Alumni members of the petitioning body should be set forth in that part of the petition reserved for such in the form of a "Who's Who," giving the surname first and Christian and middle name, together with all information as to what he did in college, when he graduated, degrees, honors, and positions held since leaving college.
  - 7. Assemble the petition in the following order:

A history of the organization petitioning.

Individual statements.

Alumni lists.

A petition signed by every member of the petitioning body with his full name.

Pictures of the campus, house, group, etc. in their proper places.

To The Chapters of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

Gentlemen and Brethren:-

The enthusiastic reports of the men who were appointed to investigate the Palisades Fraternity at Iowa State College, Ames, Iowa is handed herewith to you. I cannot but endorse the recommendations therein contained.

The standing of the college is above question and therefore has met our first requirement.

ert History of the Iowa State College

#### HISTORY OF THE INSTITUTION.

#### "IOWA STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND MECHANIC ARTS"

An act establishing "A State Agricultural College and Model Farm" to be connected with the entire agricultural interests of the state was passed by the Iowa Legislature in 1858. This legislature also appointed a board of commissioners to buy a farm and erect a college building, and selected a board of trustees to secure a faculty and organize a college. In 1859 a farm of six hundred forty acres situated near Ames was purchased.

In 1862 Congress enacted, and President Lincoln signed a bill entitled, "An act donating public lands to the several states and territories, which may provide colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts".

The General Assembly of Iowa, September 11, 1862. accepted the grant upon the conditions and under the restrictions contained in the act of congress, and by so doing entered into contract with the general government to erect and keep in repair all buildings necessary for the use of the college. By action of the General Assembly the college was changed from an agricultural institution into a college of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts with a broad and liberal course of study, in which the leading branches of learning should relate to Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts, and which should also embrace such other branches of learning as would most practically and liberally educate the agricultural and industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions of life, including military tactics. Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts conducts work in five major lines, - Agriculture, Engineering, Home Economics, Industrial Science, and Veterinary Medicine.

It offers a degree of bachelor of science in the following departments: Agricultural Education, Animal Husbandry, Bacteriology, Botany, Chemistry, Dairying, Economics, Engineering, Farm Crops and Soils, Farm Management, Forestry Geology, Horticulture, Mathematics, Physics, Veterinary Anatomy, Veterinary Pathology, Veterinary Physiology and Zoology. The higher degrees are the Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy for advanced work in the technical fields, especially developed at the college; and the professional degree of Civil Engineer (C.E.), Electrical Engineer (E.E.), Mechanical Engineer (M.E.), Engineer of Mines (E.M.), Ceramic Engineer (Cer.E.), Chemical Engineer (Ch.E.), Agricultural

Engineer (A.E.), Master of Agriculture (M.Agri.), and Master of Forestry (M.F).

The college occupies a delightful location upon high rolling land a mile west of Ames, Story County. Situated at the junction of the north and south branches and the main double track line of the Chicago and Northwestern rail-road, and connected with all the trunk lines of Iowa, Ames is easily accessible from all parts of the state. Street car service is at hand from Ames to the College Campus.

of the entire college domain 1,342 acres valued at \$3,973,570.67 one hundred eighty-five acres are set apart for college grounds. These includes the experimental plots, the young forestry plantations, the surroundings of professors' dwellings, and the central campus with its beautiful walks, drives, and its trees, shrubbery and flower gardens, and its large and stately buildings. The true principles of landscape gardening have been so faithfully observed in the gardening and in the location of buildings and drives as to make the entire campus a large and beautiful park. The income of the College from Mational and State sources is therefore expended in instruction, experimentation and illustration in Agriculture and in the Mechanic Arts and in the underlying and related sciences and literature.

Fifty commodius buildings besides the dwelling house and buildings for farm stock, machinery and work have been erected by the State for the exclusive use of the various departments. Some of these buildings are the best in the country and valued from \$400,000 to \$500,000.

The war affected the attendance at all schools, and consequently the attendance is practically cut in two at the present time. Now there are 1100 men and 400women attending, while previous to the war the enrollment was about 2200 men with 500 or 600 women, making a total for the nine month school somewhere between 2800 or 2900 students, and then adding summer school student attendance, it neared the 5,000 mark.

There are nineteen fraternities represented at Iowa State College, including Sigma Nu, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Beta Theta Pi, Phi Gamma Delta, Alpha Tau Omega, Kappa Sigma, Theta Xi, Acacia, Delta Tau Delta, Phi Sigma Kappa, Pi Kappa Alpha, Phi Delta Theta, Phi Kappa Psi, Delta Upsilon, Alpha Gamma Rho, Tau Kappa Epsilon, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Sigma Chi, Lambda Chi Alpha.

