

Life in Alpha Sig Chapters Today

(The section on chapter reports in this issue allows you to "visit" with undergraduate Alpha Sigs. Before you read those reports, consider the following article about the changes you might encounter if you visited your chapter for a few days. The biggest surprise might be the comparatively few changes you'd find!)

"I think about visiting my chapter," you say. "But I'm sure things are so different I wouldn't feel at home."

Not necessarily so.

Chapter life has changed over the last five, ten, 20 or 50 years. But not as much as society has changed. The caring touch that Fraternity membership offers is still there—in fact is even more important today as campuses become larger, more impersonal.

Spend a week with an Alpha Sig chapter and here are some of the things that you might notice:

Scholarship—Yes, that's a personal computer in the chapter library. And it's probably hooked into the campus library. And yes, those are organized study groups and tutoring sessions underway.

Service—A group in one corner works on plans for helping a big charity function. Chapters undertake multiple service projects—from

"adopting" elderly neighbors to planning and executing massive events that raise thousands for good causes.

Career development—You'll probably be asked to talk to the chapter about your profession. A lively discussion about career planning follows, utilizing materials supplied by Fraternity Headquarters. (Alpha Sigma Phi even has a program that starts its sophomores on the right track toward life planning.)

Leadership training—You'll probably see officers studying chapter manuals. Undergrad Alpha Sigs see the chapter as an important place to develop organizational and management skills—training often available no where else. You'll see a lot of committees undertaking chapter business.

Traditions—You'll be asked about chapter traditions. Chapters are rediscovering their past and enjoying the search. You may hear careful planning for ritual work. Or a Black Lantern processional. Chapters are proud of Alpha Sigma Phi's rich heritage.

Pledge education—Yes, word is education, not training. Alpha Sigma Phi's program to prepare new members to be capable brothers puts

emphasis on a lot of worthwhile learning. And does it with dignity.

Headquarters—You note a memo on the board about the upcoming visit of the Chapter Leadership Consultant. You see stacks of "The Old Gal Gazette." You hear members suggest calling Headquarters for guidance and suggestions.

Social—You attend a rush function and discover that it's "dry"—no alcohol. And you hear discussions about responsible social behavior.


Catching Up!

James Anderson, a TKE member, got the student out of the hall and into the parking lot. **Joe McNerney**, Alpha Sigma Phi, tackled him and smothered the flames with a blanket.

Members of Alpha Sigma Phi quickly came to the aid of TKE members, bringing fire extinguishers to prevent the fire from spreading. Their actions were credited with keeping damage to the hall and possessions relatively low.

McNerney and Anderson were credited with saving the life of the student. Joe McNerney has been presented a special award from the College and has been nominated for an award from the City of Marshall.

Bruce Storey, Dean of Students, wrote recently: "The actions of members of Alpha Sigma Phi were very commendable. Joe's actions in helping save the life of a student are expressing the ideals of Alpha Sigma Phi in the highest way possible—risking your life to save another. Alpha Alpha University of Oklahoma



Baldwin-Wallace College



Province VII







Alpha Sigs: busy, involved, interesting

Even during his days at Nu chapter, Watson took his summer vacations at sea. As a cadet for the Dollar Steamship Co., he traveled to the Orient and around the world. He worked on the docks for other firms. Watson, as a man who loves ships, has served on a wide range of related organizations. He has twice been president of the National Maritime Museum on whose board he still serves. He has been named shipping man of the year. And the Port of San Francisco honored him with its Order of Maritime Merit.

Having made his mark on the shipping industry, Watson keeps his hand in business by serving on the board of Liberty Mutual Insurance Co. And stays around ships as a member of the St. Francis Yacht Club. And relaxes as a member of the Athenian Nile Club where the **Bay Area Alumni Council** sometimes holds Founders' Day.

