









PENN STATE ALPHA SIGS DO IT AGAIN!!

The Brothers of **Upsilon Chapter** and the sisters of Alpha Sigma Alpha Sorority at Penn State University coordinated a statewide fundraising campaign to raise money for the **Four Diamonds Children's Cancer Fund at the Hershey Medical Center.** Together, both groups **raised over \$87,000 for the charity** in conjunction with the University's IFC Dance Marathon. For the third year in a row, the Alpha Sigs and Alpha Sigma Alpha sorority have won the trophy for raising the most money. They are not alone, and the competition is tough as many other chapters on campus raised pledges totaling in the tens of thousands of dollars. This annual event has become known as the largest college philanthropic event in the country, and the Fraternity can be proud that Upsilon Chapter is leading the way.



WYOMING SCOFFS AT FEDERAL MANDATE

The Wyoming State Legislature in Cheyenne voted <u>not</u> to raise the statewide drinking age to 21 this week. The vote will result in the loss of millions of federal highway dollars, but the legislature is on record as stating that the human rights are a greater concern than federal subsidies for highways. Wyoming is one of only a very few states not to raise its drinking age in recent years.

ALPHA SIGMA PHI SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM SCHOLAR TIPS #5

Taking The Exam by Dr. Dennis R. Parks, Baldwin Wallace '72 Director of Scholarship

You walk into the classroom, sit down and then it happens, panic sets in. Within a few seconds you are sure that you have forgotten everything you learned. Right? Not always. If you follow a few logical steps, actually taking an examination does not have to be the worst thing since you had your appendix taken out. Phauk, in the book <u>How to Study for College</u>, points out seven tips for taking examinations.

- 1. Get plenty of sleep. Be well rested.
- 2. Relax and don't panic. If properly prepared, an examination is not a panic situation.
- 3. Be confident. You can do it, so tell yourself so.
- 4. Do a final review. The night before the examination, go over study sheets for a final time.
- 5. Don't rush to the examination. Get up early enough so that you go to the examination relaxed and not having to "run around."
- 6. Stay calm. A little tenseness is good, but too much will cause you to panic and have mental blocking.

In addition, there are a few extra tips from years of experience with examinations. They may not help you get better grades, but you may feel a lot better.

- 1. Don't try to cram a few minutes before the examination by talking with other students. Last minute cramming will cause confusion and anxiety.
- 2. Don't just dive right into the examination. Relax, take a few minutes and look over the entire examination. Note if certain questions are worth more than others. These are the ones on which to concentrate.
- 3. Be conscious of the time. But don't be a clock watcher.
- 4. When the examination is over, don't do the following:
 - a. Try to guess which answers you got wrong.
 - b. Compare your answers to everyone else's.
 - c. Try to set yourself up for being happy with a grade of "C" by telling anyone who will listen that you flunked.