Also eleven honorary fraternities are represented namely: Alpha Zeta, Tau Beta Pi, Phi Kappa Phi, Phi Lambda Upsilon, Gamma Sigma Delta, Delta Sigma Rho, Omricon Nu, Sigma Delta Chi, Scabbard and Blade, Jack-o-Lantern, Theta Sigma Phi.

In athletics Iowa State College has ranked well with the Western schools. It has always had a strong football team, and at the present time Charles W. Mayser, a Yale man, is Athletic director and coach in football, baseball and wrestling. In wrestling, Iowa State College has held the Western Championship for two succeeding years. The track and basketball squad always makes an enviable record, All which draw strong athletes to this school.

The prospects for a new chapter, as seen by the petitioners, are indeed promising for the war has brought back many new students who have seen the value of education, and there is promising material for making a new chapter strong in a short time with the nucleus it now has to build upon. The enrollment is going to increase at an enormous pace, and will consist of students that are here for a purpose who will be an asset to any organization.

History of the "PALISADES" Club.

#### HISTORY OF PETITIONING BODY.

Feeling the need of closer association and organization to better cultivate their social, moral and intellectual abilities, a group of students at the Iowa State College in the spring of 1911 organized a local social fraternity which on April 12th of that year was incorporated under the name "PALISADES". During the eight years since that date this organization has steadily grown in membership and influence.

Now in the spring of 1919 the affairs of the Palisades are conducted under the leadership of the following officers and executive committee:

The alumni list of this organization includes the names of twenty-six men, all of whom are regularly contributing to the house building fund account. As shown by the individual records, this number includes seven men who are in the employ of the United States Department of Agriculture, two employed by the Iowa State College, and three who are still in military service.

The members of the Palisades are proud to say that this organization in social standing ranks among the best fraternities at Ames. It has also emphasized the development of the social abilities of each and every one. Previous to the war a policy of having three dances and one dinner party each semester was followed, and now that the college work is on the quarter basis two dances and a dinner party are being given each quarter. These are all given in the chapter house, as this has a dining hall and dancing parlors which for size and arrangement are unexcelled in

any fraternity house at the Iowa State College.

The Palisades has been growing stronger financially each year. At the present time the chapter owns all the house furnishings except those in the dining room and kitchen. The parlor is well equipped with a piano, davenport, six large rockers, reading table and "Brunswick". A building fund account was started in the fall of 1915, which now includes on deposit at the Ames National Bank about six hundred and fifty dollars. This fund will be used in the near future in buying a building site following which shares of stock will be issued to build a new chapter house.

During its history this organization has passed successfully through several crises. One of these in particular showed what could be accomplished through the closely associated efforts of its members. A chance opened in the late spring of 1916 to lease a better chapter house. In order not to lose this opportunity a contract was drawn up for the new house even though it was practically certain that the old house could not at that late date be released or sub-leased. In the fall of that year sixteen Palisades members returned to College, and because of their unity of purpose and spirit pledged a strong group of new men and thus filled up the new house, while on the other hand rooms were rented and a boarding club established in the old house, which made that a paying business proposition until January first when the owner took active charge. Meanwhile the members and pledges took an active and leading part in college activities.

Because it has encouraged both individual and cooperative efforts among its members and pledges, and has upheld the best ideals of leadership, Palisades now counts among its active members three members of Alpha Zeta, the honorary agricultural fraternity of the Senior class, the honor student of the Agricultural division, two members of the college debating team, an ex-president of the College Y.M.C.A., the champion tennis player of the school and captain of the tennis team, the captain of the Cross Country Team which for three years has been champion of the Missouri Valley Conference, two track stars, a member of the College baseball team, a member of the Cardinal Guild which is the student governing body, the president of Agronomy Club, and the captain-elect of the wrestling team, who for two years has been champion one hundred thirty-five pound collegiate wrestler of the middle western states.

Dear Brother Musgrave:-

Your committee met in Ames, Iowa, November 22, 1919 to conduct an investigation of the Pallisades Fraternity; Brother Van Stone being absent and Brother James A. Lucas substituting for Brother Jones, of Nebraska. Brother Lucus arrived November 21st, Brothers Pinther, Pierce and myself arriving the morning of November 22nd.

Saturday morning we devoted to meeting and investigating the personnel of the Club.
They all proved to be fine fellows, clean cut,
enthusiastic, and generally speaking, men who
would be rushed and pledged by our own chapters.

We also took a trip around their campus which is very fine, and in the afternoon we interviewed some of the faculty, all of whom spoke highly of the organization as one which took an active part in all campus activities and always worked in harmony with the faculty and the various student organizations. Mr. Knapp, the registrar, showed us the statements which he had prepared on the various Fraternities and Clubs, which showed that the Pallisades had an average grade of 85.69, the highest grade being There were twenty two organizations 88.01. with lower standing and eight with higher standing, which I think shows that they are good material from a scholastic point of view.

