# Silver Anniversary\*

\* IT IS WELL for the members of the Alpha Kappa Pi fraternity to call to mind the fact that on January 1, 1945, we will have reached our twenty-fifth birthday; hence the celebration of Alpha Kappa Pi's Silver Anniversary. Before another volume of The Alpha has been sent from the publishers this momentous date of founding will have reached us. Briefly let us record a few salient facts that have taken place within these twenty-five years.

First of all we must never overlook the genesis of our founding, and the courage of a group of men at the Newark College of Engineering, taking the first steps that was one day to bring into the college life of America a fraternity, foundationed on Truth and Fidelity, and so equipped to extend its principles, that on March 23, 1926, it was an easy matter to start the national life of this closely knit and deeply fraternal order of college men, and the Beta or second chapter was placed at nearby Wagner College, Staten Island, New York. Some readjustments were made when this national step was taken, but to all intents and purposes, the fraternal ideals and precepts remained intact and inclusive of the teachings that have been the force that has stabilized and made strong the present forward going Greek Letter fraternity, honored and received among all other fraternities of the American college world. Alpha and Beta

chapters have remained always two of our most loyal and forceful chapters, both being the pioneer fraternal groups on their respective campuses.

After this step in nationalization the growth of the fraternity, in collegiate chapters, has been vigorous and yet with a definite knowledge of the program engendered. It was held in mind that, before swinging into far flung places, the fraternity should place its emphasis on making the New York City area a strongly entrenched home base, from which other lines of endeavor might be undertaken with safety. This policy has prevailed and has shown its wisdom in so choosing. Every year since 1926 there has been at least one chapter added to the fraternity roster excepting the years 1934 and 1939. Of the total 36 charter grants twentyone of them are within the borders of the States, touching on the Atlantic Ocean, and crediting West Virginia as still sympathetically, and socially, aligned with Old Virginia, 24 charter grants, or two thirds of the total grants, are thus homogenously established. The greatest number of charters granted, within any one year, was in 1929 when five were issued.

As for future extension there is no set limitation, but a recognition of the undisputed fact, that colleges are increasing in numbers, and in quality of instruction, throughout the United States, and the very need, for well ordered fraternities, will make

it incumbent on Alpha Kappa Pi from time to time to share its possessions. The last chapter of the fraternity was placed at the fine and growing State University of Connecticut.

It is well to recall that added strength came to Alpha Kappa Pi for reason of many old local societies chartered. Among them such outstanding groups as were honored at Stevens Institute of Technology, Brooklyn Polytechnic, Marshall College, Lehigh University, Pennsylvania State, Rutgers University, Tufts College, West Virginia Wesleyan, and Tri State College. Then the chapters at Franklin and Marshall College, Toledo University, and the University of Cincinnati, chartered after the Sigma Delta Rho national society had disbanded; and then the final ending of the famous, or otherwise, Theta Nu Epsilon when the two remaining, and exclusive in membership chapters, at Rensselaer Polytechnic and Ohio Northern University, were merged into the Alpha Kappa Pi family. From all these designated places strong alumni came into membership with their undergraduate members, and thus a maturer and even sobering influence began playing a part in the government of this fraternity. In actual initiated members, as of date October 23, 1944, the total stands at 3962, and with pledges ready to be initiated the membership may be justly stated as having reached, if not surpassed, the 4000 figures. Then from time to time the potential-members, alumni of the absorbed local societies, return for their ritual and badge, so counting these figuratively, the membership lifts another 500.

Financially the fraternity may boast justly, at this Silver Anniversary, for there are no debts but a considerable equity in the hands of our Grand Treasurer. This financial integrity, has been aided no little for reason that no officer serves other than for the love of that service, thus with no alluring financial emoluments Alpha Kappa Pi has been able to keep the deeply interested, and self sacrificing officers, at the helm of its first twenty-five years of history.

In patriotism the fraternity may lift a proud head and a grateful heart. There were, and there are no slackers, wearing the five-pointed star. When this World War No. 2 has ended, and the story of its valorous deeds have been recorded, the name of Alpha Kappa Pi, through the services of her willing and valiant sons, will stand high on the scroll of honor and accomplishments.

