April 22, 23, 24, 1960

70. Meeting Called to Order:

The meeting was called to order by Grand Senior President Charles T. Akre at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, April 22, 1960 at the Union League Club, Chicago, Illinois.

71. Attendance:

In attendance at the meeting were the following members of the Grand Council: Charles T. Akre, W. Gardner Mason, Donald J. Hornberger, Dallas L. Donnan, and Emmet B. Hayes. Also in attendance were Executive Secretary Burns and Field Representative Ned Adams.

72. Approval of Grand Council Minutes:

It was moved by Brother Hornberger, seconded by Brother Mason and passed, that the Minutes of the Grand Council Meeting of September 25, 26, 27, 1959 be approved as distributed.

73. Review of the Actions Taken by the Grand Council since the previous meeting:

The review of the actions taken since the previous meeting of the Grand Council was made by Executive Secretary Burns and is attached as Exhibit A.

A. Mail Votes:

The mail votes taken were:

1. Reserve Fund loan to the Alabama Chapter was approved.
2. Petition from Morris-Harvey College, Charleston, West Virginia, was approved.
3. Loan to the Alpha Sigma Phi of Philadelphia was approved.
4. The Alpha Sigma Phi Alumni Association Beta Chi Chapter, Inc. loan from the Reserve Fund was approved.

It was moved by Brother Hayes, seconded by Brother Hornberger that the Grand Council confirm the Alabama loan, the Alpha Sigma Phi of Philadelphia loan and the Morris-Harvey petition. The motion was approved.

74. Financial Reports:

A. Attached as exhibits are the following:

B. It was moved by Brother Hayes, seconded by Brother Mason and passed that the amount of \$3651.71, a liability in the General Fund and an asset in the Reserve Fund, be referred to Brothers Hornberger and Burns for further study and that authority be given to them to make the proper adjustments in the books with the concurrence of Brother Donnan by June 30, 1960.

C. Reserve Fund:

1. It was noted by Brother Donnan that loans from the Reserve Fund totaling \$94,589.97 have been made to 30 chapters and alumni corporations since 1942-43 with a total of 61 loans. Of these loans, the Fraternity has received in principal and interest \$50,229.51. It was further noted that two loans were written off a year ago.
2. It was moved by Brother Donnan, seconded by Brother Hayes and passed, that the Grand Council increase to four (4) per cent the maximum amount of interest on new loans from the Reserve Fund.
3. The Grand Council directed the executive secretary to go through the regular procedure in the matter of a possible loan from the Reserve Fund to the Hartwick Chapter. It was decided not enough information was available at this time.

D. General Fund:

1. It was moved by Brother Hornberger, seconded by Brother Mason and passed, that the surplus cash in the General Fund, up to a total of \$15,000, be invested in short-term U.S. Treasury notes.
2. It was moved by Brother Hornberger, and seconded by Brother Hayes, that the National Office be empowered to purchase a new IBM electric typewriter. The motion was approved.
3. It was moved by Brother Akre, seconded by Brother Hayes, and passed, that the National Office be empowered to purchase a 5-ton Rheem

air conditioning unit for the amount of \$1650,  
the amount to be divided between the fiscal  
years, 1959-60 and 1960-61; providing the  
executive secretary make provision with the  
landlord that such unit not be considered part  
of the realty under the terms of the present  
lease or any extension thereof.

E. Tomahawk Trustees:

The Grand Council directed the executive secretary to gather biographical data on several Brothers for consideration as additional trustees on the Tomahawk Fund.

F. Grand Council Meeting Expenses:

It was moved by Brother Donnan, seconded by  
Brother Hornberger and passed, that the expenses  
of the Grand Council for this meeting be paid.

75. Report of the Alumni Affairs Committee:

The executive secretary made known that there was as yet no chairman for this committee and consequently no report.

76. Report of the Awards Committee:

Brother Hayes, Chairman of the Awards Committee, reported as follows:

A. Delta Beta Xi:

Brother Hayes reported that eight Brothers had been elected in 1959 and that twelve may be elected in 1960 if we so desire.

Eighteen nominees were mentioned and a committee of Brothers Hayes, Donnan, Hornberger and Burns were to ~~make~~ the nominations.