In athletics, they have two men on the Ames Cross Country Team which won first place at Columbus, Ohio in the big ten meet the day we were at Ames. They also have the Captain of the wrestling team and two other men who are generally expected to make the team. In this connection, I would say that cross country and wrestling are two big sports at Ames, wrestling ranking next to foot-ball. They also have a number of men on class teams.

#### W. M. M. continued.

They have men belonging to the various honorary Fraternities and Clubs, also the Business Manager of the Ag. paper. They also have a man on the Cardinal Guide, which is the organization governing student affairs at Ames and from the Ames student's point of view is super honorary.

Socially, they stand very well as Brother Pinther and Pierce will testify since they made dates for the Cardinal Guild dance given Saturday evening, for these brothers, the girls being according to Brothers Pinther and Pierce's phraseology "the class of the campus". The conditions under which these dates were made being most adverse since there are about three thousand men at Ames and only eight hundred girls, and further than this, all arrangements were made late in the afternoon. Brother Lucas having interests at Ames did not need any hand to guide his course. As for myself I spent a very enjoyable evening with some of the Alumni and members who did not wish to attend the dance.

Financially, we found that they own all of their furniture, have no outstanding hills and have something over \$700.00 in their building fund. They are renting their present house but are now about to close a deal for the purchase of a lot on which they expect to build in the near future.

The house which they now occupy is well arranged and very commodious. At present they have about thirty men living there and three or four men living at home in Ames.

The writer being compelled to leave Ames at 9:40 Sunday morning, your committee held a meeting late Saturday night or rather early Sunday morning, it being about one thirty, at which time we unanimously agreed to make a favorable report and to highly recommend to you and to the various Chapters that the petition of the Pallisades Fraternity of Ames, Iowa he granted as soon as is consistent with our methods of proceedure. All of the committee feel that they would make a very good addition to our present chapter roll.

W. M. M. continued.

Acting as Chairman of the Committee, I instructed each of the members to turn in an individual report which should reach you about the same time this does. Brothers Pinther, Pierce and Lucus planned to spend all day Sunday there and will probably have some additional information for your consideration in their reports.

I might add that while waiting for my train I met and talked with the President of the Fraternity Pan Hellenic Council of Ames (which does not take in local Fraternities). He informe that the Pallisades Fraternity had petitioned He informed the Pan Hellenic Council for approval to petition Alpha Sigma Phi, which approval had been granted before they sent us their petition so that in all probability the Pallisades Fraternity would be taken into the Council on becoming a national, this being his personal opinion since he could not say for the Council. My reasons for ting this information was that one national was not taken into the Council for a couple of years after they got their charter, but this was largely due to irregularities in proceedure. seems they did not ask permission of the Council before petitioning, but since the Pallisades have complied with all the formalities and have a good organization, I personally am satisfied they will have no trouble on this ground?

The Palisades Club stands exceedingly high in my opinion. They have been established long enough, since 1911, to have an excellent standing on the carrus. They have a number of strong athletic letter men in the house and have men in practically every activity. Their scholastic grades are better than the average and several honor men are included in their number. They stand well in the estimation of the faculty. Socially they stand very well as was evident by the entertainment shown the committee.

The school is a good one and is growing rapidly. With eleven local fraternities on
the campus prospects of more nationals coming in
are good. It would pay this fraternity, if they
intend to go there to go with least possible
delay.

After living with the members of the Paliasdes Club for two days, interviewing faculty members, other fraternity men and sorority women I am firmly convinced that this fraternity can make no mistake by granting a charter to the Paliasdes Club, and I recommend it be done with all possible speed.

Pear Prother Wagrave:-

Last week-end I visited the Palisades club at Area with Brothers Pinther, Winslow, and Lucas. I arrived there early Saturday norning and left about midnight Sunday night.

Faturday morning we received a telegram from Brother Van Stone stating that unexpected business called him Fast. We then nade Brother Winslow chairman of our committee and proceeded to find out what we could orderning the petitioning body.

The Palisades club lives in a rented house that is as well appearing as almost any renter rouse or the carrus. The house is well furnished with their own furniture. At the time of our visit they had no debts except those of the current month. Their teveral of the hatical fraternities at these have their own houses and this club interds to contract for a lot before the end of the present year.

Nest of the University officials had gone to love City to see the foot-hall game, but we found the registrar and secured an audience with him. He produced acholarship records which showed that this club ranks a little better than half way in comparison with all the other social fraternities. He stated that they had no noor students and that their men were out in University activities. The Palisades Club has never been involved in any difficulties with the University authorities, and has the highest recommendation of the registra?.

