SCHOLASTIC RECOGNITION AWARDS

Alpha Sigma Phi is proud to present on an ongoing basis the following chapter and individual scholarship recognition certificates based on term by term scholastic performance.

For Chapters:

- Summa Cum Laude Award to any chapter whose GPA ranks in the top ten percent of the fraternities on campus.
- Scholarship Improvement Award to any chapter whose GPA improves by 12.5% (.5 on a 4.0 scale) or more from one academic term to another.
- Academic Achievement Award to any chapter whose GPA is higher than the campus All Men's GPA.

For Individuals:

- Academic Excellence Award to any brother who achieves a perfect grade point average during any academic term.
- Scholarship Improvement Award to any brother who improves his GPA by 25% (1.0 on a 4.0 scale) or more from one academic term to another.

Every chapter and every brother who qualifies for one of these certificates receives them. All you need to do is apply! See your HSP for applications. They were included in the last mail packet.

ORDER OF OMEGA INITIATES ANNOUNCED

Order of Omega is a national Greek Honorary that was founded at the University of Miami as an honorary for fraternity men. The original constitution was approved on April 14, 1959, which is the recognized founding date. In the spring of 1977, Order of Omega became co-ed.

The purpose of the Order of Omega is as follows:

- 1) To recognize those fraternity men and women who have attained a high standard of leadership in interfraternity activities, to encourage them to continue along this line, and to inspire others to strive for similar conspicuous attainment.
- 2) To bring together outstanding fraternity men and women to create an organization which will help to mold the sentiment of the institution on questions of local and intercollegiate fraternity affairs.
- 3) To bring together members of the faculty, alumni, and student members of the institution's fraternities and sororities on the basis of mutual interest, understanding and helpfulness.

4) To help create an atmosphere where ideas and issues can be discussed openly across Greek lines and to help work out solutions. The following Alpha Sigs were initiated into Order of Omega during 1992:

IDEAS FROM THE ROAD

Goal: Increase interaction between brothers, prevent cliques.

Idea: Group brothers and have them choose their own opportunity for interaction with each other some time during the following two weeks (i.e. see a movie, have lunch, go to a sporting event, etc.)

Seen In Action At: Gamma Pi Chapter, University of Findlay

Officer/Committee Chairman/Brother Responsible for Implementing Idea: Brotherhood Chair and his Committee. (If you do not have a brotherhood committee, elect/appoint one and have them do this as their first activity. Committee should include at least one member from each class year.)

How to implement idea at your chapter: The brotherhood committee should group brothers into small groups of no more than four brothers. Each group should include brothers who do not frequently interact so that each can get to know each other better (i.e., include brothers from different pledge classes, who live in different places, different majors, etc.).

Announce these groupings in chapter meeting, and instruct each group that they are to arrange an opportunity where they can "go out" and interact some time during the next two weeks so they can get to know each other better. They can choose to go to a campus event, movie, play cards, or whatever they like.

After two weeks, have each group report to the chapter what they did together. This is a good opportunity to share funny stories, and tell other brothers unique things they may have learned about other members in their group.

You may want to have a contest and award prizes to groups for "Most Original Activity", "Most Exciting Time", "Funniest Story", "Best Example of Brotherhood", "Most Interesting Thing Learned About Another Brother", or whatever else you choose.

Once the process is complete, begin again with new groups.

Benefits to your chapter: This program is an ideal way to make sure that all brothers are interacting with each other. By doing this you will prevent the formation of cliques, and strengthen your brotherhood.

By focusing on small groups, events can be planned which fit everyone's schedule, and brothers have a greater opportunity to interact and spend "quality time" with each other.

Something to Think About
