DUTY TO CARE--UPDATE

The March 1989 issue of <u>Fraternal Law</u> reported on the progress of a New York lawsuit which was filed as the result of fire damage to a fraternity house, owned by Pi Beta Phi Fraternity, at Syracuse University. The fire was alleged to have been caused by fireworks or by a smoke bomb thrown into the house by a resident of the fraternity house located next door. The resulting fire destroyed the entire third floor of the house and caused hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of damage.

Pi Beta Phi's insurance carrier, acting under its subrogation rights, filed suit against the fraternity member who was alleged to have thrown the fireworks. (Technically, the suit was against both the national fraternity and the local house corporation.) The claim against Beta Theta Pi was that it failed to properly supervise the member involved. The fraternity attempted to escape liability in the lawsuit by arguing that as a matter of law they could not be held liable for the unauthorized action of one of its members. Using that theory, the fraternity filed a motion for summary judgment which was denied. In the critical passage denying that motion, the court noted that:

"If it can be shown upon a trial that the fraternity members had prior knowledge of (the fireworks thrower's) possesion of fireworks and it knew of his use of them on the day of the fire, there is a question for the jury as to whether or not the failure to supervise (the fireworks thrower), or to remove the fireworks from the fraternity house was a proximate cause of the fire."

This suit was scheduled to go to trial during the week of November 13, 1989. On the eve of trial, however, Beta Theta Pi settled the dispute and agreed to pay a substantial sum (the amount of which is confidential) in order to avoid going to trial.

As a result of the decision to settle the case, the suit will have limited precedential impact. Still, the decision by the trial court in denying the motion for summary judgment stands as a clear warning to fraternities and sororities not to ignore improper and dangerous conduct engaged in by their members, particularly when that conduct occurs on fraternity or sorority property and endangers others.

At the time of the fire, a chapter of Alpha Omicron Pi Sorority was occupying the house under a lease agreement with Pi Beta Phi. In addition to the claims brought by Pi Beta Phi's insurance carrier, claims were brought by Alpha Omicron Pi and some of its members who sued to recover damages for property that was destroyed in the fire. Following the settlement with Pi Beta Phi, these claims against Beta Theta Pi went to trial.

On December 5, 1989, this litigation was finally brought to a conclusion when the jury ruled that the thrower of the fireworks was responsible for the damage caused by the fire. With regard to Beta Theta Pi, however, the result was different. The trial judge instructed the jury to respond to three questions: Was the fraternity chapter president an agent of the national fraternity? If he was, was he negligent in his capacity as an agent? Finally, was his negligence, if any, the proximate cause of the fire? The jury found that the chapter president was the agent of the national fraternity. However, the jury did not find the chapter president to be negligent and therefore the fraternity was not held responsible for the fire.

DUTY TO CARE (Cont'd)

The fact that the fraternity was not liable in the jury verdict should not create the impression that a fraternity could not be liable under similar circumstances. No doubt, the jury's decision turned on the specific facts presented in this trial. Thus, while the decision of the jury vindicates the Betas, the earlier denial of the motion for summary judgment may continue to stand as the most important aspect of this case for the Greek system. It leaves little doubt that under the right set of factual circumstances, a national fraternity could be held liable for the improper conduct of a single member if the fraternity chapter's supervision of that member was inadequate.

STUDENT CONSERVATION ASSOCIATION, INC. OFFERING POSITIONS

The Student Conservation Association (SCA) will be offering over 1,000 conservation and resource management volunteer positions for high school students, college students and older adults during 1990. Opportunities are available throughout the year.

Individuals selected for SCA programs will contribute from three to 12 weeks of their time to the protection and management of over 200 National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and other federal and state resource agencies across America.

The Student Conservation Association operates two distinct core programs: the Resource Assistant Program for men and women over the age of 18, and the High School Work group program for students between the ages of 16-18.

While carrying out their assignments, volunteers receive a grant for round trip transportation to their program area; a weekly stipend is provided to offset living expenses. Free housing is made available by the hosting agency. A uniform allowance is also provided (if required by the participating agency).

SCA is currently accepting applications for positions to be offered during the 1990 summer/fall season. Positions are filled on a competitive basis. Although specific academic background or previous field experience may be required for some positions, many others require only enthusiasm and the applicants interest in conservation work.

Applications will be accepted as long as positions are available. While there are no final deadlines, application processing does begin at varying times. Applications received by these dates increase the chance of an applicant being accepted for a position: March 1, 1990 for positions beginning May-July 1990 and June 1, 1990 for positions beginning August-September 1990.

The Student Conservation Association offers programs throughout the year. Additional opportunities will be available during the winter of 1990/91.