The social standing of this club on the cannus appears to be excellent. On Saturday night they entertained us at a college dance and provided "dates" from the bast sonorities on the cannus. The following noon they invited these same girls over to dinner.

The charenone at the Gamma Phi Deta sorority has a son sho is an Alrha Sig from Marietta. Her husband and her brother are Alrha Sigs from the same charter. She knew several of the men from the Palisades Club and recommended them to us very highly.

We tried to see the President of the Pan-Felleric Council, but he was out of town. I understand that Winslow saw him on the way to the train Sunday morning though, so he probably will report to you as to what he learned from that person. From what we gathered from other sources though they will have no trouble in being admitted to Pan-Fell at once if we grant them a charter. They secured the approval of that hody and of the University fraternity committee before they petitioned us.

They seem to be well represented in athletian. They have the remarks accurring team that won first at Chic last Saturday. The captain of the wrestling team is a member of this local. And they have at least one man on the base-ball team:

They follow our policy of pushing men out for various activities, and seem to be on the look out all the time for rustees.

The general orinion seemed to be that the Palisades rank second arong the locals. The Colomial Club seems to rank first. It is an older organization with a large alumni and a house of its own. However, the Palisades Club is composed of such a burch of men that with a national charter I believe that within a very short time they would take their place among the leading fraternities on the campus.

Area is a school in which we should have a charter. If I am not mistaken, their enrollment is shout 3700 this year. The Mational fraternities there are not sufficient in rumber to take care of all the sysilable fraternity material. There is a large campus and they have several fine groups of buildings. As a state institution it is bound to grow.

The hund of mon that we not there is one that Alpha Sigma Phi oculd be proud of. I dentainly am glad to have had the opportunity of meeting than all.

I resonated that the netition of the Palisades flub be submitted to the various chapters as econ as possible for a vote.

If snything is unclear in your mind in regard to this local I will be glad to try to elear it up for you.

Pear Brother Musgrave:-

As regards the Ames trip, I arrived there Friday, the 22nd and was met at the train by some of the Palisades and taken out to the house. Pinther, Pierce and Winslow arrived the next day but Brother Van Stone was unable to be present on account of urgent business calling him east. So we made Brother Winslow chairman of the committee and decided that it would be best for each man to send in his own individual report.

The Polisades, in my opinion, is a very fine bunch of men and secon't go wrong if we take them into the Myatic Circle. I am from Iowa and know several students at Amee. They all anoke voluntarily of the Palisades as being a very fine bunch and they certainly demonstrated it to us. At the table they are perfect in manners and demeanor and on the campus they are popular, with the sororities as well as the fraternities. Their financial standing is Al, they have the captain of the college wrestling team, which by the way is one of their regular sports at Ames. They have two men on the track team, several assistants in the departments, several who are out on extension and research work and members in the different professional fraternities.

They have a mighty nice home there and have been established since 1911. They had 24 men in the house at the time of our visit. These are only a few of the facts that we gathered while there and I can certainly assure you that these men, if admitted to Alpha Signa Phi, will be a credit to us.

# INSTRUCTIONS TO CHAPTERS, Etc.

The within is a correct copy of a petition for a Charter from this Fraternity and should receive proper and prompt attention at your hands. It is prepared on official blanks furnished by the Fraternity and in accordance with the directions given the petitioners. The reports of the investigating committees, recommendations of members of faculties, other fraternities, etc. together with a finding from the G. J. P., etc., are attached.

These should be studied by every member of your Chapter to the end that he will be prepared to give proper consideration to the petition. Remember copies hereof are in the hands of your fellows in every Chapter and a prompt reply is not only due the petitioners, but also all within our own circle. Your reply should be in the form of a report under the hands and seals of your president and secretary directed to the G. J. P. and sent to him. Observe the provisions of the Fraternity Constitution in taking and reporting these votes. A majority vote of the members present decides the way in which your Chapter votes. Petitions can only be considered at regular meeting of your Chapter unless every active member is present at a special meeting called for that purpose.

# CONSTITUTION.

#### PREAMBLE.

In pursuance of the Charter granted by ALPHA SIGMA PHI FRATER-NITY under its Constitution, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, the following Constitution is hereby adopted for Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity,

Phi Chapter.

ARTICLE I. NAME.

Section 1. This organization shall be called ALPHA SIGMA PHI FRATERNITY, PHI CHAPTER.

ARTICLE II. OBJECT.

Section 1. The object of this organization shall be to perpetuate friendship, encourage culture, foster college spirit, promote patriotism, and cement social ties amongst its members and kindred Greek Letter Fraternities throughout the world.

ARTICLE III. SECRECY.

