Alpha Sigma Phi to Celebrate 141 Years of Brotherhood

In 1845, James K. Polk was President of the United States, Texas had just been annexed and feelings of sectionalism between North and South were ripening. And on December 6, 1845, three Yale students, Louis Manigault, Stephen Ormsby Rhea and Horace Spangler Weiser gathered to establish the bond of brotherhood in Alpha Sigma Phi. One hundred and forty-one years later thousands of Alpha Sigs all across the country will commemorate this special date. Events are planned at several colleges, universities and major cities throughout the country.

A special event is planned for Saturday, December 6, 1986 in St. Louis at the Sheraton-Downtown. A luncheon is being held to which all area alumni are being invited. That weekend is also the annual meeting of the National Interfraternity Conference. Grand Senior President Robert A. Sandercox will be attending that meeting along with Executive Director Robert M. Sheehan, Jr. Grand Senior President Sandercox will host this gathering of Sigs to commemorate the proud heritage and bright prospects for the future.



Hundreds of triathlon fans were stunned as a helicopter crashed into the Sigma Pi fraternity house on the Purdue University campus, injuring the pilot and a television station photographer.

A mechanical failure in the back rotor apparently caused the helicopter, which was hovering about 30 feet above the house, to spin around, bounce off the house and fall three stories to the ground. The crash caused about \$10,000 damage to the building and totaled the helicopter. No one in the house was hurt.

The photographer was filming the finish of the Midwest Triathlon, which raises money for the American Cancer Society. About 200 individuals and 90 teams participated, and hundreds of spectators watched the start and finish.

BETA DELTA CHAPTER, Marshall University


