MORRIS HARVEY COLLEGE

Morris Harvey College has sixty-seven years of service and, during the last two decades, it has grown from a small rural college to become West Virginia's third largest institution of higher education, and the formost private college in the state.

From its inception in 1888 until 1935 it was located at Barboursville and was operated under the direction of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

The turning point in the history of the College came in the summer of 1935 when Morris Harvey moved from the small community of Barbours-ville to Charleston and established temporary headquarters in the Karawha County Public Library Building, formerly as an annex to the Old State Capitol. Factors entering into its subsequent growth include the absorption in 1939 of Kanawha Junior College, the removal in the summer of 1947 to the permanent campus at South Ruffner, and completion of its new plant in 1951.

The College, founded upon Christian principles, was organized in 1888 as the Barboursville Seminary. The following year it was placed under control of the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and its name was changed to Barboursville College.

Degrees in education, literature, arts, and science were conferred until the opening of the term in 1910. At that time due to a charge in

educational requirements by the State Board of Education and a larger endowment demanded by the General Board of Education of the Church, the institution became a junior college, and so existed until 1919, when it was raised to senior college rank, and in 1921 a class was again graduated with degrees in arts and science. The degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Eachelor of Science have been conferred since that time to the present. In 1937, arrangements were completed for the curricula leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education and Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education. In 1942, curricula leading to the degree of Bachelor of Music was added, and, in 1946, curricula leading to the degree of Eachelor of Business Administration was introduced. By the fall of 1948, the College was offering the Fachelor of Music degree with a major in music education, applied music, or theoretical music, and the Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in music. In 1951, the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education replaced the degrees in Elementary and Secondary Education. In 1956, the Faculty and administration of the College agreed to discontinue granting the Associate in Arts certificate and all degrees except the Bachelor of Arts and the Bachelor of Science.

In 1935, the Charleston Educational Center, Inc., a local corporation, invited Morris Harvey College to become a unit of a higher educational project to be undertaken in this city. The Board of Trustees

of the College authorized the acceptance of the invitation at such time as the corporation might be ready to receive its facilities. Early in July, 1935, the Charleston Educational Center offered to provide temporary quarters for the institution in Charleston for the school year of 1935-36 if immediate occupancy could be effected. Thereupon, the Western Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in session at Barboursville on July 12, 1935, approved the removal of the College to the State Capital for the beginning of the school year of 1935-36.

After the unification of the Methodist Churches, Morris Harvey College was operated by the West Virginia Conference of the Methodist Church until August 1, 1941, when, prusuant to action taken by this conference on September 26, 1941, the College became an independent Christian institution—cooperating with all churches, controlled by none. Now, wilties mate authority rests with the self-perpetuating board of trustees. It operates under the revised charter of 1950, which gives it power commensurate with its responsibility.

The climax of Morris Harvey's recent history was the dramatic transfer in September, 1947, of all personnel, records, and tangible and intangible properties to the south bank of the Kanawha River opposite the State Capitol where the College is now housed in a modern air-conditioned plant.

In 1956, the Mason College of Music and Fine Arts surrendered its charter, and discontinued its operation. In order to preserve and keep

alive the cultural contributions made by Mason College during the preceding half-century, Morris Harvey agreed to preserve and service the student records of Mason College. In return, Morris Harvey acquired the music library and some of the music equipment of Mason College.

Since 1956, much has been accomplished by Morris Harvey College. These accomplishments include the completion of a new women's dormitory of the most modern design, the completion of a new wing of the main building housing the most modern facilities for education, and the present construction of a new men's dormitory much like the women's dormitory just completed.

The last major event of Morris Harvey's contemporary history is the realization of complete and full accreditation by the North Central Association thus making Morris Harvey a fully accreditated institution of higher learning.

MORRIS HARVEY COLLEGE

Recognition: Morris Harvey College is accredited by the State Board of Education of West Virginia and by West Virginia University. Graduates and former students are being admitted constantly to leading colleges and universities of the country. The records achieved by the alumni in graduate study and in their chosen vocations justify the recognition accorded to Morris Harvey as an institution of higher learning.

In the fall of 1951 the West Virginia State Committee of the Commission on Secondary Schools of the North Central Association approved Morris Harvey College for the training of teachers to teach in West Virginia High Schools holding membership in the North Central Association.

And finally on March 28, 1958 the North Central Association gave Morris Harvey College full and complete accreditation as an institution of higher learning thus permitting Morris Harvey to become a member of the association.

MORRIS HARVEY COLLEGE

Facilities: Morris Harvey College is situated on the south side of the Great Kanawha River opposite the State Capitol building in Charleston, the capital city of West Virginia, Charleston, with its population of over 100,000, is the industrial, civic, business, and cultural center of West Virginia.

The main hub of activity on the campus is centered around the main building. The entire college, with the exception of the gymnasium, and the residence halls, is housed in the main building unit, designed as "seven buildings in one" and located on the east end of the campus. This new fireproof unit is modern in every respect, including sound-proofing and year round air-conditioning. The building includes twenty-nine classrooms and lecture halls, five biology, chemistry, and physics laboratories and several smaller laboratories, a library, snack bar, bookstore, lounges, a chapel, administrative and faculty offices, a reception hall, cafeteria, art rooms, and an auditorium with a full-size stage and a seating capacity of one thousand. This new unit was financed by gifts totaling almost three million dollars. The main building unit is in itself a little city.