Section 1. In pursuance of the objects of this Fraternity all its proceedings shall be kept strictly secret.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP.

Section 1. Any male student in <u>Iowa State College</u> in good standing in any department is eligible for membership subject to the limitations of the Fraternity Constitution, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, and the Laws of the Fraternity.

Section 2. Candidates' names may be proposed at any regular or special meeting, or posted in any manner proposed by the By-Laws of this Chapter hereinafter adopted. Balloting upon the names of candidates may take place at any regular meeting, or at any special meeting at which all active members are present.

Section 3. No candidate shall be balloted upon whose name has

not been duly proposed at least two weeks previous thereto.

Section 4. Secret ballots shall be taken for each candidate separately. Candidates can only be elected by a unanimous favorable ballot.

Section 5. A candidate who has been duly elected shall be duly initiated in accordance with the Rituals provided by the Fraternity. After passing satisfactorily the initiatory work, signed the Constitutions and By-Laws, and paid all dues and fees, the candidate shall be admitted to full membership and admitted to all its rights and privileges.

Section 6. Alumni members when present at any meeting of the Chapter shall have all the rights and privileges of an Active Member

except voting for officers and of holding chapter offices.

Section 7. Wherever the term, "Active Member" is used in this Constitution and the By-Laws enacted thereunder it shall be construed to mean a member of this Fraternity engaged as a student in some department of Iowa State College. "Alumnus Member" one no longer in attendance as a student. "Faculty Member," one who devotes his entire time to instruction work in this college. Faculty Members shall have all the rights of Alumni Members after one year from initiation.

ARTICLE V. DUES.

Active Members shall pay dues throughout the cal-Section 1. endar year in amounts provided in the By-Laws hereinunder enacted. The fiscal year shall begin and end October 1st Section 2. of each and every year.

Section 3. Alumni Members shall be exempt from dues from and after the beginning of the fiscal year following their graduation or other final termination with this educational institution as students.

> ARTICLE VI. SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS.

Section 1. Any member who shall divulge any of the secrets of this Fraternity or Chapter, the way in which any member spoke or voted on a candidate for membership, its private business, or violates his obligation, or is guilty of any disgraceful conduct that shall bring himself, or this Fraternity into unpleasant notoriety shall upon conviction thereof be fined, suspended; or expelled, as may be deterined by a two thirds vote of the members present. Suspension may be for a definite or indefinite period.

Charges shall be preferred in accordance with the Section 2.

Fraternity Constitution and tried in accordance with its Laws.

Section 3. Members under charges shall surrender the muniments of membership in this Fraternity to the H. S. P. of this Chapter at the time the charges are served upon him, or to a member of officer duly authorized by the H. S. P. to receive them, as provided in the Laws of the Fraternity.

> ARTICLE VII. OFFICERS.

Section 1. The Chapter Officers shall be the H. S. P., the H. J. P., the H. S., the H. C. S., the H. M., and the H. E. Section 2. As occasion may require an H. C., an H. P., and

and H. A. S., or other necessary officers may be elected.

Section 3. A Board of Trustees consisting of three members elected by the Active and Alumni Members, a member elected annually by the Active Members, and the H. S. P. ex-officio shall hold title to the property of the Chapter and operate it under the direction and for the use of the Chapter and its members.

ARTICLE VIII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS,

Section 1. The H. S. P. shall preside at all regular and special meetings of the Chapter, perform the duties assigned to him under the Rituals, appoint all special committees unless otherwise provided by the Chapter, and while in office act as a Member of the Board of Trustees ex-officio; and perform all the duties usually devolving upon an executive officer. When mecessary he may call special meetings of the Chapter, and upon the written request of five or more members shall call a special meeting thereof.

Section 3. The H. J. P., shall in the absence of the H. S. P. perform all the duties pertaining to that office. He shall also perform all the duties assigned under the Rituals to the H. J. P., and act as Chairman of the Prudential Committee as a member thereof.

The H. S. shall keep the records of all proceedings Section 3.

The H. C. S. shall attend to all correspondence of Section 4. the Chapter, keep the names and addresses of all members and alumni, act as Historian of the Chapter, and have sole charge of supplying pins

to members of the Chapter.

The H. E. shall collect all fees, dues, fines, as-Section 5. sessments, debts, and accounts due the Chapter for which he shall give receipts; be custodian of and pay and disburse all moneys upon the consent of the Chapter on an order countersigned by the H. S. P. keep an accurate account of all moneys in his possession and shall render an account to the Chapter at each business meeting, which shall include, the amounts due the Chapter, amount on hand and disbursed, and any other details necessary to inform the Chapter of its financial con-At the end of his term of office he shall tulk over to his successor all funds, property, and moneys in his possession.

the H. M. shall have full charge of the initiation Section 6. of candidates, preserve the initiation apparatus, and enforce the rules of initiation. He may call upon members to assist him in his work. He shall perform the duties of sheriff in executing the judicial acts of the Chapter when sitting as a Court of Inquiry.

