Dear Chuck and Ralph,

This morning I sent an airmail letter to you and in the copy of that letter that went to the national office I enclosed the deposit of \$100 from Kappa Sigma Phi. This letter and the copy of the petition will not be sent by airmail but I hope that those who are to vote on the petition according to instructions from Ralph Burns, will do so just as promptly as possible. One copy of the petition is going to each member of the Grand Council and in addition one copy is going to Brothers Blackburn, Witt and Sturgis according to instructions given me on the telephone on May 19 by Ralph Burns.

It is true that the actual installation of a chapter cannot be completed until after a prescribed waiting period and until after the consent is given by the college administration which will bring us up to around March 1, 1961 before the installation can be made. When you look at the petition and read the last issue for this school year of The State Hornet (May 27) you will note the announcement of the local of El Yuma Chi becoming a colony of Phi Kappa Psi. I am sure that no charter has been signed, because the only item signed was the agreement form with the college on certain stipulations. The same kind of an agreement was drawn up for Kappa Sigma Phi and Alpha Sigma Phi and the college and it was signed by the president of Kappa Sigma Phi on May 20, then signed by Chuck Alvo and on May 31 when it was returned to me the college signed the agreement and I have the original copy to be sent to Ralph Burns shortly. It is presumed that our 9 months waiting period starts with May 31. Actually the officers of Kappa Sigma Phi could have gone in for some publicity as an Alpha Sigma Phi affiliate as much as did the organization which will now make the formal petition to Phi Kappa Psi. If the vote of Alpha Sigma Phi is favorable then it would be planned to set up publicity in the first issue of the Hornet next fall. Mention could be made as to the date of acceptance of the petition, for as that goes on I can see where there might be advantage in having the acceptance by Alpha Sigma Phi ahead of some of the other groups who may move slower in having a petition prepared and accepted. The officers of Kappa Sigma Phi did not want to be presumptuous in announcing something before a favorable vote had been recorded. Mr. Robert Ellington, Activities Counselor, had mentioned publicity when I picked up the agreement forms, but then he agreed that it would be much better to wait. It is my considered suggestion that if the vote is favorable that the national office direct a letter to Dean Donald E. Bailey who has a letter of recommendation included in the petition, but the original letter (and two copies) can be sent to me and I will deliver the letter to Dean Bailey. Such a letter can mention the acceptance of the petition and that Alpha Sigma Phi will be awaiting the time when the college gives permission to complete the next step of actually delivering a charter and installing a chapter.

When the Interfraternity Conference at the college published a book which each fall should be read the fall and spring semester which contains the names of each fraternity, dates of origin, colors, etc. In July I will be working with some of the members of Kappa Sigma Phi in working up what should go into the booklet on the page devoted to Kappa Sigma Phi. If the vote is favorable, I myself will take up the matter the latter part of August and the latter part of September and will go to the national convention at Berkeley. We would set up our page for the "Kappa Sigma Phi affiliate" page containing the date of record when Dean Bailey was notified that the vote was favorable. There could very well be other fraternities whose voting process will take longer than our own, so we can gain some advantage. When fall running occurs there may be competitors who could not tell students that they had received the final acceptance as far as the national State City was concerned.

Since the information on each of the members forming the petitioning group was set up, there have been changes. Fred Lissalde was elected secretary and treasurer of the Interfraternity Conference. I have learned of others who will be back in school in the fall, who dropped out for one reason or another. On Sunday I met one of the Kappa Sigma Phi members who graduated in June, 1959. He has now completed one year of law study at the University of San Francisco. He is enthusiastic about alumni coming into the national fraternity if the vote is favorable. He was President of the Associated Students of Sacramento State College from 1958 to 1959, the same highest office which was held 1959 to 1960 by Wally Clark. Thus our petitioning fraternity had Lee Kiam in that office and immediately following Wally Clark gained this same office. I met another very fine member of Kappa Sigma Phi, Roger Chappel who will graduate on June 10. He had one year at the University of Washington and during that year became a member of Delta Tau Delta. He picked Kappa Sigma Phi as his local fraternity when he transferred to Sacramento State for three years of college work. Of course he had to stay out of the petitioning body, but mention is made of this merely to show the good position that Kappa Sigma Phi has ~~occupied~~ occupied and now holds on the campus.

Kappa Sigma Phi would have qualified under all of our pledging rules as they were back in 1956 and before and the group right up to this date including all alumni would qualify under our old setup.

In making frequent visits to the campus I picked up material which might be used in a petition. On the Friday (April 29) before the "open house" of May 1, I picked up several copies of the State Herald but not enough to set up one in each petition. Therefore different copies of the petition have only a few of the 16 pages that went into that issue. The State Herald regularly comes out twice a week and has 16 pages. Because that April 29 issue was a special issue it was increased to 16 pages and is on green paper (the college colors are green and gold). Because some will get all of the 16 pages I will mention that on page 8 it was explained that now there are over 1000 campus affiliates-- the new engineering building is shown and explained on page 14-- on page 9 it is explained that there are now 71 names of laws on the campus, that there are between 1500 and 2000 trees and between 4000 and 6000 shrubs. You will find other interesting articles in the pages included in the jacket at the back of the petition.

