NATIONAL SERVICE SELECTION DECISION PROCESS GOES TO UNDERGRADUATES

As this issue of the Old Gal Gazette went to the publisher, the National Advisory Committee on Service nearly have materials ready to circulate to the undergraduate chapters who will make the final decision on which national service project we will choose. If you will recall, this national service selection process was mandated by the delegates in attendance at the 1992 National Convention.

By October 21, materials will be in the mail to each of our undergraduate chapters to allow you to make the final decision. Materials to be mailed include:

- * a letter of explanation from Alan Breedlove, committee chairman.
- * a fact sheet and overview of the two finalists.
- * publicity materials provided by the two finalists--including at least one video.
- * an official ballot.

Materials should be shared with the entire chapter. Service should be discussed in a chapter meeting with the consensus of the chapter being used as the chapter's "vote", not the HSP's decision alone!

Ballots will not be counted until November 6, so you will have ample time to have the view the materials, have discussions and make a collective decision. When your ballot is returned, we would hope that you would return the video(s)--we are dealing with public charities with limited resources!

Many of our chapters conduct successful service and fundraising events for a variety of charities, and it is our hope that they will continue with these efforts. In fact, we have designed a new awards structure to promote and recognize these often heroic endeavors. It is our goal to enhance these efforts by encouraging your chapter to conduct at least one program each year for our adopted charity. Just imagine the impact Alpha Sigma Phi could have if all 53 chapters, with our 1,300 undergraduates and 25,000 alumni, focused their energy and talents on one charity! This is a momentous and historic opportunity that you have before you. We are confident that this issue will receive your serious consideration.

WHY DRINK RESPONSIBLY?

"A study, recently released by the American Council for Drug Education, reports that:

- 93.6% of college students have used alcohol in their lifetimes.
- Almost 4% of the college population drinks daily.
- Over 430 million gallons of alcoholic beverages are consumed by college students each year.
- Two-thirds of all college/university presidents consider alcohol abuse to be a "moderate" or "major" problem on campus.
- 100% of all college/university presidents said alcohol abuse is the top healthcare problem on campus.
- Between 240,000 and 360,000 college students will eventually die from alcohol-related causes.
- 62% of campus violations are alcohol-related.
- 68% of residence hall damages are alcohol-related.
- 85% of sexual assaults are alcohol-related.

NATIONAL NEWS (Cont'd)

- 70% of discipline referrals are alcohol-related.
- 50% of suicides are alcohol-related.
- 38% of male and 20% of female binge drinkers felt alcohol use affected their ability to keep up with their schoolwork.
- 50% of male and 14% of female students cited alcohol as the reason they missed class.
- 81% of male and 44% of female students admitted doing something regrettable while drunk.