The H. C. shall guard well the doors of the inner Section 7. and outer sanctuary and act as H. M. in the absence or disability of tha officer.

Section 8. The H. P. shall conduct the prosecution on behalf of the Chapter in all cases brought before it for trial.

> Section 9. The H. A. S. shall perform such duties as are assign

ed to him by the H. S. Section 10. To the outside world the H. S. P. shall be known as President, the H. J. P. as Vice-President, the H. S. as Secretary, the H. E. as Treasurer, the H. C. S. as Corresponding Secretary, the H. M. as Marshal, the H. P. as Prosecuting Attorney, the H. C. as Custodian

and the H. A. S. as Assistant Secretary.

Certificates of authority to financial institutions having funds of the Chapter on deposit; Certificates of Resolutions and Votes taken on behalf of the Chapter; and all other business transactions had on behalf of the Chapter with persons not in any way connected with it shall be held under the titles, and shall be deemed legal when so used in its behalf.

#### ARTICLE IX. COMMITTEES.

. Amend Article LA to read as follows: Section 1. There shall be a Prudential Committee consisting of the H. J.J.P. as chairman and the H.S. P. and H. E. and two other members one of whom shall be chosen from the alumni residing in Ames.

Section 2. The Prudential Committee shall be the purchasing and auditing committee of this chapter, and shall certify all bills and contingent funds to it. It shall also serve as the executive committee for Alpha Sigma Phi, Inc.

Section 3. Special committees may be appointed or elected as occasion may require.

Section 3. The Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be held on the second Monday of October at the headquarters of the ChapSection 4. The Board of Trustees shall have authority to organize itself into a permanent organization, to make all requisite orders, provide all necessary regulations, and give all necessary directions for the proper government of the Chapter when incorporated under the laws of this State. To canvass the votes for Members of the Board of Trustees, or other propositions laid before the members of the Chapter. Reports of the condition of the corporation, its property, and all funds in the control of the Board shall be made at each annual meeting, and special reports may be made from time to time as the Board may direct.

Section 5. No contracts for the purchase of lands, or for the erection or alterations of buildings, or for the sale of any part there of, shall be entered into by this Board without a majority vote of the Active Members of the Chapter authorizing the same. If the Chapter 15 not in session a vote may be taken by mail.

Section 6. The Board of Trustees shall control the affairs of the corporation by a majority vote of its members, but the vote of any mem-

# ARTICLE X. OWNERSHIP OF REAL ESTATE.

All matters pertaining to the ownership of all real property of this fraternity shall be delegated to the Alsiphi Association, Inc., The relationship with Alsiphi Association shall be as provided for in the Articles of Incorporation of Alsiphi Association.

a petition from the Chapter, or by the written request of two members of the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE XI. ELECTIONS.

Section 1. All officers, except those mentioned in Section 3 of this Article shall be elected by secret ballot without nomination. If no election results from the first ballot, a reballot shall immediately take place. If no election occurs the lowest candidate shall be dropped from the contest in each successive reballot until an election or tie vote results. If a tie vote occurs one more reballot shall be taken, and if no election results the candidates shall draw lots for the office.

Two members shall be elected to the Prudential Committee to serve with the H. S. P., H. J. P., and the H. E. One of these members shall be chosen from the alumni of this fraternity who reside in Ames.

Three members of the Board of Trustees shall be elected at the first election to be held under this Constitution as above provided,—one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, and annually thereafter for a full torm or to fill vacancies as herein provided.

One Member shall be elected each year by the Active Members of the Chapter from its membership to held office for one year or until his successor is elected and qualified.

These four members together with the H. S. P. ex-officio shall conetitute the Board of Trustees.

Section 3. All Committees shall be elected at the regular elections for officers and in the same manner, unless otherwise provided.

ARTICLE XII. TENURE OF OFFICE.

Section 1. All officers, except the Board of Trustees, shall be elected at the last regular meeting of March of each year and be duly installed at the next regular meeting thereafter.

Section 3. All officers shall hold office until their success-

ors are elected and qualified.

Section 3. All Chapter officers ceasing to be active members shall forfeit their offices for the remainder of the term for which they were elected.

Section 4. All officers of all kinds, committeemen, or Members of the Board of Trustees suffering suspension or expulsion from the Fraternity shall forfeit their offices for the remainder of the term for which they were elected.

Section 5. All officers, elective committees, and Members of the Board of Trustees shall hold office for the terms for which they were duly chosen. Special committees for the time necessary to perform the

tasks assigned to them, make their reports, and be discharged.

