



Dr. and Mrs. Weller kindly threw open their lovely home for this occasion and after the initiation, Mrs. Weller, assisted by Mrs. Hakanson, wife of the initiated professor, served delicious refreshments. Hartwick is beautiful for situation and is ideal for the full development of the fraternal ideals and precepts. Alpha Kappa Pi is fortunate to possess this college for its exemplification of true fraternalism. Alpha Kappa Pi will never have any hardships for reason of the Alpha Alpha chapter. He Remembered

The first member of the Alpha Delta chapter, University of Toledo, to give his life for the cause for which this country is contending, is Brother Robert Lewis Whitney, No. 3474 on his chapter roll. He was a Waist-Gunner on a Flying-Fortress and was shot down somewhere over Italy. When search was made for complete identification, there was found pinned underneath his coat his Alpha Kappa Pi badge. Truly he had Remembered. His chapter, to honor his mem-

ory, has created a memorial fund, and when the new chapter house is erected at Toledo, the name of Brother Whitney will be enshrined for all time on the campus of that university. The Whitney home is 528 Langdon Street, Toledo, Ohio, and THE ALPHA, for the fraternity, sends deepest sympathies to all the members of the bereaved family. His single life has been cut off but his multiplied life shall live forever.

Field Director

Richard R. Schwartz, Theta, has entered Red Cross war work as an assistant field director, and has taken up his preliminary work at the American University, Washington, D.C. For a number of years Brother Schwartz has been superintendent of the Sunday school, Church of the Saviour, New York City, where fraternity adviser, A. H. Wilson, is the pastor.

In Florida

Grand Second Vice-President Parke B. Fraim, after several months of intensive teaching Navy men at both Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute and Columbia University, welcomed a few days off at the Christmas Holidays, and spent the time in and about the City of St. Petersburg, Florida. It goes without saying that Brother Fraim has been and is making a fine contribution to the war efforts in giving instructions to these carefully selected and future leaders in Naval affairs. He is now back on the job once more.

The Triangle

Brother Ellsworth N. Wheaton, Jr., is doing a splendid service for Rho chapter, Rutgers University, and the Alpha Kappa Pi fraternity in general, by compiling and mailing out the chapter paper, *The Triangle*. It is a masterpiece of its kind and gives the items of particular interest to the brothers from the chapter at Rutgers. Miami University

The ancient and honorable Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, stands out as one of the richest colleges in the Nation when the founding of Greek Letter fraternities are considered. Here at Miami were first conceived the plans and ideals that have given to the college world three of the oldest and largest of the American College fraternities: Beta Theta Pi, Phi Delta Theta and Sigma Chi. In later years there was also founded the vigorous and forward-going Phi Kappa Tau. Thus four still active fraternities owe their origin to this historic campus. Magnificent in its educational endowments and appealing in its site for natural beauty of country. The Phi Delta Theta is planning to erect a national headquarter's building in Oxford and have it ready for service shortly after the World War II has ended. Phi Kappa Tau fraternity has been carrying along its work in its own headquarters in the Town of its origin.

All these accomplishments are somewhat interesting to the Alpha Kappa Pi fraternity since there was founded, in the year 1921, at Miami the Sigma Delta Rho fraternity, that remained active and a member of the Interfraternity Conference, until 1935. Then it disbanded with the permission of each chapter to seek membership where desirable. The Alpha Kappa Pi received into its roll of chapters three of the former Sigma Delta Rho groups: Franklin and Marshall College, Lancaster, Pennsylvania; University of Toledo, Ohio, and University of Cincinnati, Ohio. Thus Alpha Kappa Pi owes a living debt to Miami and Sigma Delta Rho.

Another Lifer

Dr. John T. Woods, Iota, Mount Union College, and now residing at 415 East Union Avenue, Bound Brook, New Jersey, is a paid up life subscriber to the Alpha Kappa Pis, The Alpha. Let us all work and see the numbers grow. There should be at least 1,000 life subscribers. Next?

Shadows Before

It might be well for all collegiate chapters in Alpha Kappa Pi to place this statement on their billboard, that all and sundry might read and digest. At the 1944 national interfraternity conference, Hotel Commodore, New York City, it was recommended that the colleges and universities, throughout the country, see to it that all forms of hazing, including mental torture and paddling, be abolished, and that offenders be disciplined. More and more college Deans and Presidents attend these annual conferences and it is time for fraternities, still given to these practices, to realize that corrective action is just around the corner, if not already arrived. Right or wrong one fraternity, at a leading State University, has had its chapter removed from the campus, and by the decree of the university. It would seem that impressions must now be made at the top and not at the bottom of the individual being initiated. Coming events cast their shadows before. The shadow of fraternity recommendations has passed into actual university accomplishments.

