### CHAPTER REVIEWS UNIVERSITY SANCTIONS

On Sunday, November 2, 1986, the Gamma Chi Chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi at Indiana University was suspended by the University's Judicial Board for the remainder of the academic year. The judicial board found the chapter to be in violation of the university's alcohol policy and policy on pre-initiation activities. On October 15, 1986, two members of the pledge class were taken to the Bloomington Hospital and found to have blood alcohol levels of .30 and .43, after having participated in a scavenger hunt to find out who their big brothers would be. Both men are now in good health and have returned to the chapter house.

Grand Senior President Robert Sandercox has appointed an "Investigatory Committee" to make a full report to the Grand Council. The "Investigatory Committee" is composed of Robert Cabello, Grand Province Chief, Province III; Robert Cockrum, President Gamma Chi Alumni Corporation and Richard Kahler, Associate Director of Chapter Development. After the facts have been collected and a report presented to the Grand Council, the Grand Council will take the appropriate action. The case has received a great deal of press in Southern Indiana, Indianapolis and even Louisville, Ky.



## THE MYSTIC CIRCLE TO ADD A CHAPTER

On December 12 and 13, 1986, the 53 men of Phi Delta Colony at William Paterson College will be initiated into the Mystic Circle of Alpha Sigma Phi and be presented with a Charter establishing the Delta Mu Chapter. Delta Mu will become the 53rd active chapter in the fraternity and the fifth in the State of New Jersey. William Paterson College is located in suburban Wayne, N. Rich Kahler, Associate Director of Chapter Development, is coordinating the chartering activities. Alpha Rho Chapter at New Jersey Institute of Technology and Delta Lambda Chapter at Stockton State College will assist with the initiation of the 53 brothers-to-be and several officers of the Fraternity will be on hand to welcome the chapter into the Fraternity.

#### USA TODAY SURVEY'S COLLEGE FRESHMEN

Today's college freshmen are more interested in making big money and less interested in pondering the meaning of life than students 20 years ago, a recent USA Today study of almost 6 million freshmen reveals.

The UCLA-American Council on Education study shows:

- 70.9 percent of freshmen in 1985 rated "being well-off financially" as important, up from 43.8 percent in 1966.
- 43.3 percent rate "developing a meaningful philosophy of life" as an important goal, down from 80 percent in 1967.

Freshmen "seem to have embraced the making of a lot of money as a kind of philosophy of life itself," says study director Alexander Astin.

- **Politics.** 56.7 percent called themselves middle-of-the-road in 1985, up from 45.4 in 1970, the first year the question was asked; 22.4 percent say they're liberal today, down from 36.6 percent in 1970.
- Careers. 24.8 percent chose business majors in 1985, 14.3 percent in 1966. Five-hundred percent more women plan business careers. In 1985, 6.2 percent chose education, down from 23.5 in 1968.

D.	At least one man has been trained in the duties and work of the Treasurer prior to departure from office.
E.	Does the chapter have by-laws which deal with delinquent accounts and are they enforced?
F.	No individual in arrears to the chapter more than 60 days without security of promissory note and accounts receivables are less than 6% at close of budget period.