Section 6. All officers, committees, trustees, and other persons entrusted with the management, control of property, funds, records, or having under their control or in their custody any of the property rights of this Chapter, either tangible or intangible, corporeal or incorporeal, shall make a report of the same to the Chapter at the termination of their terms of office and surrender and transfer the same to their successors in office.

ARTICLE XIII. RECALL.

Section 1. All officers, committeemen, Members of the Board of Trustees or persons delegated by the Chapter or corporation to perform the duties of their respective offices or tasks assigned to them shall be subject to a recall at any time for non-feasance, or mis-feasance in office.

Section 2. Charges of non-feasance or mis-feasance may be preferred by petition or resolution of one-third pf the active members of the Chapter. The defendant shall be given an opportunity to be heard in his own behalf, but shall be removed from his office,

Where ar officer of the Chapter or a committeeman by ma two-thirds vote of the active members of the Chapter at any regular meeting succeed:

Where a Member of the Beard of Trustees by a two-thirds vote of all the active and alumni members voting in the same manner in which an

election is held for such members

Section 3. No other disqualification shall attach to an officer recalled as provided herein except the forfeiture of his office for the term for which he was elected, provided, nevertheless that such recalled officer shall be ineligible for re-election to the office from which he has been removed during the balance of the original term thereof.

ARTICLE XIV. FUNDS.

Section 1. CONTINGENT FUNDS. The Contingent Funds of the Chapter derived from initiation fees, dues, assessments, fines, etc. shall be kept under the control of the H. E., deposited in the banks selected by the Chapter, and disbursed by the checks of the H. E. countersigned by the H. S. P. No moneys from this fund chall be disbursed until appropriated for such purpose by the Chapter.

Section 2. STEWARDS' FUNDS. A Stewards' Fund may be provided for the Commissary Department and disbursed by that officer under the joint control of the H. S. P. in the manner provided for the Contingent Funds. Stewards' Funds shall not be combined with the Contingent Funds, but profits accruing therefrom may be transferred thereto by a vote of

the Chapter.

Section 3. BUILDING FUNDS. All moneys donated by the Chapter, members, or others to the Building Fund, or devised and bequeathed to it shall be under the control of the Board of Trustees and shall be retained by said Board for the purposes of constructing or maintaining a Building for the Chapter, or for paying off and reducing the mortgages or other indebtedness thereon.

Each Active Member of this Chapter shall be expected to denote

Each Active Member of this Chapter shall be expected to denote to this fund not less than \$100.00, payable not less than \$10.00 per year from and after graduation from college or beoming alumnus member

of the Chapter.

All income derived from this fund shall become a part of the

corpus thereof until ordered disbursed as herein provided.

No moneys belonging to this fund shall be invested in permanent securities, but may be deposited in savings banks on interest, or invested in securities authorized by law that may be converted into each upon demand, or on first mortgages on real estate payable on demand and at not greater than 45% of the each value thereof.

No meneys, securities, or property of whatsoever kind belonging to this fund shall ever be appropriated from this fund for the purpose

of replenishing the Contingent or Stewards Funde.

No disbursements from this fund shall be made except by a twothirds vote of the Active Members of the Chapters and a four fifthsvote of the Board of Trustees.

Section 4. ENDOWMENT FUNDS. All funds transferred or denated to the Endowment Fund shall be under the central of the Board of Trusters, who shall hold, invest the same in permanent legal securities, and re-invest the same when necessary. The income from this fund shall be paid into the Contingent Fund of this Chapter, but no part of the corpustof this fund shall ever be transferred to the Building Fund, Centingent Fund, or Stewards' Fund, provided, nevertheless, that the Board of Trusters by and with the consent of a three fourths vote of the Active Members and a majority vote of the Alumni Members may advance upon bond and mort gage any definite sum fixed in the original motion, secured upon the builting, either constructed, or in process of construction,—and in the event of said building being in the process of construction, the Board shall advance the money in instalments as the building is constructed in such sums as will at all times protect the funds of the Endowment Fund so authorized to be invested.

ARTICLE XV. MISCELLANEOUS.

Section 1. SURETY BONDS. Officers and Trustees having control of funds may be placed under surety bonds of some surety company authorized to do business in this State, provided that the premiums for such bonds shall be paid by the Chapter. Officers and others for whom a surety company shall refuse to underwrite shall forfeit their moffices for the balance of their terms.

Section 2. QUORUM. A quorum to do business shall consist of the active members present forming a majority of the whole number

thereof.

Section 3. Effect. This Constitution shall take immediate effect unless otherwise provided herein.

ARTICLE XVI. AMENDMENTS.