It was moved by Brother Hayes and seconded  
by Brother Mason that the following men be

The motion was approved.

B. Distinguished Service Award:

1. Brother Hayes reported further that the 1959 Distinguished Service Award would be presented to Brother Robert L. Jagocki, as approved at the April, 1959 Grand Council Meeting.
2. It was moved by Brother Hayes, seconded by  
Brother Donnan and passed that Brother George  
E. Worthington be awarded the Distinguished  
Service Award for 1960.

C. Distinguished Merit Award:

It was moved by Brother Hayes and seconded  
by Brother Mason that Dr. Winfred Overholser  
be awarded the Distinugished Merit Award for  
1959 and that he be invited to the Convention  
to receive the Award. The motion was approved.

D. Other Convention Awards:

1. Brother Hayes reported that other Convention Awards will be taken care of in cooperation with the National Office.

2. At the request of Brother Akre, it was decided to add to the questionnaire pertaining to the "Best Chapter Award" the question: "How many men in your Chapter are not initiated because they fail to attain necessary academic requirements?"

E. Chapter Awards:

The matter of Awards on the Province level on scholarship, best chapter, best fraternity man, etc. will be referred to Province Chiefs, and Alumni Councils with a view toward generating their interest in such awards.

77. Chapter Progress Reports:

A. American University:

1. It was moved by Brother Donnan, seconded by Brother Mason and passed, that the mail vote concerning the loan of \$5000 to the American University Alumni Corporation from the Reserve Fund be confirmed and that the loan be held in abeyance until such time as the Alumni Corporation should require it.
2. It was moved by Brother Hayes, seconded by Brother Hornberger and passed that by reason of a complaint received by Ralph Burns, a member of the Fraternity, against Robert John Hawk, a Brother of the Fraternity initiated into Beta Chi Chapter of the American University, the Grand Council causes him to be served with said complaint and be summoned before a trial court to hear the issues received by the complainant and that the Trial Court be authorized

to pass judgment on those issues, giving appropriate notification to the Grand Council of their determination. Such judgment may include relief, including maximum penalty of expulsion from the Fraternity, the Trial Court to further have the authority to pass judgment of maximum as well as any lesser penalties.

That the Grand Senior President of the Fraternity, on behalf of the Grand Council, be empowered to designate the members of the Trial Court to hear these complaints.

3. It was moved by Brother Mason, seconded by Brother Donnan and passed, that by reason of the complaint received by Ralph Burns, a member of the Fraternity, against Francis Albert Morgan, a Brother of the Fraternity initiated into Beta Chi Chapter of American University the Grand Council causes him to be served with said complaint and summoned before a trial court to hear the issues raised by the complainant and that the Trial Court be authorized to pass judgment on those issues, giving appropriate notification to the Grand Council of their determination. Such judgment may include relief, including maximum penalty of expulsion

from the Fraternity, the Trial Court to further have the authority to pass judgment of maximum as well as any lesser penalties. That the Grand Senior President, on behalf of the Grand Council, be empowered to designate the members of the Trial Court to hear these complaints.

B. University of Washington:

A general discussion took place on Mu Chapter, University of Washington, and how to invite alumni interest.

It was moved by Brother Hayes and seconded by Brother Hornberger that Mu Chapter, University of Washington, be suspended, to take effect May 12, 1960, unless a recommendation to the contrary is received and approved by the Grand Council from an investigating committee composed of Ralph Burns, Executive Secretary; James Kaldal, Province Chief; and Dallas Donnan, Grand Councilor, before that date. The motion was passed.

C. University of Kentucky:

It was moved by Brother Hornberger, seconded by Brother Hayes and passed, that upon recommendation of Brothers John Blackburn and Ralph Burns, Sigma Chapter of the University of Kentucky be suspended indefinitely and that



the Grand Chapter Advisor of that Chapter  
be intrusted with the charter and para-  
phernalia and that the Administration of  
the University of Kentucky be so informed  
as well as the undergraduate Brothers and  
all Sigma Chapter alumni.

D. Washington University:

The matter of Washington University Chapter requesting relief from their suspension was referred to the Grand Chapter Advisor and Province Chief for recommendation and possible mail vote by the Grand Council.

