GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF LOYOLA

HISTORY:


Loyola University was founded as Saint Ignatius College in the Fall of 1869 by the Jesuit Fathers of the Society of Jesus. (Other Jesuit institutions in this country include Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., Boston College, Fordham University in New York City, John Carroll University in Cleveland, and Marquette University in Milwaukee, among many others.) Classes were started at the present Lake Shore Campus (6525 North Sheridan Road) in 1911. In 1922 the departments of Saint Ignatius College and Loyola University were merged into the present College of Arts and Sciences. A school of theology was opened as another branch of the University in 1934 at West Baden, Indiana, for the education of Jesuit scholars. In the Fall of 1946, classes were opened in a sky-scraper donated by Frank J. Lewis (known today as Lewis Towers.) The building is located at 810 North Michigan Avenue. In April of 1964, the West Baden site was North Aurora, Illinois, and renamed the Bellarmine scholl of Theology.

The Lake Shore Campus is today the main College of Arts and Sciences and of the school of Nursing. Business is taught



at Lewis Towers, along with the necessary Arts courses, and these three schools make up the undergraduate student body of Loyola.

Five years ago, classes at Lake Shore were conducted in two aged brick buildings, Dumbach and Cudahy halls which comprised the University in 1911. To these two has been added a modern, ten-story science building called Damen Hall, in which virtually all courses except Theology and Philosophy are now taught. The University is at present more than doubling the capacity of the Cudahy Memorial Library, and is building a seventeen story men's dormatory. The present men's dorm, Campion Hall, houses 360 students. It will be converted into a women's dorm when the new building is completed. Other dormatory space is at present restricted to several converted and leased apartmen t buildings. The remainder of the Lake Shore plant includes Madonna della Strada Chap/al, The Jesuit Faculty Home and Administration building, the Gymnasium, and the Campus Center.





Fraternities found their way onto the campuses of Loyola University in 1920. At this time Loyola was a small university and few national fraternities were interested in colonizing there. The fraternities founded on campus at that time were all locals. Most of them had their origin in groups of friends from the same high school who solidified their friendships into brotherhoods upon entering Loyola or from groups of men that founded groups for a common cause.

The first fraternity was Phi Mu Chi which later split, forming Pi Alpha Lamda. Phi Mu Chi later went national with Sigma Pi Fraternity. Pi Alpha Lamda went on to become the best and largest fraterity of the '50's. They were solely responsible for the building of Loyola's chapel.

The Tau Kappa Epsilon Chapter was formed from the Uniwersity Club in 1955.

Delta Sigma Phi was founded at the Lake Shore Campus in 1958.

Alpha Delta Gamma National Catholic Fraternity was founded at Loyola in 1924. From here they spread to fourteen other schools.

Until 1957 physical hazing was the method used for pledging. At that time a group of R.O.T.C. cadets, believing that there must be a better way to pledge, formed their own.



fraternity, stressed a mental type of pledge program, and called themselves Sigma Delta Phi. This brought about a profound change in the fraternity system at Loyola; most of the fraternities followed the example of Sigma Delta Phi and changed over from a physically rigorous to a psychologically rigorous program.

The Greek system has been growing stronger since 1929 when Interfraternity Council was founded. This growth was halted for a time during World War II when Greeks all but disappeared from campus life; the Greek system endured, however, and has been growing larger and powerfully influential ewer since.

At present there are seven hundred Greeks at Loyola in ten fraternities and six sororities.

With the exception of the student gowernment, the I. F. C. is the most powerful of the approximately hundred and twenty organizations in the school and the Greeks dominate the leader-ship of ewery facet of student life.

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Alpha Sigma Phi.

As a report on the stat s of the Greek Fraternity system at Loyola University, I'm ha py to relate a few pertinent facts.

of the 11 active Frater ities on this campus, 8 are social, and of these, 5 own their own House. Aside from independent organizations, the Greeks has e organized, and run, the Homecoming Christmas, and Spring festivels for the past 10 years. As a recent example, Loyola's "Christmas in Camelot" was solely successful by the efforts of the Greeks on campus. Specifically, of the 8 awards given for the different activities through the weekend, 7 were awarded to the Greek letter societies. Loyola has a unique position, in that 80% of its student body is composed of commuter students. This percentage is subject to a radical change due to a recent construction of University buildings, in particular, a 19 story Mens Borm residence; therefore opening the field for further Hush.

The Greeks are to be found in every facet of University life. They are not only on the Basketball team, Track team, Soccer team, Swimming team but also run the Student Nev spaper, Student Government, Honor Societies, Academic Societies, and Dorm Councils. The Greek system, to put it mildly, has grown leaps and bounds in the past year and a half, and also shows indications of growing greater still. It is almost do bled its membership since 1965, as evidenced by the larger and larger please classes. The larger raternities have a member hip between 75 and 100 members.