Section 1. Proposed amendments shall be submitted in writing to the H. S. at any regular meeting and if passed by a majority vote it shall be printed and sent to all members, active and alumni, each of whom shall return the same with his vote "yes" or "no" indicated thereon. One month after the proposal was sent out the votes shall be canvassed in open meeting and if a two thirds vote is affirmative to shall become a part of this Constitution.

BY & LAWS OF PHI CHAPTER OF ALPHA SIGMA PHI.

Adopted January 23, 1922. at the regular meeting of the Chapter.

#### ARTICLE I. PLEDGES.

Any man attending Iowa State College or who has signified his intention of attending Iowa State College as a student in a regular collegiate or graduate course or as a member of the faculty may be voted upon and approached as a prospective pledge.

No pledge pin shall be given a prospective pledge until he has entered school as a collegiate or graduate student or taken up his work in the faculty.

In voting on a prospective pledge the blackball system shall be used. In case only one black ball is cast a revote shall be taken at once to besure no mistake was made and if one or more black balls are recast the prospect shall be declared inellegible and dropped from consideration.

A revote may be taken on a blackballed man upon a motion to that effect; but the voting may not take place until notice has been given to all active members. Vote may be cast on a revote previous to the meeting by a written statement to the H.S.P. or H.J.P. in case a member is to be absent.

At the last meeting of each school year all pledges shall be voted upon by the black ball system to determine whether or not they shall be repledged when they return to school. One black ball shall rule a pledge dropped from further consideration. In all cases regardless of the result of the voting all pledge pins shall be collected and kept by the Chapter until the pledges return to school.

Should a pledge leave school for any reason during the school year his pledge pin shall be forfeited to the house and his name submitted for voting at the end of the year or before that time if desired.

The H.S.P. or presiding officer at a meeting shall have all the voting powers of an active member when voting on prospective pledges or members.

# ARTICLE II. INITIATION.

It shall be the duty of every active member to attend all initiations ceremonies. Failure to do so to be punishable by a fine; said fine tobe five dollars or nothing as decided by a committee composed of the H.S.P., H.E., and H.M. All decisions subject to change by the Chapter.

Section 2.

No pledge shall be placed on probation or given any preliminaries to initiation until his Initiation Permit has been received from the faculty.

#### ARTICLE III. DUES.

Section 1.

The annual dues to National Headquarters from every active member shall be due October 1 of each year.

Section 2.

The quarterly dues of \$5.00 shall be due from every active member and pledge upon registration and shall be paid to Phi Chapter's Building Fund.

Section 3.

Any member or pledge leaving school at the end of the year or at any other time who owes the Fraternity Stewart's Fund, Building Fund or any other fund maintained by the Chapter shall sign a note to the Fraternity for that amount.

#### ARTICLE IV. INSIGNIA.

Section 1.

All members of Phi Chapter shall purchase one official badge at the time of initiation.

Section 2.

No member shall purchase more than one official badge unless the original be permanently lost or destroyed.

Section 3.

Only members shall be allowed the use of the Fraternity crest, seal, name or other insignia on any stationery, jewelry, plaques, skins or as a decoration of any kind except that those articles displaying the insignia be bought by the Chapter or by members and given out as gifts, favors etc.

Section 4.

It is hereby RECOMMENDED that all members of Phi Chapter wear their official badge in as nearly verticle position as possible.

# ARTICLE V. CHAPTER REPRESENTATIVES.

Section 1.

Representatives to the Inter-Fraternity Council shall be elected by the active members.

Section 2.

The Freshmen Pan Hellenic council representatives shall be elected by the pledges who are members of the freshman class and shall be one of their own number. The term of office to be one full school year.

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### ARTICLE VI. CHAPTER OFFICERS.

Section 1.

All officers of Phi Chapter shall hold office for one full year, unless otherwise stated in the constitution.

Section 2.

The Honored Junior Pater shall be elected from the Sophomore class.

Section 3.

The H.E. shall submit a detailed report each month of the finiancial condition and expenses of the Chapter.

The H.E. shall submit a report : each month of the finiancial standing of each member and pledge with the Chapter.

#### ARTICLE VII. MEETINGS.

Regular meetings of Phi Chapter shall be held every Monday night while school is in session at 7:00 P.M. at the Chapter house.

Special meetings may be called at any time school is in session by the H.S.P. or by the written request of three active members.

It shall be the duty of every active member to attend all regular and special meetings. Any member absent may be called upon to give reasons for such absence at the request of any member at the next regular or special meeting. The H.S. is to submit upon request a list of all members absent.

# ARTICLE VIII. AMMENDMENTS.

These By-Laws may be ammended by a two thirds vote of the members at a regular or special meeting. Said ammendments to become effective at once.
