WHY JOIN A FRATERNITY? WHAT IS OUR MESSAGE?

Our message is friendship. Knowing, liking, trusting, and doing good things for other people. It's as fresh as the new initiate who claims, "My brothers are my best friends."

And it's as timeless as the alumnus who says years after graduation, "My best friends are still my fraternity brothers."

Yes, friendship is our message.

However, let me tell you that the membership marketing gurus would probably declare such a recruiting message as quaint, certainly insufficient. They would urge a recruiting message that portrays a supermarket of programs, services, and opportunities. If we were to follow their advice, our message--the message of fraternity would not be friendship, but would sound something like this:

Fraternity is the omnibus organization for the success-oriented student. It provides: room and boarding facilities, social programming, philanthropic endeavors, athletic competition, leadership and managerial training, alumni networking; and several intangibles like: pride, companionship, and personal growth.

But the message of fraternity is not a menu of goods and services. Such goods and services are collateral benefits, but in most of our history, the reason people have joined fraternities is for friendship.

To put it another way, "People join people and a good fraternity too."

It's not the product stuff; it's the people stuff that counts.

The message of fraternity is friendship.

Oh, I'm also aware that simple friendship won't cut it with many of the folks who have a social agenda for fraternities:

- No one will be able to find the word "friendship" in the institution's mission statement.
- Because friendship is issues neutral, its message is probably insufficient to satisfy the forced diversity lobby--friends tend to resist being socially engineered.
- And friendship is thought frivolous by many serious minded faculty and administrators.

 Friendship? "Get serious!" many will say.

• And there are those who say that friendship is the cause of the cover-ups and rationalizations, and indeed, is often, the driving force behind hazing, sexual abuse, and drunkenness, and mayhem.

The social agenda people will say that we will really shoot ourselves in the foot if we ignore these critical issues and settle on a fraternity message of simple friendship.

With all due respects, such friends and adversaries alike, just don't get it.

Gangs masquerading as fraternities should be put out of business, but friends pledged to and practicing mutual support and a better commonwealth are already the foundation of any social agenda.

There should be no confusion about our message. The confusion only comes when we--the people who lead the system--allow gangs to choke the spirit of true friendship out of a chapter.

The message of fraternity is friendship. When our name is attached to anything else, we should take it away.

So why join a fraternity? Let the students answer that question. They are almost always eloquent in their responses.

To do that, allow me to share with you a part of a copy of a letter I recently received from a young man at one of our North Carolina chapters. He writes to his chapter brothers, "I guess what I would really like to say is that my fraternity has been the most influential aspect of my life. I have never made a decision that has affected my whole life in the way that joining our fraternity has...Every member is like a member of my family, well even more than that--a part of me..."

He goes on to make a poignant statement in a time of so many dysfunctional families, "Even though my family has basically broken up and my kin deserted me, I have faith in the fact that my fraternity will be the wood in me to keep my fire burning..." He concludes, "I love you guys."

People join people and a good fraternity too.

So why the decline in our affiliation statistics? List to what the interfraternity spin doctors say:

Our numbers are down because:

- 1. The "drunks" aren't joining anymore. We've been successful in risk management.
- 2. Deferred rush always results in fewer fraternity affiliations and there's a lot more deferred rush.
- 3. Restrictive rush rules are killing us; some IFCs are making it difficult for freshmen to go through the rushing process.
- 4. The media message about fraternities is scaring parents and incoming freshmen away.
- 5. Today's college students are children of the "flower children" who hated fraternities in the late 60s and early 70s and they have passed their prejudice onto their children.
- 6. Enrollments are down, why shouldn't our affiliation numbers follow suit.

And one more, the flip side of the "risk management is working" spin:

7. "King Keg" is dead and undergraduates tell us that "fraternity is not fun anymore."

Well, I'm convinced that a lot of terrific kids are staying away from fraternity because they feel and their parents do as well, that we've lost our way. They have come to believe that we have forgotten about simple friendship: knowing, liking, trusting, and doing good things for people. Instead they believe that we are only interested in those who are only interested in King Keg. That's how we are perceived and that scares them and they stay away.

The 80s distracted us. Giggling all the way to the bank with the initiation receipts, we hardly saw what was happening.

If we are to recapture the initiative, and if we are to meet the membership marketing declines head-on, then we must remember that people join people and a good fraternity too. How do we do it, collectively? Here are some suggestions:

- ✓ First agree on our message and then:
- ✓ Hire a survey/polling outfit to test the opinion of high school students and their parents regarding fraternities.
- ✓ Hire an ad agency to design our message to high school students and their parents.
- ✓ Advertise in high school newspapers.
- ✓ Attend college fairs to promote our message.
- ✓ Speak at high school assemblies.
- ✓ Organize and meet with high school guidance counselors in major cities around the country.
- ✓ Offer a program that can be delivered to local civic clubs.
- ✓ Participate with a significant contribution in freshman orientation programs.
- ✓ Find a way to join the "freshman experience" phenomenon that seems to be sweeping student personnel departments these days.
- ✓ Establish an interfraternal, interorganizational agency with the sole purpose of promoting fraternity membership marketing.
- ✓ Fund it all with a \$1.00 special, annual fee from each fraternity and sorority initiate, the friendship fee.

Let's do it now, today, because tomorrow is too far away!

RISK MANAGEMENT FORUM

QUESTION FROM A DELTA ETA CHAPTER, EAST CAROLINA UNDERGRAKDUATE

- Q. Our chapter house was broken into and I had my CD, stereo and other electronic items stolen. How do I go about filing a claim?
- A. Delta Eta Chapter is not enrolled in the Alpha Sigma Phi property insurance program offered by Alpha Sigma Phi. You have two current options: 1) File a claim against your landlord if your chapter's lease policy allows that recourse. 2) Ask your parents to inquire with their local property insurance carrier and ask if you are covered by a "rider" as a fulltime college student on their policy.

RISK MANAGEMENT FORUM (Cont'd)

LOCK HAVEN CHAPTER QUESTION:

- Q. We are thinking of holding a Spring Carnival, and need some information. If we hold the carnival, will our insurance cover anything that happens to someone during the event?
- A. The "Old Gal" needs more information to respond effectively. We see hundreds of events each year ranging from "Courtesy Patrols" to "Cliff Diving." No insurance covers "anything" that may happen. Effective Risk Management and Event Planning begins with Exposure Analysis. The "Old Gal" suggests you prepare a detailed written outline of the proposed event which can then be reviewed by Advisors, School & Local Officials, Legal and Insurance Representatives for potential Exposures to Claims.