E. West Virginia University:

On the West Virginia University Chapter's appeal for relief of their suspension, no action was taken.

F. Chapter Scholarship:

1. A communication should be sent to Province Chiefs, Grand Chapter Advisors, and to the Chapters, commending the scholarship standing of the following chapters by the Grand Council:

H. Chapter Finances:

Communications should be sent the various chapters regarding the following matters:

1. University of Arizona:

The Grand Council hopes that steps will be taken to correct the unpaid balance of \$589.25 overdue to the Fraternity.

2. University of Missouri:

A communication to Missouri of congratulations on new pledges and urging steps to make the Reserve Fund payments current.

3. University of Oklahoma:

A communication urging the Chapter to clear up the matter of "inactive" undergraduates.

4. Illinois Institute of Technology:

The Grand Council views with alarm the matter of accounts receivable and so suggests to the Province Chief, Grand Chapter Advisor, and the Chapter, that this be cleaned up by the end of the year.

5. Michigan State University:

The Grand Council is happy to note that arrangements have been made to fulfill financial obligations.

6. Bethany College:

A communication to the Province Chief, the Grand Council to review conditions and to inquire whether progress has been made in regard to the obligations to the Reserve Fund and urges the Province Chief to take steps to have the obligation refinanced from outside to clear up the amount owed to the Reserve Fund of \$6,088.81.

7. West Virginia University

A rush letter to Province Chief and Grand Chapter Advisor informing them that it is urgent their financial obligations be paid off and the suspension of the chapter be lifted and that the pledges presently processed be initiated immediately.

8. West Virginia Wesleyan:

Urge Province Chief and Grand Chapter Advisor to take steps to make Reserve Fund note current with the possibility of refinancing.

9. Wake Forest College:

Be it known that the Grand Council has reached the end of its patience in regard to the payment of the Wake Forest note.

10. Stevens Institute of Technology:

Suggest to the Province Chief that he review the status of the financial obligations of the Chapter to the Fraternity with a view to putting them on a current basis.

11. University of Massachusetts:

Receive an explanation from the Chapter in regard to their obligations to the National Fraternity and get them on a current basis before the end of the year.

I. Various Chapter Matters:

1. University of California:

A letter of congratulations on improvement of overall operations.

2. Milton College:

Recommend to the Province Chief that Brother Calvin Boxley be asked to speak at their next Founders' Day dinner.

3. Wayne State University:

Commendation on work done in improving the House.

4. Mount Union College:

It was moved by Brother Mason, seconded by Brother Hornberger and passed, that the charter of the Mount Union Chapter be withdrawn at the end of the academic year, 1959-60,

unless the Chapter and its advisors can formulate a program of action that will have a reasonable chance of fulfillment.

5. Marshall College:

It was moved by Brother Hayes, seconded by Brother Hornberger and passed, that the charter of the Marshall Chapter be withdrawn at the end of the academic year, 1959-60, unless the Chapter and its advisors can formulate a program of action that will have a reasonable chance of fulfillment.

78. Committee Chairmen Reports:

The Grand Council requests that the Chairmen of all Committees submitting reports be thanked, and that special thanks go to Brother George Worthington for his work in extension.

79. Report of Extension Committee:

The report of the Extension Committee is appended as Exhibit I.

A. Approval of Institutions for Extension:

It was moved by Brother Akre and seconded by Brother Mason that Louisiana Polytechnic Institute and any other institutions listed in the extension report not on the approved list for extension be placed on that list for submission to the Chapter. The motion was approved.

B. Ripon College:

In the discussion with regard to the matter of Ripon College, it was decided to allow that local to come to the National Fraternity rather than we pursuing them.

C. Fees at the Time of Installation:

The Grand Council directed the executive secretary to inquire of Brother Kramer, Chairman of the Law Committee to ascertain if the Grand Council has the authority to make reductions paid by new members at the time of installation of a new Chapter, specifically reductions concerning the pledge fee, the Reserve Fund, one-half annual dues and the initiation fee proper.

D. Report of George Worthington:

A letter of appreciation to Brother Worthington on this matter; the entire report to be referred to the Extension Committee.

E. Report of Brother George Schurr:

The report of extension activities of Brother Schurr is appended as Exhibit J, and is to be referred to the Extension Committee.

