

#### A MESSAGE OF BROTHERHOOD AND INSPIRATION

At the 1988 National Leadership Conference & Convention we had the distinct honor of having Ohio's Supreme Court Justice Andy Douglas, Toledo '51, speak at the Awards Banquet. His story was one of excitement for the Old Gal and how it has helped him through life. The following are some excerpts from his fantastic message.

"I can remember being privileged to attend, as a delegate, a like conference of the fraternity some thirty-six years ago--a conference held at the lodge in the Pocono Mountains. I can remember being pushed, trained, instructed, enthused, directed--and yes--loved by persons who cared about us, our futures and our fraternity's role in that development. I recall wondering if ever I would be, as an alum, invited to speak to others of our fraternity, who might be in the development stage, about the training you are receiving and how it stands you in good stead for a lifetime. Tonight, I have been accorded that privilege--and I'm honored.

"Briefly, I want my message to be that anything is possible, that one person can still make a difference, that unselfish service to others remains a high calling, and that our fraternity has a vital and important job to do.

"My father died early in my college career and I was responsible for the support of my invalid mother and my younger brother, but I remained in school. How? That's the real story. My strength and my support were my brothers and advisors in Alpha Sigma Phi. We were the political fraternity on campus and the activities in the fraternity were to set the pattern for the rest of my life.

"I was chosen by my brothers to run for the office of Freshman Representative to Student Council. It was my brothers—and my big brother—who really won that election—and our class in the fraternity was on its way. Subsequently, I was elected President of the Sophomore class and eventually the leader of our interfraternity council. Eventually—after entering law school, I became the class representative to the student bar association and finally its president.

"Who made all this possible--my fraternity brothers--AND Alpha Sigma Phi! Why? Because I was taught--and I learned how to get along. I was taught--and I learned how to handle problems.

"As an illustration, let me return for just a moment to that convention of 1952. In 1952, and before, our great fraternity had a rule excluding blacks from membership. We debated that policy at that great convention. I was privileged to be one of the debaters arguing that this unfair, discriminatory policy be changed. To my surprise (other movements had been unsuccessful) when I made the motion it carried and we, as a leader in the fraternity movement, had done the right thing—we did away with our caucasian clause—and, as always, others followed the leadership of Alpha Sigma Phi.

I learned a lesson--an Alpha Sigma Phi lesson--that has stood me in good stead my entire life--and especially in my life's work.

"After graduation, I decided to run for Toledo City Council. At the age of 29 and with no real financial resources, I was discouraged by many.  $\underline{But}$ --not my fraternity brothers. With their help, I was not only elected--I led the ticket out of a slate of thirty-four candidates--and was re-elected ten consecutive times.

"Who made all of this possible? Life long friends--persons as close as real brothers from whom I now buy insurance, clothing, cars and sports goods.

"After being elected as a court of appeals judge, the next step was the job I have now. Suddenly, I was a candidate in eighty-eight counties—the entire State of Ohio. My family at just one school—and in a few counties—wasn't going to be enough. It was like a miracle. Wherever I went in Ohio, it seemed there was an Alpha Sig. It didn't make any difference that I was from the Beta Rho Chapter or a different school. The unanimous response was—"What can I do to help?" Individuals—Brothers—all over this state put their shoulders to the wheel.

"Have Alpha Sigs--and Alpha Sigma Phi made a difference? You Bet!

"Why do I go through all this with you? Because you are our future. The time fast approaches when many of us will turn over to you the mantels of leadership. You are being trained here, and in your local chapters and schools, to meet the challenges of an everchanging society. You are being taught the importance of service—and the importance of selfless public service. We have seen—all too often—on all levels of government, persons in positions of trust who have sought power for selfish reasons—to benefit themselves and their friends. It goes without saying that is improper—even though you each know this, we all need to be reminded and that's why part of this conference has been devoted to character development.

"And that brings me to my final point—the importance of this great fraternity to its members past, present, and those yet to come. Some of us have blood brothers. That can be a blessing of birth—but we really had no choice in the matter. Not so as we gather here tonight. We are brothers by choice—and we will always be brothers no matter where we are or where we might go. We need never be really alone. There is always a brother—ready and willing—to pick us up when we are down.

"Let's continue to be proud that we are members of Alpha Sigma Phi, and continue to believe that there are not very many things that we can't accomplish through fraternity. Clearly, there's life in the Old Gal yet!

"Should I offer you more advice, you who are the future of our fraternity? I think not. Your accomplishments will make ours seem insignificant. I would end this talk by again referring to the Bible, to Joel 2:28--'Your old men shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions.

"Make these visions, for all our sakes, ones of honesty and service--thereby assuring accomplishment.

"This then is your challenge. Are you up to it? We're betting on you!"



#### SORORITY SUSPENDED FOR BRANDING PLEDGES

A sorority at the University of Maine at Orono has lost its recognition after a hazing incident in which pledges were branded with the initials of the Greek organization.

Sixteen Alpha Chi Omega pledges were blindfolded and driven to a cemetery, where they were asked to walk between two rows of sorority sisters. At the end of their walk, the pledges were stamped with a metal instrument heated over a candle flame. Three of the pledges received minor burns.

The sorority sisters involved in the incident may be subject to suspension, expulsion, or other disciplinary action when the university completes an investigation. The sorority will not be eligible to apply for recognition for at least two years.

Beta Delta has come up with a way of motivating our members to be involved in a positive way. We have created the Phoenix Club which will be honored by a free dinner, a Phoenix Club T-Shirt and a gathering of all the inductees and their dates.

The following lists the requirements for being inducted into the club:

- 1. 3 points per meeting with a minimum of 36 points.
- 2. 4 points per service project with a minimum of 12 points.
- 3. 10 points for attendance at 75% of fundraisers or 5 points for attendance at 50%.
- 4. 10 points for paying dues on time.
- 5. 2 points for each intramurals sport played with a minimum of 14 points, pending participation in 80% of the scheduled games.
- 6. 10 points for attendance at pledge ceremony and initiation.