So, men of Alpha Kappa Pi, hold in mind the coming date of January 1, 1946, and with ready hand and warm heart, resolved to make the following twenty-five years, greater and more illustrious, for the fraternity, than the quarter century just passed.

These men were reported lost in the following manner: Jacob Hartzell was never reported back after an operational flight over the Continent; William Graham was killed in a training flight accident in this country, while C. Lowell Liebau was killed in action in France. To the chapter and the parents of

these lost brothers THE ALPHA offers the sincerest sympathy. As our losses mount in Alpha Kappa Pi the more determined should be the spirit of the entire brother-hood to carry along. These three brothers were splendid young men, from a splendid chapter, and we mourn unashamed for their going from us.

It is with pride that THE ALPHA speaks of the outstanding work of Brother James Pfeffer, Jr., now Captain Pfeffer, who was the officer in charge of perfecting the new rocket projectile currently used with success against Nazi tanks and gun emplacements. Captain Pfeffer has been overseas eighteen months and is head of the engineering office, Air Command's Ordnance Section, Headquarters, U. S. Strategic Air Forces. Captain Pfeffer is from Nu chapter, Lehigh university, and a great athlete at college.

# Supreme Sacrifice

Lieutenant Eustace N. Keesee, Mu, '33, has paid the supreme price in country's defense. He gave his life while fighting in the Pacific war zone. Again THE ALPHA offers sincere sympathy to chapter and relatives. While we are in comfort and safety let us not forget the bells keep tolling.

### Killed in Accident

Major Robert C. Hawkins, a hero in several major engagements in the Pacific, and one of the stand-out figures at Guadalcanal, was killed in an airplane crash, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, on August 10, 1944. Brother Robert Hawkins is a brother of Captain William L. Hawkins, the first Marine to land on Guadalcanal. Both the Hawkins brothers are from Tau chapter, Tufts College. The entire fraternity had come to know these men of national fame, for reason of their daring and victorious leadership, and the entire

brotherhood extends sympathy to the parents and other near relations in the death of Major Robert Hawkins.

# Bill of Rights

THE "G.I. Bill of Rights," a war veterans' aid measure providing for education among other things, has been passed by both Houses of Congress and approved by the President of the United States.

The National Interfraternity Conference has asked that all fraternities, through their offices and magazines, give wide publicity to the educational benefits under the law so that there should not be any ignorance as to the plan and opportunities in the mind of any undergraduate now in country's service.

Any person who served in the active military or naval service on or after September 16, 1940, and who was not over 25 years of age at the time he entered the service, and shall have been honorably discharged, and who either shall have served 90 days or more, exclusive of any period he was assigned to an Army or Navy college training program, which was a continuation of his civilian course or was pursued to completion, or as a cadet or midshipman at one of the service academies, or shall have been discharged from active service by reason of an actual service-incurred injury or disability shall be eligible for educational benefits.

Such educational course must be begun not later than two years after either the date of his discharge or the termination of the present war, whichever is the later, and the benefits will not be extended beyond seven years after the close of the present war.

Any such eligible person shall be entitled to education for one year. After the close of the first year the veteran, if in the opinion of the institution he is attending has shown satisfactory progress, shall be entitled to additional periods of education not to exceed the time such person was in active service after September 16, 1940, and before the termination of the war, but in no event shall the total period of education exceed four years. He may enter an elementary school, trade or technical institution, college or graduate school. During this period he will receive \$50 a month if single, \$75 if he has one or more dependents. The Government will pay up to \$500 for each person for an ordinary school year for tuition, laboratory fees, books, and supplies exclusive of board, lodging, other living expenses and travel.

Those who were over 26 when they entered the service will recieve the same benefits if they can prove that their education was "delayed, interrupted, impeded or interfered with," which probably will not be made difficult.

It has been estimated that at least 1,000,000 soldiers will return to the class-room. Do your part to keep the members of your fraternity advised of their opportunities so that your postwar chapters may have as many as possible members of prewar fraternity training.