Greetings to all brothers wherever you may be! For some time the undersigned have contemplated the preparation of a letter which would be mimeographed and sent to as many of the Psi brothers as could be reached the world over. Contemplation has finally resulted in reality.

First of all we take this opportunity to say a few words in remembrance or recognition, as the case may be, of those of our number whose fortune it has been to suffer the greatest sacrifices in this terrible conflict. In any group as large as that comprising the alumni of Psi chapter, with so great a majority in military service, immunity from casualities could not logically be expected. And indeed we have suffered our share, of course casualty figures are continually mounting and our list may not be complete. We do hope so, however, least of all from the statistical viewpoint, for each new name which is added represents not only personal suffering but also bears with it the concern of family, fellow brothers, and friends. Following is the list as it now stands:

Killed in Action

Cpl. Orville Otis Hughes '42 of Ravenswood, July 30, 1944.

Missing in Action

Lt. Sam Gwosden '42 of McKeesport, Pennsylvania, since July 12, 1944 in Franco.

Prisoners of War

Lt. John Brunson Williams '37 of Buckhannon, since March 1944 in Germany.

Captain Lee Browning Coleman '38 of Buckhannon, since July 1944 in Germany.

Wounded in Action

Captain W. B. Hicks, Jr. '39 of Buckhannon, legwound in France.

Brother "Skeeter" Hughes entered Wesleyan as a freshman in the fall of 1939 and completed two years before transferring to Marshall College. May this supreme sacrifice not have been in vain!



The term "missing in action" as we all know is merely Uncle Sam's way of saying "we don't know what happened." It is quite indefinite yet at the same time so meaningful. We can only hope and pray that Brother Gwosden is safe and well and will be returned in due time.

"Bunny" and "Brownie" are of course well known to the older brothers of the middle 30's. But because their town is Buckhannon, most of us who were around in the years following their graduation have also had the opportunity of knowing them. Staying in a concentration camp, we are sure, is by no means pleasant but time certainly will bring about their release.

Brother "Buddy" Hicks, president of the chapter during the 1938-39 school year, also was around the house many times after his graduation. We understand Brother "Teeny" Hicks got down from Scotland to see "Buddy" in the hospital in England. His injury is reported as a flesh wound with no complications. It is tough luck but we are glad it was not more serious.

Now for a glance at the present status of Psi chapter and plans for the future. As you might well expect the war has played havoc with social fraternities everywhere and our own chapter is no exception. In the spring of 1943 finding it impossible to continue, the house was closed, and the opening of school in the fall of the same year found only three actives left to carry on. This year one active, Brother Don Taylor, remains. He is going ahead as best as possible under very difficult conditions, as one might well imagine. The Kappa Alpha chapter somehow has fared slightly better, and are occupying the top floor of their old Florida Street house which now has become the freshman men's dorm. Their position is of course strategic. However, we are still in there pitching in true Alpha Kappa Pi fashion, and as long as there is the slightest thread, Psi chapter will be in exist-

What about the future? It is always the alumni of any organization who make it or break it. How true that is with fraternities, and now, more than ever in our history, does the future of Psi chapter depend upon us who long since have departed by graduation. When the war is over many of you fellows whose education was interrupted will be returning to Wesleyan to graduate. This group will serve as a nucleus from which will spring an even stronger Psi, of Alpha Kappa Pi. However, without a strong foundation no structure can be substantial. That foundation must be lain before the brothers return and we are the ones who have to do it. In order to reorganize, it's going to take money and plenty of it. The more the better; And

Knox, 1025 Spruce Street, Philadelphia 7, Pennsylvania, who will record each amount as it comes in and in turn will send the total regularly each month to Brother Taylor for deposition on a special account in the bank or for investment in war bonds as you so desire. Every six weeks or so

a report will be sent out to inform one and all of our progress.

It is our hope that every alumnus no matter where you may be, will receive a copy of this letter for we do not want to slight any of our group. We have delayed too long now so let us get the ball rolling! We have a big job ahead but for the future of Psi of Alpha Kappa Pi. We know your support will be wholehearted.


