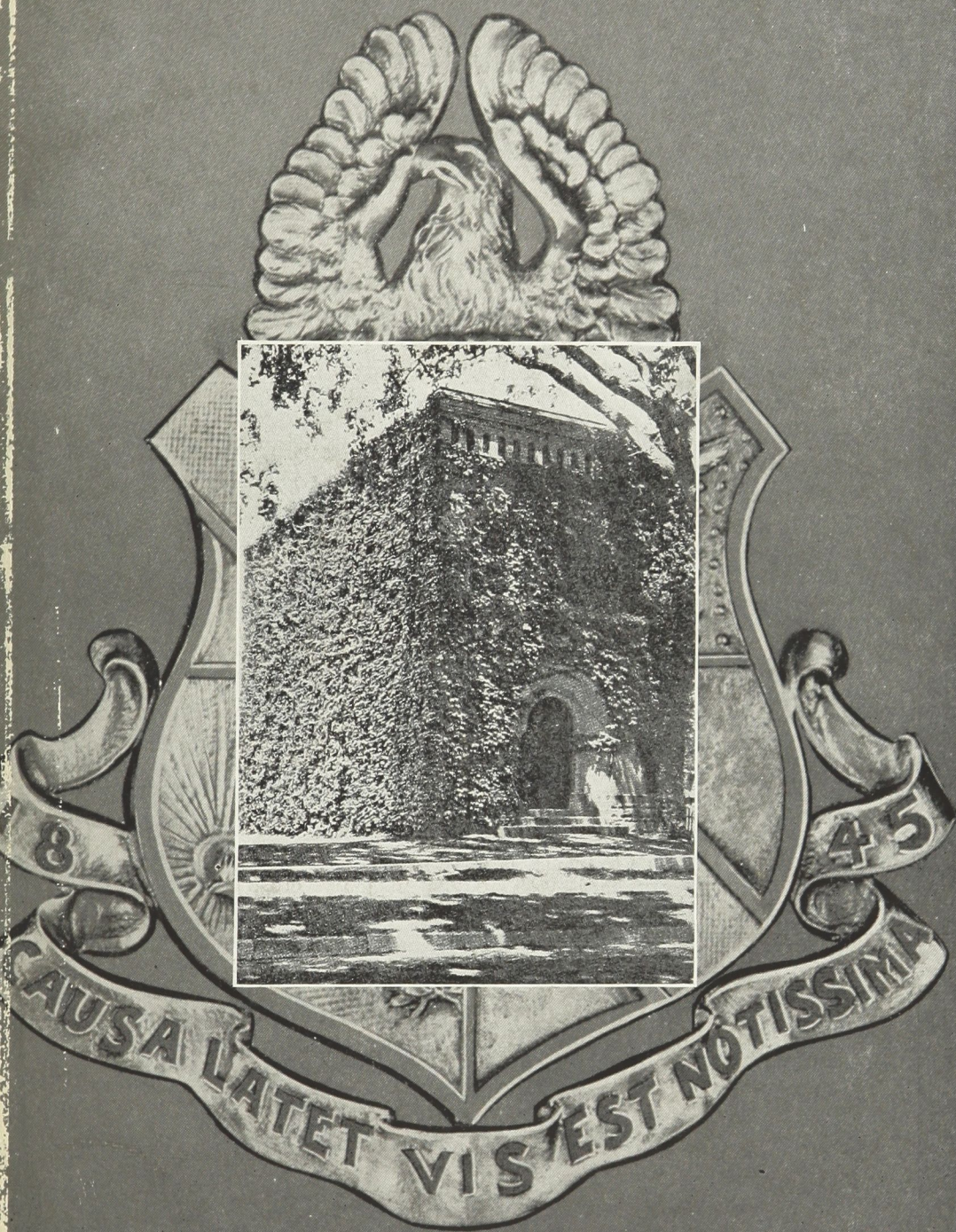

National Interfraternity Conference

Post war problems and plans were the dominant topics at the 35th annual session of the National Interfraternity Conference, November 26 and 27, at the Hotel Commodore in New York City.

As a result of an afternoon program during which six discussion groups debated means for a speedy conversion of improved fraternity chapters to a peace-time program, a number of resolutions were adopted. These resolutions adopted by the delegates of the 54 national college fraternities represented at the Conference, included:

Approval for the principle of government scholarships at war's end if they are made available directly to the members of the armed services, and the merchant marine, and may be used at institutions of their own choice.

Recommendation that every national fraternity take immediate steps to strengthen and implement its chapter alumni associations and have them ready to cooperate with alumni groups of other fraternities on the same campus to carry out a speedy and effective conversion of the chapters to a peace time program at the war's end.

Recommendation that there be closer cooperation between the colleges, and their local fraternity chapters, with respect to maintaining good fraternity finances.