After discussion of this report, and the extension activities of Brother Schurr in California, the Grand Council requested that many thanks be offered for his work and a suggestion to the effect that it might be advisable for the locals in the California area to assume the initiative in contacting the Fraternity.

80. Report of the Housing Committee:

The report of the Housing Committee is appended to these minutes as Exhibit K.

Brother Hornberger requested a check on the action of the 1948 Convention in raising the Tomahawk subscription to \$15 from \$10.

The Grand Council referred to Brother Hawkins the following matters:

1. Are we safe in the diverting of \$5 of the Tomahawk subscription into the General Fund?

2. Will the \$10 going into the Tomahawk Fund take care of the publication of the magazine according to present rates?
  3. Will pegging the Tomahawk Fund at \$200,000 and diverting the subscription into the A-S-P Corporation allow us to operate the publication of the magazine?
  4. What is the maximum total we need to support the publication of the Tomahawk, the printing and mailing costs?

The Grand Council desires a report on this by June 30th., 1960.

31. Report of the Committee on Instruction:

The Executive Secretary was instructed to correspond with Brother Burnside, thanking him for his report, appended as Exhibit L, and the work done on the pre- and post-initiation examinations and requesting him to keep in mind work on a possible pledge-trainers' manual.

32. Report of the Law Committee:

No report of the Law Committee was made at this time.

33. Report of the Magazine Committee:

It was moved by Brother Hayes, seconded by Brother Mason and passed, that the Grand Council accept the report of Brother Coburn and adopt the recommendations contained therein including publications dates with the exception that the newsletter continue to be called the "Mystic Circle". That these recommendations be taken on a one-year trial basis.

This report is appended as Exhibit M.

34. Report of Province Chiefs:

A. It was moved by Brother Donnan, seconded by Brother Mason that:

1. Oklahoma be removed from Province III and placed in a new Province to be known as Province XVI.
2. That present Province X be split with chapters at West Virginia University, West Virginia Wesleyan, Bethany, and Davis & Elkins continued in Province X and that Marshall, Marietta and Morris-Harvey be incorporated into a new Province to be known as Province XVII.
3. That Cincinnati be removed from Province IX and placed in Province VIII.
4. That Arizona be taken from Province II and placed in a new Province to be known as Province XVIII.

The motion was approved.

B. It was moved by Brother Donnan and seconded by Brother Mason that Brother James Fisher be appointed Chief of newly formed Province XVII. The motion was passed.

35. Report of Public Relations Committee:

No report of this committee was made. The Grand Council requested the executive secretary to communicate with Brother Ed Drew, Chairman, and request a report from him by June, 1960.

36. Report of the Purposes & Objects Committee:

No report was presented from Brother Bell. The



Grand Council suggested, with a recommendation from Brother Akre, that matters concerning the possible creation of a Chapter Standards Officer and Chapter Scholarship Officer as elected officers of the Chapter be referred to the Province Chiefs and the Purposes & Objects Committee for their views.

It is requested of the Province Chiefs and the Purposes & Objects Committee, that the suggested duties and objects of these new officers be clearly outlined.

37. Report of the Scholarship Committee:

Brother Ray Glos' report on Scholarship is appended as Exhibit N.

38. 1960 Convention:

No new Committee assignments were made. Brother Burns requested the Grand Council's opinion of a possible keepsake or memento from this Convention in conjunction with the 100th Anniversary of Delta Chapter. The Grand Council instructed Brother Burns to make a further check into the matter including cost.

Brother Burns submitted for approval of the Grand Council a tentative agenda and schedule for the Convention which was approved with one or two slight alterations. The suggested agenda is appended as Exhibit O.

Brother Burns requested the Council's opinion in regard to luncheon and dinner speakers. It was suggested that speakers of this nature for the Convention were an excellent idea provided there was a limitation in time to possibly fifteen or twenty minutes per speaker.

39. Memorial Fund:

The Grand Council instructed the executive secretary to solicit information from the chapters on scholarship and suggested an award be given in the form of cash from the Memorial Fund to the top three scholars in the probable amounts of \$50, \$100, and \$150.