The gymnasium will seat comfortably more than 3,000 persons for basketball games and other functions.

The cafeteria is located in the main building. Hot meals are served regularly and the cafeteria is available for dinners and banquets. The student union is located adjacent to the bookstore in the new main unit.

The new, modern dormitory for women houses one hundred and eight students and has an impressive lounge where guests can be met and entertained. In addition to the older men's residence hall, a new men's dormitory was opened this fall to accommodate the ever growing number of students attending Morris Harvey College.



SIGMA DELTA PHI FRATERNITY

The Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity is one of seven Greek letter organizations at Morris Harvey College. There are four sororities and three fraternities which are governed by the Greek Government Association. The youngest of these organizations is the Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity which was as of January 2, 1959 only nine years old. It is also respected and accepted as the most active Greek letter organization on campus.

The fra ternity colors are scarlet and stone; the fraternity flower is the American Red Rose; the fraternity song is " In Sigma Delta Phi,"; and, the fraternity creed is represented by and in the "Six Cardinal Principles". The majority of the fraternity members are from the general Charleston area and therefore the fraternity has not as yet a fraternity house. The fraternity is governed by a constitution.

The fraternity advisor is Professor Luther Koontz. The charter president is Mr. Thomas Miller. There are six traditional social functions and numerous others. The work of the fraternity is done mainly by committees. The dues are \$20.00 per semester for activies and \$10.00 per semester for those in the inactive status. The initation fee is \$20.00. The fraternity has a thirty day pledge program. The fraternity each year selects a sweatheart. The fraternity has regular meetings held in accordance with the policy of the college. It has both elected and appointed officers.

At the end of each year an award is given to the brother voted by the fraternity to be the most outstanding brother of the year. The award is given in memory of our deceased brother, Garry Keener.

The Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity is primarily a social organ-

ization created for the benefit of the members therein. However it has objectives other than social activities. These objectives can be summed up in the "Six Cardinal Principles" of the fraternity.

- I. Good Sportsmanship
- II. Good Citizenship
- III. Good Scholarship
- IV. Honesty
- V. Loyalty
- VI. Brotherhood

The Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity does not have a very lengthly history due to its recent organization.

Sigma Delta Phi was born when twenty one students enrolled at Morris Harvey College and not desiring to pledge any of the existing organizations, decided to form a like organization of their own. This idea was carried out and completed on January 2, 1950 when they received their charter. The Alpha Sigma Phi Alumni were of great help in starting this organization and getting it on its feet.

Since then this organization has grown into one of the most active, and one of the largest and most selective organizations on the campus. Such a tremendous growth as has been achieved by Sigma Delta Phi has been through the untiring efforts of all who have been affiliated with the fraternity since its inception.

There are four classifications of members in the Sigma

Delta Phi Fraternity. No member may be in more than one at any
given time although he may change classification at any time.

The four classifications are:

- 1. Pledge
- 2. Active
- 3. Inactive
- 4. Alumni

A student's first connection with the fraternity is that of a pledge. The requirements that must be met in order to fulfill the classifications are as follows. The student must be of good, sound character and be enrolled at Morris Harvey College for at least 12 semester hours and have already completed 12 semester hours with at least a "C" average for all work. His name must have been submitted to the fraternity in writing by an active member and have been considered by the pledging committee and approved by the fraternity. He must, of course, have received a bid and accepted it.

After having been granted pledge status he must complete both formal and informal initiation. First, he must go through a thirty day program of informal initiation of which one week is "Hell Week" and the remainder is the education period during which the pledge learns the basic fundamentals of the fraternity. The formal initiation is completed when the pledge has satisfied all of the fraternity and college requirements concerning grades and behavior and receives his pin and thus becomes an active brother of the fraternity.

Upon completion of the fromal initiation the pledge as an active member of the fraternity is introduced to the more secret facts of fraternal brotherhood in Sigma Delta Phi. Once he has become a brother it is his duty to act in such a manner that he be a credit to the fraternity.

The inactive status is in effect when the active falls behind in his dues, leaves college, or for some reason cannot meet
the requirements of being an active brother of the fraternity.
An active can become inactive of his own will or the fraternity
can force him to assume that status.

If a pledge does not make his grades he may be carried by the fraternity for three semesters in an inactive status.

The alumnus is of course an active who has graduated and is a member in good standing of the alumni association and who may still receive many of the benefits of the fraternity.

Sigma Delta Phi is governed by a democratic constitution which was written and approved on January 2, 1950 with the founding of the fraternity, and which was later revised and approved on September 30, 1957.

The fraternity has regular meetings each Monday and special meetings may be called by the president when the need arises and when school is recessed during the summer. The parlimentary procedure used at the meeting is based on Roberts Rules of Order Revised. A quorum at any meeting consist of fifty one per cent of active membership.
