CHAPTER OFFICERS RESPONSIBLE FOR CONTROL OF HAZING ACTIVITIES

Mr. T. Glen Cary, President of Phi Delta Theta Fraternity, notes that the General Council is still concerned with members in some chapters who derive sadistic pleasure from hazing pledges. These "cowards" like to show the pledges what "big shots" they are. Officers of each chapter must restrain these overgrown "baby boys."

All forms of hazing and undignified treatment of pledges are illegal, Mr. Cary continues. This means that any form of physical or mental hazing is illegal, as well as any dehumanizing practice. Actions taken or situations created intentionally, on or off fraternity premises, to produce mental or physical discomfort, harassment or ridicule are illegal and shall be discontinued.

Chapter officers are responsible for restraining by whatever means necessary those cowards who haze pledges or treat them in an undignified manner. Mr. Cary notes that those chapters who treat their pledges with dignity and have abolished all hazing are among the best chapters in Phi Delta Theta; those chapters who still practice some form of hazing are among the worst chapters.

The loss of life from hazing will crush a family, destroy any form of morale in a chapter, and kill the Greek system. Dehumanizing activities can be almost as bad. They do nothing to instill self-confidence in a pledge or to teach him that brother-hood is a form of love. Members who indulge in them are seen as immature, stupid and cruel misfits who get their kicks from taking unfair advantage of their pledges.

Our adversaries are our own weaknesses. Our weapons are our purposes and examples. The battleground is the chapter houses. If we can conquer our weaknesses, we will win and hold the admiration of all. January - February, 1980 CONSIDER RISK OF LIABILITY IF HAZING INJURIES OCCUR

Have the officers of your fraternity ever considered their liability if an accident occured during initiation activities?

Each year men sustain injuries as they participate with their pledge brothers in programs leading to initiation. Let's say a man falls on the stairs as he is being run around the house. Certainly no one planned for him to sustain a concussion, but he did.

First of all, the activity will be labeled as hazing. The press could pick it up, blow it up, and syndicate it. Second, the man could sue, and since he probably was not having such a great time, he may. If he chooses not to, chances are still good that his parents will.

Who can they sue? The president, the vice president, the pledge educator, the man who was running him around, anyone in the vicinity, the building corporation, the advisor, and probably the university. Whether you win or lose the case, think of the time and money wasted and the suffering image of the fraternity. You can see the impact if you ever observe a chapter which has gone through legal action which was publicized in the newspaper.

FORMER NORTH TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY PLEDGE SUES FRATERNITY

A former pledge of a national fraternity at North Texas State has filed a \$200,000 lawsuit against the fraternity, several of its members, and a faculty member. He contends he suffered assault, battery, false imprisonment and intential infliction of emotional distress during the fraternity's initiation activities.

Could this happen at your chapter?

Six pledges of a national fraternity were arrested at Syracuse University for having a stolen city street sign in their possession. The case has been adjourned for six months in contemplation of dismissal; however, in a stern reprimand, the judge warned, "Any more of this kind of nonsense and you'll be in jail and your chapter will be removed from the campus." The charge is third degree criminal possession of stolen property.

# SENIOR "BURN-OUT" PROBLEM IS SHARED NATIONWIDE

A survey conducted recently by the student activities advisor at the University of South Florida revealed that the phenomenon of "senior burn out" is nationwide.

The most frequently-offered suggestion on ways to combat this problem is in the area of programming. Needs and interests change as a student progresses through a college career. The organization must be flexible and creative enough to meet needs and retain interest and enthusiasm. If the leadership training of the Greek experience is adequate, groups will not have to rely on tradition to insure strong, well-prepared officers for the chapter.

It is generally agreed that the top leadership of a chapter should be comprised of students in the latter part of their junior and throughout their senior years. This alalows good use of the leadership training received in previous years of affiliation. To effect this, most groups rely on the influence of tradition and the prestige normally reserved for top officers.

The benefits of Greek membership most often cited by the three groups surveyed (Greeks at USF, the nationals, and other schools) include social development and the possibility of maintaining group affiliation after graduation for both social and professional purposes.

Over the Christmas season the Alpha Sigs and Alpha Tau Mu, a local women's music sorority, shared their Christmas spirit at a local nursing home, and were received so well that they were asked to return in the spring.

The spring semester will bring the Campus Songfest (won by Alpha Sigma Phi for the past two years, even defeating the men's music fraternity) and the Campus Community Chest campaign, a carnival where campus organizations build game booths and raise money for various local charities. Alpha Sigma Chapter has led for the past two years here also, in the amount of money raised in the endeavor.