SACRAMENTO STATE COLLEGE

History and Background of the College

The California State Legislature enacted a law in June, 1947 establishing "a four-year institution of higher education above the twelfth grade" in the City of Sacramento. Additional legislation in 1949 made the institution a four year state college under the control of the State Board of Education. Thus Sacramento State College joined the ranks of four year college institutions which in the 1959-60 school year were in operation on fourteen different campuses, with additional similar institutions to be added as soon as facilities now under construction at centers of growing population in the state are ready for occupancy. These four year state colleges are separate from the institutions of the University of California operated under the jurisdiction of the Board of Regents of the University of California. Bachelor's degrees for the completion of four-year curriculums and master's degrees for the completion of work in specified fields are given at Sacramento State College. In conjunction with the requirements of the University of California, portions of work for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy can be undertaken at Sacramento State College but this degree in such instances is awarded by the University of California.

Function of the College

The function of the college is to prepare men and women for teaching and other responsible positions of leadership. In carrying out this purpose curriculums are offered in teacher education for both bachelors and masters degrees; and occupational curriculums are offered in various fields including applied science, business, engineering, governmental services, laboratory technology and social service for bachelors degrees and for a masters degree in business administration, public administration, applied life science, applied mathematics and psychology. The completion of the \$1,700,000 new Engineering Building with its \$1,800,000 of equipment for the 1960-61 school year will expand the curriculum of the Engineering Division, for this fall. Pre-professional curriculums are offered in programs of pre-law, pre-medicine, pre-dentistry and pre-ministry. Bachelor's and Master's degrees are given in a wide variety of Liberal Arts subjects.

Accreditation

The college is fully accredited by the Western College Association, which is the association that accredits the colleges and universities in California, Nevada and Hawaii. Credits for Sacramento State College are regularly transferable to other accredited colleges and universities in the United States. In addition the college is accredited for teacher education by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

Campus and Buildings

In the fall of 1947, the college first opened offering work in the junior and senior college grades, as it occupied jointly the campus of Sacramento City college which provided college work for the freshman and sophomore grades. It was not until February, 1953, when Sacramento State College moved to its own 265 acre campus located on the bank of the American River in the City of Sacramento, that the first few freshmen were added. By the fall of 1960 approximately \$22,000,000 will have been expended on buildings and equipment at the new campus. The State Board of Education and the College Administration are assisted in matters pertaining to the area of 17 counties primarily served by Sacramento State College by a Local Advisory Board of eight members one of whom is Earl Lee Kelly an alumnus member of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity of the University of California at Berkeley chapter. This local advisory board was very instrumental in obtaining the campus for Sacramento State College, and holds meetings quarterly in an advisory capacity to the college administration. The five year building program of the college calls for additional buildings as enrollment increases.

Enrollment

The enrollment for the fall 1959-60 semester was 2032 men and 1497 women classed as full time students, total 3529. The total number of people enrolled for study for this same fall semester was over 6,100 and the full time equivalent measurement for all students was in excess of 4400. Many of the students come from the 17 county area primarily served by Sacramento State College, but a considerable number come from other parts of California as well as from other states. At the present time there are almost 100 students enrolled from foreign lands under special visas.

Student Activities

All full time students automatically become members of the Associated Students of Sacramento State College commonly called the ASSSC. The ASSSC conducts an extensive program of activities in which its members may participate: athletics, drama productions, music events, social functions and world affairs activities. It sponsors the publication of "The State Hornet" issued twice each week, during the fall and spring semester; the Sacramento State Review, a literary magazine issued twice a year; the college year book, "The Statesman", and a student handbook given to each student when he first enrolls at Sacramento State.

Intercollegiate Athletics

Sacramento State is a member of the Far Western Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, the membership of which is mentioned elsewhere in this petition. Full schedules of competition are carried on in football, baseball, basketball, track and other sports.



Library, Facing Campus Plaza

Library Facilities

The rapid increase in enrollment necessitated a large three story addition to the colorful library building which faces the campus plaza with its wide sweep of beautiful lawn and trees, curved walkways and benches and sunken gardens. Seating capacity of the public rooms is 1,300; book capacity is 125,000 and floor area including the new addition completed in September, 1959 is 80,000 square feet. This building like all of the permanent buildings other than the residence halls is of the most modern design which makes use of combinations of four or five colors on the exterior walls and trim. The May 1 Open House circular and the "Welcome" circular inside the back cover show arrangement of all buildings.

College Staff and Personnel

As of May 1, 1960, the payroll of the college included a full time faculty of 252, and in addition 270 full time staff of administrative, clerical and maintenance personnel, 80 part time lecturers and teachers and 300 different student assistants who do odd jobs of typing etc. on an hourly budget. The operating budget for 1960-61 is \$3,887,540 of which only \$84,000 is earmarked for equipment purchases. The cost of new buildings and equipment is a separate budget. Under the building program for the future, 13 small temporary buildings will be replaced by permanent modern colorful structures.