It was moved by Brother Hayes, seconded  
by Brother Donnan and passed, that the  
executive secretary solicit nominations

from Chapters for scholastic awards  
to be announced at the time of the 1960  
Convention.

90. The Pasadena Conference:


It was moved by Brother Hayes, and seconded

It was moved by Brother Hornberger and  
seconded by Brother Hayes that the executive  
secretary be instructed to write to persons  
in charge of the Pasadena Conference informing  
them that Alpha Sigma Phi is not now, nor has  
ever been a member of said Conference and will  
not pay the dues solicited by the Conference.  
The motion was approved.

Subject: Report of the Extension Committee

The list of 69 institutions (prepared by the fraternity office as being ideal for expansion) has been broken down into the various provinces and the province chiefs were written concerning the institutions in their area. (See Exhibit "A") No response has been received from these letters, nor was any expected by the Chairman. A follow-up letter will be sent in the near future requesting a response or a reaction to the original letter.

The Grand Council is, I am sure, well informed on the Morris-Harvey installation. We believe that this college is a fine addition to Alpha Sigma Phi. The next expansion probably should be Louisiana Polytechnic Institute at Ruston, Louisiana. George Worthington made the initial contact, and Ralph also visited alumni in the area as well as the campus. Scholarship for the Ruston local is at present somewhat unsatisfactory, but we are hopeful that improvement will be made this semester and we should be prepared to move and move fast if this improvement is shown. I believe we have the inside track on this Local, and we should not lose the initiative.

Information received from Ripon College indicates that the Local there is interested in Alpha Sigma Phi and that it holds a position of prestige on the campus. I am sure that Ralph will inform you of the problem associated with this local. Somehow I feel that this is not an unsurmountable problem. There are several possibilities:

- 1) Initiate only the active chapter and maybe an alumnus or a faculty advisor at the time of installation - alumni to be initiated later only by the concurrence and wishes of the active chapter and approval of the Grand Council.
- 2) Receive assurances from the Local that the men in question will not be presented.
- 3) Take a wild chance and hope that everything works out

all right. My feeling is that serious consideration should be given to the Local, and I believe that the important thing is that the Grand Council should not be involved. In other words, as long as the men in question are not presented at the time of installation, the responsibility then falls upon the local chapter. This, I believe, is in keeping with our constitution and by-laws. It will certainly be necessary for someone to visit the Local and some of the alumni and feel them out concerning the problem.

In competing with other national fraternities for desirable locals, we have found that other groups waive and reduce fees in order to be in a better position to compete for a specific local. I would like to suggest the following figures as desirable reductions to be used only at the discretion of the Executive Secretary:

There are certainly going to be many opportunities for expansion, and a tremendous amount of work is going to be involved. We, as yet, have not clearly defined all of our procedures, standards, and responsibilities for expansion. It is clearly apparent that the Extension Committee is going to have to assume more responsibility than it is at present undertaking. Therefore, I would like to recommend that a meeting of the Extension Committee be held in July for the purpose of formulating definite policy, procedures, and responsibilities. I would suggest that Ralph Burns make the arrangements for such a meeting and that it be held in the central part of the United States. The results of this meeting would be presented to the Grand Council at its September meeting.

I am listing below some institutions that I feel need the immediate attention of the Extension Committee and the Fraternity:

- 1) Louisiana Polytechnic Institute, Ruston, Louisiana
- 2) Ripon College, Ripon, Wisconsin
- 3) Tulane University, New Orleans, Louisiana
- 4) San Diego State College, San Diego, California
- 5) University of California, Santa Barbara, California
- 6) Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo, Michigan

If the Extension Committee meets in July, I believe concrete plans can be made at that time for expansion to specific institutions.

I believe there are now, and will be in the next five years, opportunities for sound progressive expansion for Alpha Sigma Phi.

The Grand Council is looking to the province chiefs and the members of the Extension Committee to assume the responsibility of expansion activities in the various areas in the United States. I think you will find it to your advantage to call upon alumni to assist you in your province.

For the past several years members of the fraternity office staff and others have visited many campuses in the country. From these personal contacts and from other sources of information, we have compiled a list of 69 institutions in 32 states where we would like to have a chapter. This is our priority list, but in no respect should it be considered complete. Enclosed is a list of the institutions in your province for which you will be responsible. We would like for you to investigate these institutions relative to the possibilities for expansion. If there are other institutions in the area not listed by us, feel free to investigate them also.

