ALPHA SIGS INITIATED INTO OMICRON DELTA KAPPA

Dr. Eldridge W. Roark, Jr., president of Omicron Delta Kappa (ODK), The National Leadership Honor Society, announced that 1788 members of 74 sororities and fraternities were initiated into ODK during the 1989-90 academic year, as of May 18, 1990.

The Alpha Sigs who were intiated are: William Stanley Ottinger, Presbyterian College; Gregory Laign Locke, Radford University; and Erik K. Buckstad, Thomas R. Hinsch, and Mark C. Van Schaick, SUNY-Plattsburgh.

Omicron Delta Kappa brings together members of the faculty and student body who are of high academic caliber and who have shown considerable leadership skills. Membership honors the undergraduate women and men who are in the top 35% of their class academically and who show leadership in one or more of the five extracurricular activities: scholarship; athletics; social, service, and religious activities, and campus government; journalism, speech, and the mass media; creative and performing arts.

Unlike an "honorary," a membership into the honor society demands further leadership on the part of its members whether they be initiated as undergraduates, faculty/administration, alumni, or "honoris causa." Each category recognizes those men and women who have achieved at a high level within their community or nationally.

Located on 215 campuses throughout the United States, Omicron Delta Kappa has over 141,000 members.

Chapter Leadership Consultant Owen McCulloch also visited with Phi Theta Colony at SUNY-Binghamton from September 9-12. He reported that this Colony was very similar to SUNY-Buffalo and he expected them to also submit a petition for spring chartering.

Owen also visited with our Delaware Interest Group from September 16-19. While he has yet to make a report, our Grand Province Chief reports this group is ready for colonization and <u>early</u> chartering. Our only hold-up at the University of Delaware is IFC recognition.
