Philip G. Johnson Elected Seattle's "First Citizen"

American air power in general, and the famous Flying Fortress and other Boeing aircraft in particular, won national recognition at the recent annual banquet of the Seattle Real Estate Board.

Before an attendance of more than 650, representing business, educational, military and cultural leaders, and state and city executives, Philip G. Johnson, Washington '14, president of the Boeing Aircraft Company, was presented with a plaque as "Seattle's First Citizen" of 1943.

The presentation was made by the New York investment banker who believed in the future of aviation when others shied from it, and who underwrote the expansion of the now world-famous Flying Fortress builders. Joseph P. Ripley, chairman of Harriman, Ripley and Company, made a special trip to Seattle to be the keynote speaker of the evening.

Mr. Ripley, who knew Johnson "'way back when" and whose life and business has made him one of the colorful figures of the country, etched Johnson's humble beginning and rise to fame

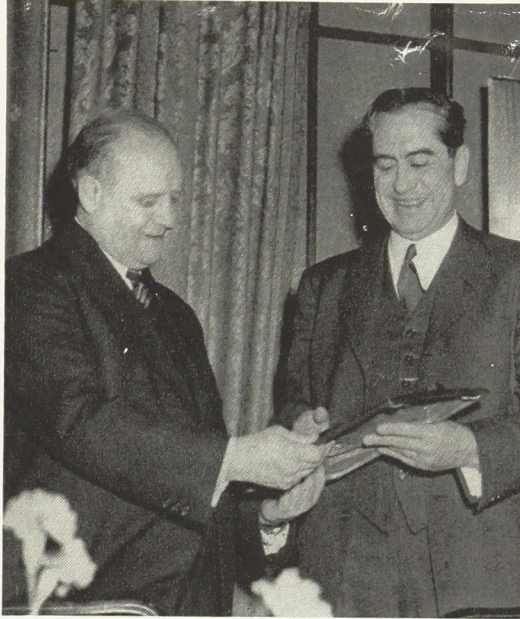
"Phil Johnson is a true pioneer in aviation," he asserted. "As such, his name should be added to the list of pioneers of the Northwest. In the world of aviation, Phil Johnson and his associates have firmly established Seattle and the Northwest in a position of leadership."

Enumerating the many developments

in aviation of the Boeing Company would be quite a job, Ripley explained, but pointed out as impressive examples the Flying Fortress, the Clipper, the Stratoliner, the Boeing 247 (which marked the greatest single forward step in the science of air transport), the radio telephone, and numerous others.

Dealing with what he called "the human side" of Johnson, the speaker declared that "no one in aviation is better known, more respected, more beloved . . . among his many virtues is a natural generosity, a desire to share with others."

When he presented the plaque,

Ripley declared:

"Phil Johnson is more than first citizen of Seattle; he is first citizen of the United States and of the world."

Deeply touched with the tribute paid him, Johnson replied that, "I could never have won this honor without the loyalty and cooperation of my many associates."

Among the distinguished guests were Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington and Gov. Earl Warren of California, and among the many congratulatory telegrams received was one from Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker.

We of Alpha Sigma Phi also extend our congratulations to Brother Johnson. We have long known him as one of our "first citizens" and are proud that public recognition of his fine qualities has been given.

In Memoriam

Charles D. Ensign, Harvard '12, passed away on July 2, 1942.

Frank S. Brush, Marietta '74, died on March 13, 1940.

Ens. John M. Green, Yale '39, was lost from the U.S.S. Meredith in action on October 15, 1942.

Harold R. Pickett, Ohio State '09, died at his home in Bellevue, Ohio, on July 30, 1941. Brother Pickett was a commercial grower and frozen fruit packer. He is survived by his wife and son and two married daughters.

Clarence A. Loescher, Wisconsin '14, passed away on February 7, 1941.

Paul J. Moore, Cornell '21, died at his home in Los Angeles, California.

Ens. Robert S. Bray, Massachusetts State '33, died at the Marine Hospital in Baltimore on October 23, 1943.

Henry C. Cowles, Chicago '22, died on September 12, 1939.

Dr. William W. Boyd, Marietta '80, died at Columbus, Ohio, on February 3, 1944. Dr. Boyd was president emeritus of Western College and had devoted his entire life to the promotion of education. The advancement of Western College, of which he was active president from 1914 to 1931, might be said to be his outstanding work. He is survived by his daughter, Marion, Mrs. Walter Havighurst.

Lt. Carl Sautter, Yale '38, was killed in action on January 20. He was the pilot of a bomber, based in Italy, and had been on foreign service for nine months. He is survived by his parents, a sister and brother.

Robert T. Young, U.C.L.A. '27, died on August 2, 1942.

On August 27, 1943, Capt. Howard Krippner, Washington '41, was killed in China when his P-38 crashed while on a truck-strafting raid.

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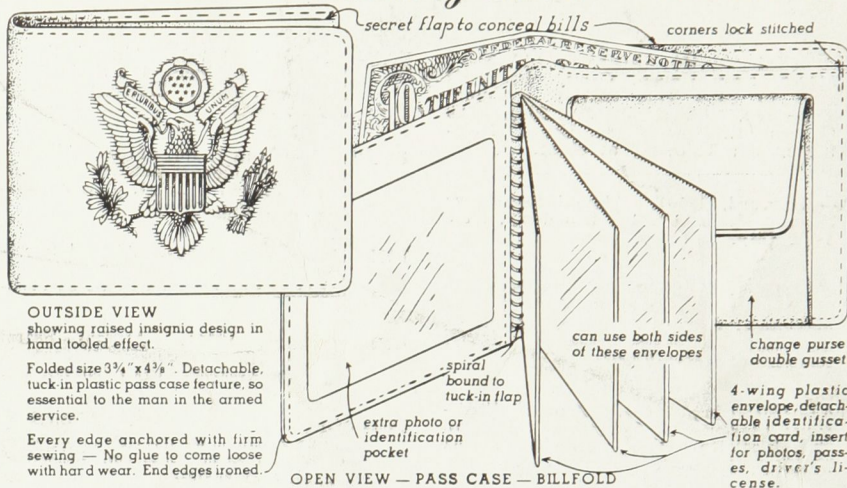