The procedure should be as follows:

- 1) Visit as many of the institutions as possible;
- 2) Determine which institutions' administrations are favorable to Alpha Sigma Phi;
- 3) Create alumni interest and form an alumni group to sponsor the expansion program for that particular

- institution; and
- 4) Notify Ralph Burns and me of the progress you are making.

Subject: Comments with respect to my visit to 44 Colleges and  
Universities, January 4 to date, and a summary of  
Extension survey as to 38.

In my visit to 44 colleges and universities, I drove 12,070 miles of which 5,358 were exclusively for fraternity work. The remainder of the mileage I consider as personal, representing the number of miles for a direct trip to Riverside, California via Mandeville, Louisiana and return, plus personal trips for which I would not have claimed mileage if I had been on an expense account.

During the above period, I expended the following number of hours in making extension surveys at colleges, conferences with alumni, preparation of reports, visitation of six chapter, correspondence and travel time:

January:	133 hours

Eliminating all travel time from the foregoing gives the following result:

For the above, in payment of my fee, in lieu of expenses, I have received \$750. (My expenses in connection with fraternity work and excluding what I would have expended on a direct trip to Riverside and return, amounted to \$763.97.) Thus, the extension survey of 38 colleges and universities was made at an average expense to the Fraternity of \$19.72 per institution. For the 44 institutions,

which included chapter visitation, the average expense was \$17.04 per institution.

On the following pages, is a discussion of the college and universities on which I recommend we concentrate during 1960-62. In appendix "A" is a chronological list of all institutions visited, with my recommendation as to priorities and time for action.

There are locals in about four institutions, three of which: Sacramento State, Chico State and College of the Pacific now are receiving attention from Brother George Schurr, President of the Sacramento Alumni Council. The National Office should give prompt attention and assistance as to the first two. I think we have given enough attention to College of the Pacific for the present. The fourth is Arizona State University at Tempe, near Phoenix. A copy of my report on A.S.U. should go to all Phoenix and Tempe alumni and an effort be made for some of them to investigate the locals with a view to encouraging a petition to Alpha Sigma Phi. (see text of report)

I believe that individual reports have been filed on all but three of the 38.

COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES IN SOUTH AND  
SOUTHWEST ON WHICH WE SHOULD CONCENTRATE IN THE PERIOD  
1960-1962

Colleges and Universities are expanding and developing rapidly in: California, Louisiana, Arizona and New Mexico. Already we are a little late in getting our foot in the door, where other fraternities have stampeded since World War II to put chapters on the campuses even in some of these colleges where they knew that no houses would be possible for some time.

I. Possibilities in the South

The South particularly shows a rapid influx during the past six years of old as well as new fraternities. One reason given is that there will never be any pressure from college administrators or State legislatures with respect to integration. In the South, some administrators frankly say: "If you have any negro members, you will not be permitted to establish a chapter on our campus." On the contrary, in California and New Mexico, they bluntly say: "If you have any discriminatory provisions with respect to race or religion, whether exoteric or esoteric, it will be futile to try to establish a chapter on our campus." It was indicated that an application from such a fraternity would be tabled at the start. At a Methodist College in California, a Dean of Men who favors Alpha Sigma Phi, after he was informed that it has no discriminatory clauses, remarked that the Methodist are opposed to racial discrimination. He said, "I wish the older fraternities would take a leaf from the book of younger fraternities like Lambda Chi Alpha - which never has practiced discrimination and has become one of the largest in only fifty years. The old fraternities are too conservative."

There are a number of locals in State Colleges in California avail-

able to us with one or more negroes. Segregation still exists, however, as shown by the existence of negro fraternities there.