You'll find him there. Unless, of course, there's a ship heading somewhere. □

Robert Buchanan, Wake Forest '76 of Canton, N.C. can see a little more of the world now, thanks to special eye treatments he's received from doctors in Russia.

Buchanan, 28, has retinitis pigmentosa, a degenerative eye disease which causes varying degrees of blindness. The disease affects the cells of the retina, making it especially hard for him to see at night. American doctors claim the disease is incurable.

But last year Buchanan heard that Russian ophthalmologists at the Helmholtz Institute in Moscow were treating the disease by injecting special drugs into the eye and hip. The Soviet doctors told Buchanan that if he would return at least four times for treatment, there would be a 90 percent chance of arresting his disease.

Buchanan, who began losing his sight at age 14, decided to contact the institute and apply for treatments. He and his parents, working with the State Department, made all the arrangements.

A number of civic groups and people in Buchanan's hometown donated money to help offset his air fare and hotel costs while in Moscow. (The Soviets do not charge for medical treatment.)

"I also received a check and a letter of support

from the guys at the **Beta Mu** Chapter," said Buchanan. "I thought that was nice."

After his first treatments last year, Soviet doctors told Buchanan that they believed his disease had been arrested. Then early this year, he returned to Moscow for more treatments. The results have been encouraging.

"The number of degrees I can see has increased," said Buchanan. "I can now see about 25 degrees (out of a normal 180-degree field of vision). My peripheral vision has improved, too. I have to attribute the improvement to something, and I think it must be the treatments."

Brother Buchanan was in Moscow at the time of the downing of a Korean Air Lines jet by Soviets. He was widely interviewed by the media on his return, reporting on Moscow reactions to the incident. He reported good treatment by everyone even during a time of high tensions. This article was prepared by Tyler Cox, fellow Beta Mu alumnus.

Buchanan, who's studying now at Western Carolina University for a degree in computer information systems, is planning a third trip to Moscow. Still, it will be three to five years before he knows how successful the series of treatments has been.

Since his vision started deteriorating, Buchanan has kept a positive attitude about his disease. He doesn't complain about his handicap.

"When there's nothing you can do about it, you just try to do the best you can," he said. "A long time ago, I said I'm not going to worry about it, so I don't. I always knew there'd be something that would come along that would help me."

It's been 15 years since **R. Gwin Follis**, **California** '19, retired as chairman of the board of Standard Oil of California.

But one could hardly call it "retirement." As a nationally known petroleum industry leader, Follis' advice and counsel is still sought.

And he has continued a remarkable record of community service.

Today Follis is chairman of the board of the San Francisco Opera Association, a company that is commanding the attention of music lovers over the world.

Brother Follis is serving as a trustee of the Asia Foundation, Grace Cathedral, Childrens Hospital of San Francisco and of the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco.

Follis joined Standard in 1924 and began work in refining. By 1940 he had advanced to general manager of manufacturing and by 1945 to president. He became chairman of Standard in 1950. Under Follis, Standard moved from being a predominantly western firm to the position of international giant. Earnings of the company tripled under his tenure. He spurred research at Standard and moved the company into an expansion of its chemicals business.

Follis was a founder of the National Petroleum Council and for many years a director of the American Petroleum Institute.

Brother Follis changed the petroleum industry in America. And today he is working just as hard—making San Francisco a better city.



Brother provides Playboy protection

When **Don L. Hubbard** was an Alpha Sig at Wake Forest University back in the mid-1960's, he enjoyed going to fraternity parties.

Today, Hubbard still goes to parties, but not at Wake Forest. The party has moved across the country to Hugh Hefner's posh Playboy Mansion in Los Angeles. There he meets many of Hefner's invited guests: Hollywood celebrities, famous politicians and, of course, beautiful Playboy bunnies.

Hubbard, however, doesn't go to Hugh Hefner's parties just to have fun. On the contrary, he goes because it's part of his job. Hubbard is the chief security executive for Playboy Enterprises, Inc. in Chicago. In his job as vice president of administration and security, he has plenty of responsibilities.