Due to its size, Loyola is considered a small University. This may be the reason that many of the large Nationals have not colonized here. However, due to the growth of the Greek system, felt not only on this campus, but through out the Midwest through I. F. C. Conventions, Loyola has been aining a reputation of being a strong Greek campus. I feel t at Loyola will no longer be ignored by the large National, because they will see the value of this "virgin territory." The Greek System at Loyola is influential, if not completely incrumental, in all the extracurricular activities on the Universital evel.

In late 1957, a small group of Loyola University students decided to form a new fraternity. The reasons which led them to this decision have remained as the basic purposes of Sigma Delta Phi. As formulated in the Constitution, these reasons are four:

"To unite a body of men into a living creed upon whose continuous achievements rests the foundation of the future; to benefit its Brothers academically, morally, and physically, as well as socially; to be led by principle, rather than be governed by special interests; and to promote brotherly love and advancements among its brothers."

It was with these purposes in mind that Sigma Delta Phi fraternity was established at Loyola University on January 2, 1958. On that day a Constitution was passed, officers were elected, and a social activity program was begun. From June, 1958 until June, 1959, the fraternity was in a probationary status. At that time, it was recognized as an approved organization of the University, granted a charter, and accepted as a full member of the Interfraternity Council.

After the first five months of its existence, Sigma Delta Thi numbered forty active mon. The cental elements which attracted these new brothers were the uniqueness which characterized the fraternity; the policy of moderate cost to the Brother, and the absence of physical hazing, which was supplanted by a



program of "mental hazing" designed to develop the pledge through a constructive pledge program.

The new fraternity naturally encountered many problems in its earlier years, both in organization and in growth. However, the progressive attitude given to it by its founding fathers helped overcome these and eventually brought notice from the University community. Sigma Delta Phi's most important contribution to the school in its beginning years was the idea it originated for Greek Week. The concept was adopted by the Interfraternity Council and has remained as an outstanding display of interfraternity co-operation. A few years later, Sigma Delta Phi originated Loyola's Garrigan Historical Film Series. In 1960, Sigma Delta Phi was awarded the Blue Key for Social Activity, and in 1963 it was named Loyola's organization of the Year. From 1963 to 1966, Sigma Delta Phi won the interfraternity sing without a miss.

why a fraternity?

The Fraternity system is as old as the United States. In 1776 Phi Beta Kappa, the first college fraternity was organized. Originally established as a social and fraternal order, it was the foundation of the present fraternity system.

As pointed out in the opening quotes, fraternities are characterized by that certain group of traits, the intangibles, which distinguish it from clubs or other similar organizations. It is these traits which provide the best reasons for pledging a fraternity. The most important would probably be the following five:

- 1 Fraternities give their members a sense of belonging.
- 2 Fraternities develop leadership in their members.
- 3 Fraternities develop citizenship.
- 4 Fraternities encourage scholarship.
- 5 Fraternities increase the chance of graduating.

A Sense of Belonging

The first thing the college fraternity does for its members is offer that feeling of belonging, which is essential for all college students but especially for the incoming freshman. By becoming a part of a closely knit group that takes a definite interest in his activities, he is more easily able to cope with the abrupt change that college suddenly presents to him. At the same time, each member is forming friendships that will last throughout his life.

Leadership Each fraternity offers its members the op-

portunity to learn to accept responsibility, to make decisions and to carry out worthwhile programs requiring careful planning. College activities are more often than not headed by fraternity men. By directing the affairs of a small group, the fraternity, an individual cannot help but gain the self confidence which could bring him even bigger opportunities. "Fraternities provide leadership training and practical application in competitive situations similar to those in the business world," says H. C. Mueller, President, Powers Regulator

Company. "In giving opportunity for experience in organization, cooperation and management they prepare individuals for future responsibilities."

Citizenship

An important part of every college fraternity is being a good citizen to the community in which they exist. A good example of this might be the replacement of the pre-initiation Hell Week by constructive group efforts now known as Help Week by many college fraternities. Many chapters also run charity drives or other fund raising events for various institutions. Working together in this civic-minded attitude is one reason why such a high proportion of members win places of importance in civic and national affairs. Over 200 members of Congress (68 Senators and 146 Representatives) belong to college fraternities.

Encourages Scholarship

A recent survey of fraternity pledges at the University of Illinois showed that nearly three-fourths (73.8%) chose scholarship as their most important motive for pledging. The fraternity is vitally concerned with the scholastic endeavors of its members. Advice and counsel is forthcoming from those older brothers who are especially capable in providing mature assistance. Programs of various sorts aid and encourage members to put forth their best efforts at study. It is a fact that more than half of all fraternity chapters are above the All-Men's Average in institutions reporting to the National Interfraternity Conference. Acceptance for membership in a fraternity is conditional upon scholastic achievement, and in this way there is more incentive placed upon the prospective pledge to establish diligent study habits.