#### Louisiana Tech

Knowing so well the feeling of so many of our older alumni, I believe that we should place special emphasis on expansion into southern colleges and universities. Therefore, as a start, I think we should press forward immediately to foster a petition from Lambda Tau at Louisiana Tech, Ruston, Louisiana, as soon as it is no longer on probation. Shreveport alumni are now more interested in this college than L.S.U., Baton Rouge, and this interest should be stimulated. If this local remains on probation, for scholarship reasons, Dean of Men S.K. Lewis should be encouraged to organize another local with a view toward nationalization by Alpha Sigma Phi. If we would get a chapter there, it may help us to put chapters in two or three other Louisiana and Mississippi State colleges, especially South West Louisiana Institute, Mississippi Southern, and North East Louisiana State. They want nationals which have chapters in the same league.

#### Tulane University

We are very much wanted at Tulane by Dr. John H. Stibbs, Dean of Students. Housing is not too much of a drawback as housing is relatively inexpensive. The Dean estimates present values from \$30,000 to \$40,000 and some fraternities rent. Tulane is one of the better southern universities and has greatly improved its building situation in recent years. I have watched its progress over the years as it is but a few blocks from my sister's home. Unfortunately, there aren't many of our alumni there. I was sent only two cards of alumni in New Orleans from our office. There must be more than that, as there were nine in 1937, according to our directory.

#### Emory

Emory is one of the finest universities in the south and if we could get on that campus, it would assist us in other southern schools. Dean Rice believes that some of the fraternities there are too large and is contemplating a move to place a ceiling on memberships in order to make room for another fraternity. He is a member of Phi Delta Theta as is also my nephew, Dr. Theodore Weber, Professor of Social Ethics at Emory who made the appointment for me. He will keep my nephew informed when the proposed change is made and my nephew will keep in touch with me. About 70 % of the undergraduate men belong to the 13 national fraternities at Emory. Our first step should be to organize our Atlanta alumni. I attempted this 20 years ago when I was Chairman of Extension. I invited them to lunch with me and about 6 showed up. They manifested some interest but with the beginning of World War II, the project was abandoned and thereafter I was relieved of my extension work. We perhaps cannot get on this campus before 1962, but alumni organization should be started without delay.

University of South Carolina

For the University of South Carolina, where the fraternity climate is poor, we must depend on Brother Ben Collins and the alumni in and around Columbia for forming a colony. I hope I was able to initiate a little interest among them. There probably will be no housing problem as the university provides a quadrangle for fraternities at a low per annum payment. I met with several alumni and I believe that this was followed up by Brother Burns. This situation might develop in 1960-61. The men at Presbyterian College believe that a chapter at U.S.C. would help them in rushing.

Louisiana State University

I suggest that we place Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, on our extension calendar for 1961-62. The University has 7 new lots for fraternity houses which have not yet been allocated and which will be leased for 99 years at a nominal amount. The University will guarantee mortgages on houses up to \$40,000. We have about a dozen alumni in Baton Rouge but the cards came too late, (on the eve of my leaving Louisiana) for me to use. I don't know if any of these are on the faculty. I have a grandnephew at L.S.U., Baton Rouge, a sophomore, who had pledged to Phi Gamma Delta. He lived in the house for a month and then depledged himself as he thought it interfered with his studies. He's a straight "A" student. There are 6700 male students at L.S.U., Baton Rouge, and 19 nationals (no locals). Through him, I have obtained some inside glimpses of student life at L.S.U. I would like L.S.U. to appear on our priority list for early action.

University of Texas

For Texas, we should strive to organize a colony at the great, sprawling University of Texas, with a 14,000 male enrollment and 31 nationals (no locals) and an endowment of 400 or 500 millions. Dean of Men Jack Holland would like to have us on the campus as he says they need one or two more good fraternities. They do not at present have enough fraternities for the large body of eligible students. Here, of course, housing is a problem and yet there are fraternities here which are well-housed and yet less solvent than we are, such as Delta Sigma Phi. I did not, at the time, have the names of any alumni so was unable to contact any Alpha Sigs. At El Paso, where the cards reached me, I noted that one of the three names sent me, seemed to indicate that one might be on the Texas Supreme Court. There are 16 Alpha Sigs at San Antonio, 70 miles away. If we could colonize and have a chapter at the University of Texas, it would make it much easier for us to get on the campuses at S.M.U. and T.C.U. (There are about 50 Alpha Sigs in the immediate vicinity of Dallas and Fort Worth.) to say nothing of Texas Western at El Paso, which is under the same Board of Regents as the University of Texas. Again, if we had a chapter at Texas Western, it would simplify our putting a chapter at New Mexico State University forty miles away. I know that this is a lot of "ifing" but it is well within the realm of possibilities under a vigorous extension program. There will not be an opening at T.C.U. or S.M.U. for another year.

