#### Concord College Athens, West Virginia

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We, the undersigned wembers of Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity, do hereby petition the Grand Council of Alpha Sigma Pet Fraternity to grant to this organization the honor of being designated as a chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi; and we agree, if said petition is granted, to abide by the Constitution, Bylaws, Rituals, Rules and Regulations of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

Realizing the need for a normal school to serve the southern part of West Virginia, the citizens of Athens petitioned the State Legislature of West Virginia to establish in Athens, Concord Normal School. On February 28, 1872, the act was passed. The act stipulated that the school was to be built at no cost to the state government and that if the building was not completed in twelve months or less, the site of the school would be changed.

The building was completed within the twelve month period but classes did not begin until May 10, 1875 because the initial act did not provide salaries for the teachers.

The original act was amended and when classes began Concord Normal School had an enrollment of 70 students. The only field offered for study at that time was a twoyear teacher-training course. But growth was to be the watchword for Concord.

In 1885, the State Legislature appropriated \$5,000 for Concord's second building. The Legislature stated that, "We are impressed with the progress that is being made at Concord Normal School." Further growth was shown by the construction of the first women's dormitory in 1891. In 1895, through an appropriation of \$20,000, the State of West Virginia completely renovated the ten yearold Administration Building.

In 1910, however, the first setback to Concord's progress happened. A raging fire destroyed the entire school and all the students' records. The following day, however, school resumed in churches, lodge halls, etc.

In 1912, a new building was completed. It became known as "Old Main," and, now rebuilt, remains on Concord's campus today.

The coming years saw much growth and progress at In 1923, the first A. B. graduates received their Concord. In 1937 a large new women's dormitory was added. degrees. In 1939. a new Men's hall was constructed -- John Baker White Hall for Men. Holyroyd Hall, the College's Health Center and Home Economics Department, was constructed in 1939. The Physical Education Building was completed in 1939 and the Natatorium, in 1940. In 1941, The Joseph F. Marsh Library officially opened. At that time it contained 3,000 volumes. Today, it houses over 45,000 volumes. With 1956, came the new addition to the Homa Economics Department --- a home management house. That same year, the Science Building was also completed. 1962 brought the completion and opening of two new dormitories (men's and women's), the renovation and enlargement of the "Old Main," and completion of the College Courts -- Concord's Married Student Housing Facility. In 1963, the new College Center and St dent Union was completed.

Currently, the College is embarking on a new building program---the Master Improvement Plan. Under construction now is Alexander Hall, a new fine arts facility. Due to begin within six months, are two new dormitories and a new Physical Education Building.

Natching the vast growth of the physical plant, has been the growth of the student body at Concord. Starting with 70 students in 1875, Concord now has 2,000. Concord College is fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education, and by the National Association of Business Teacher Education.

The College is a member of the Association of American Colleges, the American Council on Education, and the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, as well as the State education organizations, and is recognized by the American Association of University Women.

Concord College is a four-year liberal arts college and teacher education institution supported by the State and the people of West Virginia. Geographically, it is located in the southeastern corner of the State of West Virginia in Athens. It is between the main rail lines of the Norfolk and Western Railway at Bluefield and the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway at Hinton. It is just off the southern terminus of the West Virginia Turnpike, and near the Piedmont Airlines terminal at Bluefield.

#### THE GREEK SYSTEM AT CONCORD COLLEGE

The Pan-Hellenic and Interfraternity Council are the governing bodies of all Greek organizations at Concord. The autonomy of these organizations is limited only to the extent of working within the framework of the college rules and regulations. The discretion and maturity shown by these organizations has made administrative intervention virtually non-existant.

Diciplinary action is a case of judgement by peers, for the greeks have the responsibility of upholding college standards in the fraternity domain. Rushing is deferred in that candidates must have a minimum of twelve hours and restricted in that none may pledge if deficient more than six quality points.

As the pressures of a growing college increase, the recognition of fraternities as one solution to the problems of campus becomes an accepted fact. Housing has been approved by the administration and is a part of every fraternity's plans. Social and physical recreation at Concord is a large part of fraternity life. Dances are sponsored both on open and invitational bases. Intramural play is dominated by the competition for the annual athletic award given to the team accumulating the most points during the academic year. Scholastic achievement does not go unrewarded. The annual award for the highest fraternity average carries great prestige and is coveted by all greeks. The fraternities now face the problem of not only maintaining their position but keeping up with an expanding institution. This challenge is being met by eager greeks, seeking even greater responsibilities and more opportunities to take part in the betterment of Concord College.

#### HISTORY OF THE SIGHA DELTA PHI FRATERNITY

The history of the Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity is not one of a record of past activity, but one of future design. It was organized with the intention, as stated in its petition to the Student Government Association, the Interfraternity Council, and the Student Organizations Committee all of Concord College, of bringing a chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi to Concord's campus.

The story the choice of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity from the several other national fraternities interested in Concord College is our history.

In September of 1964 the brothers of Phi Alpha Chi local fraternity formally voted to associate with a national fraternity. Hany national fraternities had been considered by August, 1965, including Alpha Sigma Phi. At this time, two representatives of Phi Alpha Chi were invited by Alpha Sigma Phi to attend the Alpha Sigma Phi National Education Conference held at Horris Harvey College, Charleston, West Virginia, Upon the resumption of school in September, a vote was taken by the brothers on Alpha Sigma Phi. The voting was split--twelve in favor of petitioning and twelve opposed to petition. The issue was postponed until a later date and until another vote could be taken. Yet succeeding votes indicated that no one brother was willing to yield and consequently Phi Alpha Chi suffered a split. The twelve brothers who split immediately contacted Mr. Dale Dillon, a Gamma My alumnus now residing in Bluefield, West Virginia, and drew up plans to form a new local fraternity and eventually associate with Alpha Sigma Phi. The name "Sigma Delta Phi" was borrowed from the local at Morris Harvey College which is now the

Germa Mu Chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity. In December, 1965, Sigma Delta Phi petitioned the Student Senate of Concord for percognition on this campus. The Student Senate unanimously voted to recommend the petition to the Student Affairs Cormittee which is composed of several faculty members, the President of Concord, Joseph S. Marsh, and the Dean of Men, William S. Mooddell. The petition was passed and recommended. On January 31, 1966, after nearly two years of ardwous work by young men who set a goal and never lost sight of it, Sigma Delta Phi Fraternity was recognized by Concord College as a local fraternity.

Although the history of Sigma Delta Phi is brief, we feel that there is an abundance of courage and hard work depicted in these two pages--hen who had the courage to attempt something out of the ordinary--something we all believed in--and hard work as evidenced by each brother who spared the time and money to get the job done.