Increases Chances of Graduation

Naturally every student entering college plans on graduating and earning his degree. However, a certain proportion must drop out, or be forced out by poor grades. According to a U.S. Government study (HEW Bulletin No. 1958-1), a student's chance of graduation will definitely increase if he pledges a fraternity. The survey showed that members of fraternities and sororities had a record of 59 percent in "persistence to graduation" as

against only 47 percent for non-members. The explanation comes from the encouragement for better scholarship coupled with the bonds of friendship and mutual interest shared in a college fraternity.

Fraternities obviously have more to them than their "intangible" side. They are undoubtedly recognized as the greatest socializing force today on our country's campuses. Some of the more tangible advantages, then, to fraternity membership might be that a fraternity tends to:

- 1. Encourage the individual to participate in all types of activity, e.g., social, spiritual, etc.
- 2. Provide smaller units of group housing.
- Develop a greater sense of loyalty to the college.
- 4. Promote group self-government.
- 5. Provide an opportunity for participating in campus politics.
- 6. Provide opportunities to participate in the business and management activities of running the fraternity house.
- 7. Develop one socially.
- 8. Develop lasting friendships.
- 9. Provide an outlet for use of leisure time.

The Responsibilities of Membership

Attainment of membership in a fraternity is in itself of no real significance. What is essentially noteworthy is what you do for others and for yourself while in the fraternity. Note, the purpose for which you and your prospective fraternity brothers have come to college is primarily academic. Your main job at the University is to study and learn. As a fraternity man, you will still have this basic responsibility.

As a member of a group you will be constantly assessed by non-members. Their assessments will not be confined to you, but will be associated with your entire group. The image you convey will be considered a reflection of the group; hence, as a brother, you will have a responsibility to convey a favorable impression of the fraternity.

You will have a responsibility to each of your fellow brothers, in that you must cooperate with them harmoniously. In doing so you will help them, and yourself, to advance toward that sense of human dignity and mutual obligation which is characteristic of every really great man.

Perhaps, one of your greatest responsibilities is to yourself, to develop a wholesome and forceful personality. In addition, you are seriously indebted to the generosity of those who have made possible your attendance at

college. Your scholastic efforts are appraised by these persons, and you are obliged to produce academically according to your potential. Your membership in a fraternity will increase your awareness of these responsibil-

ities.

Why Sigma Delta Phi?

In late 1957, a small group of Loyola University students decided to form a new fraternity. The reasons which led them to this decision have remained as the basic purposes of Sigma Delta Phi. As formulated in the Constitution, these reasons are four:

"To unite a body of men into a living creed upon whose continuous achievements rests the foundation for the future; to benefit its Brothers academically, morally, and physically, as well as socially; to be led by principle, rather than be governed by special interests; and to promote brotherly love and advancements among its Brothers."

It was with these purposes in mind that Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity was established at Loyola University on January 2nd, 1958. On that day a Constitution was passed, officers were elected, and a social activity program was begun. From June, 1958 until June, 1959, the Fraternity was in a probationary status. At that time, it was recognized as an approved organization of the University, granted a charter, and accepted as a full member of the Interfraternity Council.

After the first five months of its existence, Sigma Delta Phi numbered forty active men. The central elements which attracted these new brothers were the uniqueness which characterized the fraternity; the policy of moderate cost to the Brother, and the absence of physical hazing, which was supplanted by a program of 'mental hazing' designed to develop the pledge through a constructive pledge program.

The new fraternity naturally encountered many problems in its earlier years, both in organization and in growth. However, the progressive attitude given to it by its founding fathers helped overcome these and eventually brought notice from the University community. Sigma Delta Phi's most important contribution to the school in its beginning years was the idea it originated for Greek Week. The concept was adopted by the Interfraternity Council and has remained as an outstanding display of interfraternity cooperation. A few years later, Sigma Delta Phi originated Loyola's Garrigan Historical Film series. In 1960, Sigma Delta Phi was awarded the Blue Key for Social Activity, and in 1963 it was named Loyola's Organization of the Year. From 1963 to 1966, Sigma Delta Phi won the Interfraternity Sing without a miss.