Community Resources and Support

Great support is given to Sacramento State College by the people of the capitol city of the state of California. As shown by the clipping above, the newspapers give publicity to all college events, athletics, social events, drama, music and educational events. The population of Sacramento County as of June 1, 1960 is quite accurately estimated as 500,000 people, with 460,000 of these living within 15 miles of the downtown business center of Sacramento. Adding 35,000 people in Yolo County within the same 15 mile radius, we have a 495,000 urban center. Under the sponsorship of Sacramento State College Foundation, more than 30 research projects have been undertaken. The Ford Foundation has given \$30,000 for one project. The Aerojet-General Corporation with a 15,500 employee plant at Sacramento has donated generously.

K A P P A S I G M A P H I F R A T E R N I T Y

History

Kappa Sigma Phi was organized November 20, 1947 shortly after Sacramento State College opened on what is now the Sacramento City College campus. Mr. L. Paschal Monk, Associate Professor of Music became faculty sponsor in 1951 and has remained its honored and respected senior sponsor to this day. He has joined with the student members of Kappa Sigma Phi in presenting a petition to Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

In February, 1953, Sacramento State College moved to its new campus on the bank of the American River and occupied the original nucleus of buildings. From that time on Kappa Sigma Phi drew its new members from Freshmen and Sophmores of the college as well as from the upper classes. Kappa Sigma Phi is the oldest local fraternity at Sacramento State College, and this includes the local organization which became an affiliate of a national fraternity in February, 1960. Additional local fraternities were organized after the move to the new campus in 1953 so today there are six social fraternities on the campus and these are listed on page six of this petition.

Traditions and Activities

Kappa Sigma Phi does not believe in the hazing of pledges. It has long been the customary practice to have the pledges take part in the Help Week program arranged each semester by the Inter-Fraternity Council. Kappa Sigma Phi places strong emphasis upon scholarship. An award is given after the end of each semester to the member who attains the highest Grade Point Average and following the end of the fall semester of the 1959-60 year this award was given to Raul Quezada, who during the same period of time earned a place as All-Conference Half-back in the selection made by Sports writers in reviewing the Far Western Conference season. The scholarship program has been revised so that the member returning to Sacramento State College next semester and who exceeded others so returning in Grade Point Average, will be paid the semester tuition of \$43 by the fraternity. An additional trophy award will be given to the member returning to school next semester who scored the greatest improvement in grade point average for spring semester work as compared to the preceding semester provided his new attainment is not less than a "C" average of 2.0.

Kappa Sigma Phi has always had members interested and leading in a wide variety of campus activities besides athletics. The most important office of all student organizations is the presidency of the Associated Students of Sacramento State College. Wally Clark is just now finishing his year as president of the ASSSC. Another member of Kappa Sigma Phi who was graduated in June of 1959 was the immediate preceding president of ASSSC. The fraternity scored a great success in having its members occupy this high office two years in succession, and this was an unusual record. During this past year under the by-line

of "Clark's Remarks" Wally has written a column as president of the ASSSC^{for} "The State Hornet". A copy of the last issue for the 1959-60 year of this semi-weekly publication will be found inside of the back cover of this petition.

Each year members of Kappa Sigma Phi take an active part in World University Service, the Student Loan Fund Drive, Hornet Holiday and the Inter-fraternity Raft Race on the American River. A float is always entered in the annual Homecoming Parade and in the competition last fall the Kappa Sigma Phi float won second prize. Kappa Sigma Phi sponsors the annual All-Fraternity Dance, "Playboy" held each year in April and in conjunction with this dance sponsors the selection of "Miss All-fraternity Playmate" from the contestants that are proposed. An entrant is sponsored in the Homecoming Queen contest and in connection with the Sacramento Camellia Festival Kappa Sigma Phi sponsors an entrant in the competition to be "Camellia Queen".

Financial Report

The first two funds are on deposit with the graduate manager of the Associated Students of Sacramento State College and the Building Fund is on deposit with the Bank of America in a savings account drawing interest. Of the six social fraternities at Sacramento State College only one is currently operating a fraternity house. This house is at a considerable distance from the campus and involves an old residence which was rented on a temporary basis in the interim before the owner, a church, tears the building down to enlarge a parking area. With the stimulus of national fraternities coming on the campus at the college, a fraternity house becomes a goal for which to strive. Kappa Sigma Phi now has over 160 alumni members and the addresses of over 140 of these are known. Plans are being made to generate the interest of many of the alumni in the plans of Kappa Sigma Phi in petitioning Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity for a charter and in the operation of a fraternity house in the future. The ASP and KSP Interim Trusteeship was made a separate fund to take care of expenses on "going national" if this petition is granted. George A. Schurr, President of the Sacramento Alumni Council of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity, was made a trustee to serve with Raul Quezada and Joe Mehrten, trustees who are the outgoing president and the incoming president of Kappa Sigma Phi respectively. The special fund is earmarked for a reserve of \$100 to accompany this petition, \$50.00 expense in preparation of the petition, and \$100 unallocated expense for a later date, chapter installation etc.

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



We would like to recommend for your consideration Kappa Sigma Phi. This organization has been granted permanent status and it has exhibited its ability to maintain itself as an on-going organization.


