
GAMMA ZETA WINS CAMPUS AWARDS

IT PAYS TO TAKE ACTION

Fraternities at the University of Illinois recently came under fire in a task force report detailing the frequency of date rape on campus.

Fortunately the IFC leadership was one step ahead of Greek bashers on campus and had prepared a strong offensive stand in wake of the damaging findings of the report.

The December President's Council legislation which banned kegs from the 52 fraternity houses and dismantled all remaining little sister programs not only salvaged the fraternities' reputation, but demonstrated the effectiveness of IFC leadership in addressing hot issues.

"NO PLEDGING" UPDATE

The 59 member fraternities of the National Interfraternity Conference continue to review their member and education programs. Zeta Beta Tau and Tau Kappa Epsilon have chosen the alternative of eliminating pledging.

TKE chapters have until September 1, 1991, to achieve full implementation of the Membership Development Program on their respective campuses. "About ten percent of our chapters and colonies have already fully adopted the new program," according to TKE's Director of Chapter Services, Charles J. Trabold. "And another 40% to 50% are involved in various stages of implementation."

As a result of the education and information TKE members received at seven Regional Leadership Conferences held during February, TKE officials expect to have 80% of their chapters using the new program when school starts next fall.

TKE chapters using the new program are initiating new members within two weeks of acceptance as members of the Fraternity. All chapter members participate in an on-going Membership Development Program which includes three specific achievement levels. All members are expected to achieve these levels of activity in order to maintain active membership in the Fraternity.

ZBT chapters initiate new members within two days of the offer and acceptance of membership but only after the new members are advised of and have agreed to abide by the Minimum Membership Standards of ZBT.

ZBT's Minimum Membership standards are taken from the "Basic Expectations" statement of the National Interfraternity Conference's Values and Ethics Commission and cover such topics as academic integrity, human dignity, and personal responsibility.

To promote and reward achievement over and above its Minimum Membership Standards, ZBT has created "The Six Orders," an honors program based on individual achievement in the areas of academics, community service, and service to the fraternity. Individual members may achieve the ascending Orders of Service, Charity, Truth, Justice, Wisdom, and Brotherhood.

The six Orders are not designed as differing levels of membership, but as a merit system to honor and reward those brothers that achieve over and above the Fraternity's minimum expectations.

A semi-annual brothers' review is conducted in all chapters. Although chapters are finding it difficult to expel members in this initial review, the process shows potential for increasing expectations of members. For most chapters, actions of active members had never been questioned.

Rush and initiations are strong and ahead of last year. Non-complying chapters have been closed and members have been expelled.

POSITION STATEMENT ON HUMAN DIGNITY

- WHEREAS, Alpha Sigma Phi is the fraternity "TO BETTER THE MAN" and all of her functions and actions should exhibit this as listed in our Code of Conduct, and
- WHEREAS, every human being deserves to be treated with dignity and not harassed, tormented, abused or violated by another human being, and
- WHEREAS, our fraternity's Code of Conduct states that each member "will respect the dignity of all persons, and therefore, I will not physically, psychologically or sexually abuse any human being," and
- WHEREAS, we instill the principles of diligence, honor, integrity, virtue, duty and respect for human dignity.

THEREFORE

- BE IT RESOLVED, that all chapters, colonies and alumni organizations follow the Code of Conduct and educate our membership on the value of each person.
- BE IT RESOLVED, that there is no place in our fraternity for those who think anyone should be treated as a sub-human or a lower class citizen.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Grand Council of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity that it is the position of our fraternity that everyone should be treated with dignity and respected for their individual rights and principles.