"Our primary responsibility is to protect Playboy's corporate assets," explained Hubbard, who lives in Lake Forest, IL. "This includes people and property.

"In terms of people, our primary responsibility is the personal safety of Hugh Hefner. We, in effect, treat Mr. Hefner much as the Secret Service does the President. The threats against Hefner are frequent and appear to be becoming more and more vitriolic. When he travels, my staff and I travel with him."

Hubbard and his staff also protect Christie Hefner, Hefner's attractive daughter, who's now president of Playboy.

"We have patterned our protection activities after the Secret Service and in some ways are even more sophisticated," said Hubbard. "We have security people assigned to Los Angeles, Chicago and New York. They control ingress and egress from the Playboy office space and serve as security personnel during parties at the Playboy Mansion."

Hubbard, who served two years as HJP at the Beta Mu Chapter, says the most interesting parts of his job are managing people and resources and

foreign travel. He's also enjoyed meeting a number of celebrities.

"Some of the celebrities I've met are Bill Cosby, Robert Culp, band leader Vic Caesar and James Caan," said Hubbard. "Caan has special significance for Wake Forest alumni because he played the role of (former Wake Forest football player) Brian Piccolo in the movie 'Brian's Song.' Those are the ones I've met personally."



Hubbard came to Playboy in 1979 from the Summa Corporation, Howard Hughes' Las Vegas-based company, where he served as corporate director of security. Before that, he spent nine years as a special agent for the FBI. While at the bureau, he was assigned

to duty "on the Hill" as manager of special investigations for the House of Representatives' Appropriations Committee.

After receiving the B.A. degree from Wake Forest, Hubbard earned master's degrees in criminal justice and education from the University of Baltimore and Coppin State College, respectively.

What does Hubbard's wife, Carolyn, think about him spending so much time around some of the world's prettiest women?

"She has a very relaxed attitude about my work at Playboy," replied Hubbard. "It has affected our relationship no more than did my work at the Summa Corp. and the FBI."

"Many farmers have home computers. Before they plant, they find out what crop they can get the best return on."

That's just one development Warren H. Dunn, Nebraska '39, Omaha, sees as offering a longrange positive outlook for agriculture.

When Dunn speaks on agriculture, the world listens. He is chairman and chief executive officer of Farmers National Company, Omaha—the nation's largest farm management company.

The firm currently manages 3,125 farms totaling 800,000 acres for about 2,500 clients. "The farmer who is a good manager of time and money is going to survive," predicts Dunn.

Technology—such as home computers—will play a role. Dunn estimates that farmers now spend 40 to 50 percent less time in the fields than they did 20 years ago.

One concern that Alpha Sig Dunn expresses is that technology and productivity is causing the number of farmers to decrease. "They are such a small segment of the population, they don't carry a lot of weight in Washington to promote their ideas," he says.

Dunn expects family farms to continue to grow larger. "They used to make a living on 180 acres but farmers can't survive on that now."

"I think technology will keep increasing production," says Dunn, noting that it will be needed as more land goes to highway and building construction and populations continue to increase.

David Windsor, Arizona '56, has seen his signature appear on 98,838 diplomas of the University of Arizona. It is quite a figure, even for a man who has served 38 years. He has recently retired as dean of admissions and records.

Windsor, a charter member of Gamma lota chapter, has seen the University grow from an enrollment of 2,500 to nearly 34,000. His staff has increased from nine to 98.

Brother Windsor, who holds two UA degrees, also served as secretary of the faculty for 25 years. He is past president of the Arizona chapter of Phi Beta Kappa.

An opera and chamber music buff, Windsorwants "to do something less hectic." That means a visit to Europe next concert season.

Brother Harrell lives on beautiful Lake Norman near Charlotte, N.C. But that Beech Bonanza gets a lot of use, visiting his five children and two grandchildren.