Resolved that the Conference appoint a committee of college admin-

istrators and other leaders to study and carry on a post-war program that will look toward greater coordination of effort between the colleges and the fraternities in meeting post-war educational and fraternity problems. It was directed that this committee should consider, among other things, the rehabilitation of fraternity chapters, and the adaptation of education to changing professional and industrial needs and opportunities.

Recommendation that member fraternities show greater recognition and encouragement to local alumni participation in local chapter activities.

Urged all fraternities to influence any of their chapters which are presently inactive to resume operations when possible.

Two hundred and fifty-six national fraternity leaders and college administrators registered for the Conference which extended through Friday and Saturday forenoon. Approximately 750 fraternity men, and their ladies, attended a Victory luncheon, honoring members in uniform as special guests, staged Friday noon under the chairmanship of L. G. Balfour.

Leroy A. Wilson of New York City, member of the Lambda Chi Alpha and a commercial engineer with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company was elected the chairman of the conference for the coming year.

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Verling C. Enteman of Newark, N. J., member of Delta Phi, an attorney, is the new vice-chairman; Maurice Jacobs of Philadelphia, member of Phi Epsilon Pi, a publisher, was re-elected treasurer, as was Joseph A. Bursley, dean of men at the University of Michigan, as educational adviser to the Conference.

For the first time, the Conference secretaryship duties were divided between two officers. Frank E. Mullins, of New York City, member of Alpha Gamma Rho, vice-president and manager of the National Broadcasting Company, was named the new corresponding secretary, and Ralph F. Burns, of New York City, member of Alpha Sigma Phi, executive manager of the Life Underwriters Association of New York, is the new recording secretary.

Cecil J. Wilkinson gave the Conference War Committee report which revealed the compensation offered for the use of approximately 2,000 fraternity houses currently being used by

the Armed Forces for training soldiers, sailors and marines has been generally accepted as satisfactory; that armed forces' trainees and officer candidates (both Army and Navy and air cadets) can be invited to membership in fraternities and in some cases are being initiated; that national fraternity organizations generally are financially able and operating smoothly despite the war.

Ralph F. Burns announced the results of a compilation made from statistics furnished him by the central headquarters of the various fraternities which indicated that more than 92 per cent of the recent college undergraduates, and approximately half of the alumni members of all fraternities, are now in uniform. His compilation showed, further, that approximately four per cent of the fraternity men in uniform have been named on casualty lists to date and that about three per cent are either dead or missing, and that at least more than one-third of the fraternity men in uniform are now overseas or on duty afloat.

Report On Alumni Dues Campaign

Compared with previous campaigns for funds, the current Alumni Dues Campaign has already set a record—not only in the amount of money collected, but also in the extent of fraternal spirit manifested in the giving. In the period between November 3, when the first contribution arrived, and December 28, the date of this writing, a total of \$4,539.00 has been collected from approximately 900 members. The goal set at the opening of the campaign, but hardly referred to because of its seemingly optimistic quality, was five thousand dollars. This should be reached easily by the end of January, 1944.

Members in the service, at home and overseas, contributed heavily in proportion to civilian members and parents of servicemen sent checks, some without

consulting their sons and some after receiving the go-ahead signal from them.

One wife and mother sent a large check in memory of her husband and son, both members of the Fraternity. One member, about to ignore the appeal, discovered that the founding date of the Fraternity was the same as the birth date of his son and sent a contribution on the strength of that coincidence. A father paid his son's 1944 dues and a few days later a check was received from the son in the South Pacific covering his 1943 dues—the previous appeal had only just reached him. A high point was reached in the case of two Penn. State members, one of whom is in Sicily, the other in Philadelphia. The civilian matched his precedent of 1943 by paying for two service brothers, one of them

the man in Sicily. Later a money order was received from overseas covering the dues for both men, based on the 1943 amount. And a few days later, another money order was received from Sicily adding two dollars to bring the contribution up to the 1944 request. Out of this confusion several members of Upsilon are well paid-up in advance.

Many of the younger members in the service accompanied their checks and cash with notes expressing their desire to return to their schools at the end of the war and the wish that the chapters be ready to open as soon as peace is declared.

Several members sent suggestions for better handling of similar campaigns in the future and many added unnecessary but welcome notes of their happiness at being able to help the Fraternity.

Contributions will be acknowledged individually as soon as the bulk of the returns are in and each acknowledgment

will be accompanied by the usual pocket card. Meanwhile, the Grand Council and the chairman of the campaign wish to thank each of the contributors, and the many men who helped by signing and sending out reminder cards and forwarding checks sent to them personally.

The list appearing below includes all members whose contributions were received on or before December 28. The names of members sending in funds after that date will appear in the March *Tomahawk*. Names are listed in the order in which the contributions were received.