Sigma Delta Phi Today

Now, after more than ten years of existence, the Fraternity consists of more than seventy-five active brothers, yet neither its uniqueness nor its policies concerning finances and pledging have changed. Since its founding, the financial responsibility of the

Brother has remained unchanged, and Sigma Delta Phi is still undoubtedly the most economical to belong to of Loyola's ten fraternities. As far as its pledge program goes, Sigma Delta Phi still adheres to its strict policy of no physical hazing. The fraternity feels that it can much more effectively develop and educate a pledge through the use of a mental pledge program rather than a physical one. Another example of its progressive attitude is its recent addition of a pre-induction Help Week to its pledge program. During the week before pledging ends, the pledges travel to some institution, such as a parish or school, to volunteer the services and work in any way that might be needed. Last semester's pledge class spent their Help Week cleaning the grounds and buildings of St. Martin's Parish on Chicago's south side.

Like any other fraternity, Sigma Dela Phi endeavors to develop leadership in its brothers, in this way both bettering themselves and the community in which they operate, both civic and university. Sigma Delta Phi's success in this department can be seen by observing the accomplishments of its Brothers in the past year alone. As far as Student

Government goes, the fraternity was wellrepresented. In the Arts Council, Sigma Delts held the offices of President, Treasurer, Chairman of the Student Duplicating Service, Editor of the Student Council Communique, and the Nursing Council Representative. In the school of Business Administration, the positions of secretary and treasurer of the Sophomore Class were filled by Sigma Delts. In the Tri-Council, a confederation of the councils from each of three colleges, two out of six delegates as well as the chairman were all Sigma Delts. The recently adopted Loyola Student Government Association was written and founded by a brother. The first elections saw Sigma Delts elected as the Senior Class President and as one of the Junior Class Vice Presidents. The Student Activities Board of Loyola has Sigma Delts as two of its ten representatives.

For two successive terms, the Interfraternity Council had for its President a Sigma Delt, followed this year by Sigma Delta Phi gaining two of the other five elective offices: Vice-President and Student Activities Board Delegate. The constitution foundation of the Independent Board, a council of all the vari-

ous extra-curricular clubs on campus, was drawn and laid by a Sigma Delt, who also served as the Board's Vice-Chairman. As far as the clubs in the Independent Board go. Sigma Delts have held the offices of: President of the Young Republicans, President of the Fine Arts Club, Layout Editor of the Yearbook, Vice-President and Treasurer of the Conservative Club, Vice-President and Alumni Secretary of the Blue Key National Honor Fraternity, and Treasurer and Secretary of the Military organization Scabbard and Blade. As far as relations with the sororities on campus go, two of the last three Kappa Knights were Sigma Delts, as well as last vear's Sweetheart of Phi Mu.

Sigma Delts are also found in community activities. Besides the Help Week policy mentioned above, Sigma Delts run annual fundraising drives and dances for various charities as well as collections such as the recent "Christmas in July" project.

The Fraternity House

The Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity House, located at 1062 W. Columbia, three blocks north of campus, is the center of the fraternity's

operations. The three-story brick building provides a meeting place for the Brothers as well as providing housing for about twenty-five of them. The house is also the center of social activity, being the scene of several informal parties a semester. Other than this, the Fraternity's social program also includes an annual formal, several off-campus parties, one or two mixers at the Campus Center, and many other activities such as hayrides, beach parties, road rallies, etc. On the spiritual side, there is an annual retreat held at the fraternity house.

Athletics

Athletically, Sigma Delta Phi participates in all of the school's intramural programs: football, basketball, and softball; as well as in all of the Greek Week Games: track, swimming, handball, and chariot racing. The Fraternity has several athletic prizes in its trophy case, their biggest victory coming in last semester's exciting Greek Week Track Meet, when they edged out an exciting 35-33 win over the runner-up team. Besides athletics, Sigma Delta Phi also competes against other University organizations in several other contests each year; for example, Pow-Wow

Weekend, Homecoming, the Miss Loyola Contest, the Variety Show, and University Weekend. By their participation in all these various endeavors, Sigma Delta Phi is constantly striving to satisfy the varied interests of all its Brothers.

Alumni Chapter

The Alumni Chapter of Sigma Delta Phi was founded to foster the growth and development of the active chapter and to provide social activity for the Alumni Brothers. The formerly active Brothers, as alumni, are in a position to advise and counsel the younger Brothers.

The Chapter helps to continue the ideals of Brotherhood through one's entire life. The friendships formed in the undergraduate years are not allowed to fall aside and wither; instead, these bonds are made stronger through frequent gatherings, at which the alumni continually strive to sustain these relationships.

The Alumni Brothers also form the board of directors and serve as the officers of the Sigma Delta Phi House Corporation, which manages the Fraternity House. Their experience in this area has proved to be of great

value to the active chapter.

The Chapter also serves to enlarge contacts in the business world. By having a closely-knit alumni organization, the Fraternity, both active and alumni, is able to communicate with a diversified number of fields, which yield a wide variety of job opportunities. Later in life, these contacts may prove invaluable.


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