It is good to know that the members feel so kindly toward the Old Gal and that many of them, especially those younger men now in the service, have made this feeling apparent to their parents and wives who have sent many letters of appreciation for the values received by their sons and husbands as members of Alpha Sigma Phi.

Here a person experiences the distinct sensation of transition from temperate to arctic zones in all its phases. I arrived in Anchor-

age in time to join the local ski club's summer trips and when the club's activities slowed down I bought a car and made some trips. Anchorage is one of the few towns in Alaska which is not crowded in the space between two hills; it has one paved street but spreads out from there in all directions. Many of the houses are quite modern in design, but quite a few cabins still exist, many of them very well built and among the oldest dwellings in town." 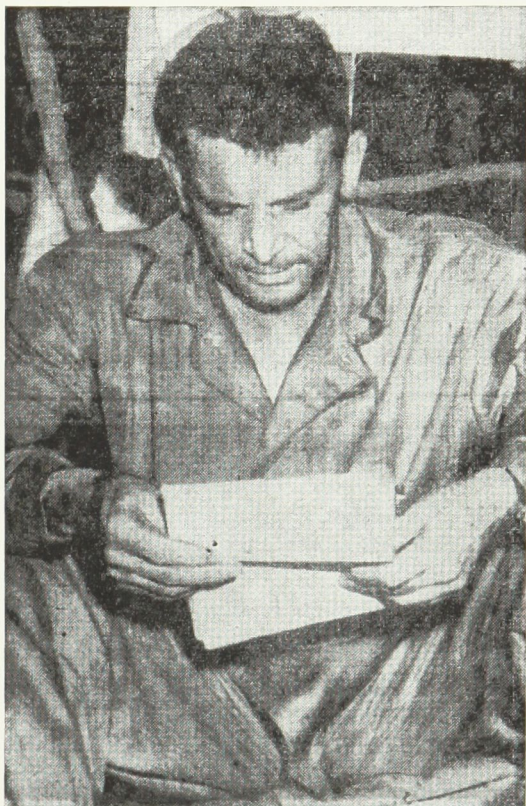

Previous to this message, Ensign Stivers' name had been mentioned in various short-wave broadcasts, the last of which was picked up on the West Coast, having been sent from the prison camp and being a broadcast of an entertainment put on by the prisoners saying that Ensign Stivers had acted as one of the masters of ceremonies. One of the mc's jokingly announced that their entertainment was so much appreciated they were

being held over by special request for another show next Spring.

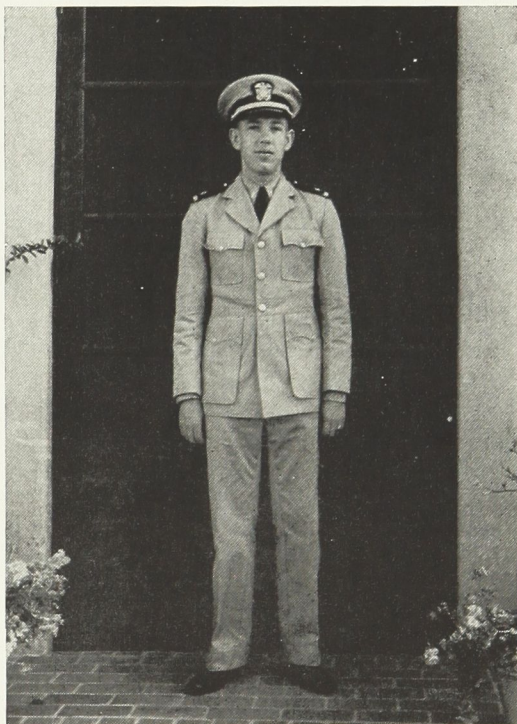

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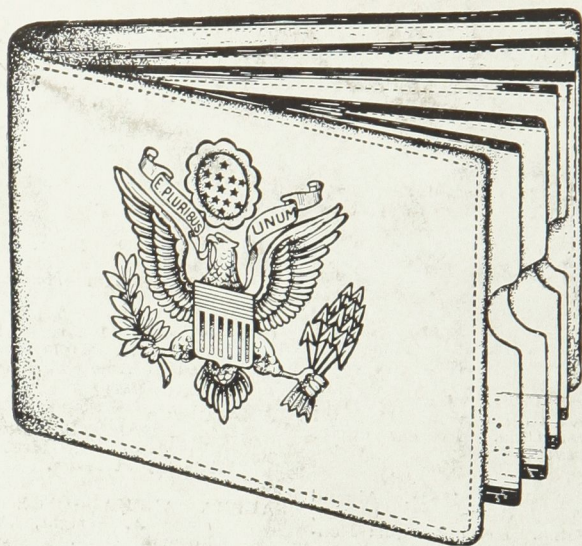