Let me digress a moment -

To illustrate what a vigorous program can accomplish, during the war, we had several meetings with representatives of Delta Sigma Phi and they seriously considered merging with us. To impress them, I got together at the Mayflower Hotel in a private room, some of our outstanding alumni: Justice Rutledge of the U.S. Supreme Court, a Major General, Arthur Flemming, Chris Heurich, and others, and we gave them a fine dinner with Chris doing a splendid job with the liquid refreshments. They seemed almost persuaded. They had a comparable number of chapters. They disclosed their books which showed they were close to the border of insolvency. They had greedy eyes on our Tomahawk Fund which made us appear to be in a strong financial position. The proposed merger fell through and thereafter they entered into a program of vigorous extension. Now, they have a chapter in about 40 of the institutions which I visited this winter - many with very fine houses. All of this was done, evidently on a shoe string and since the War. How - I do not know. But they have proved it could be done. Of course, several other fraternities did the same thing in the post-war period, the time being ripe for college and fraternity expansion.

## II. Possibilities in California and the Southwest

There are three general fields for extension in this area:

- A. Branches of the University of California
- B. Newly established or reorganized state colleges
- C. New Mexico State University, University of New Mexico, Arizona State University (Tempe) and Arizona Northern State College (Flagstaff)

### A. Branches of the University of California

#### 1. University of California - Santa Barbara

The Dean of Men, Dr. John M. Groebli seems impressed with Alpha Sigma Phi and would probably approve a formal application to form a colony on the campus. He feels they need another fraternity and seems interested in us. He pricked up his ears when I said Al Weingand is an alumnus.

Last year, when I visited this campus, it consisted largely of military barracks. Since then, 25 million dollars has already been spent on buildings and a beautiful campus has been laid out on a hill overlooking the ocean and channel islands, with a private beach a part of the campus on the ocean. Also, when I was there last year, it was contemplated that this would be merely a relatively small liberal arts college. Now it has been made a general university with all departments and it is expected rapidly to expand from 2800 to 10,000 students. At present there are 1300 males, 7 nationals and no locals. Four have moved near the campus



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and three are still in Santa Barbara, ten miles away. From Frank Hargear, I obtained the names of two alumni, one of whom is Alvin C. Weingand, Nu 1923. The other is his brother, Claude, Tau '21, a Los Angeles attorney residing in Burbank. Al Weingand is proprietor of the swanky San Ysidro Ranch -a guest or "dude" ranch which with its white cottages, lovely gardens along the foothills of the Santa Ynez Mountains, its commanding view of the Pacific, its 600 acres, a private beach, its miles of bridle paths on the estate and absence of a major highway, make it one of the most desirable retreats for big shots in that part of the country. I spent some time with Brother Weingand and at the time of my visit, a former president of the University of Wisconsin and wife, and also Professor Schlichter, formerly of Wisconsin and later of Harvard were there. Brother Weingand has entertained the Chancellor of the University of California at Santa Barbara and he asked me for the name of the Dean of Men (evidently so he could become acquainted with him) as he is very much interested in U.C.S.B. Brother Weingand is one of our very fine Alpha Sigs.

I suggested to Brother Weingand that he invite one local alumnus to lunch and that they later obtain the names of some likely, eligible students and entertain them at the ranch (I think Frank Hargear would come over). The students not only would be impressed, but it might then be easy for Frank to organize them into an Alpha Sigma Phi colony, after the National Office had made formal application for organizing a colony on the campus. Brother Weingand was not hostile to this suggestion and he did say he'd do anything he could to help and urged me to return with Mrs. Worthington as his guest. Tom Harris' Directory of 1953 shows 9 alumni at Santa Barbara and three at Ventura, also one at Santa Maria and one at Carpinteria (8 miles away). There must be more there now. For our California extension program, therefore, I believe we should give Santa Barbara first priority. It would be a boost for Alpha Zeta in their rushing and dissipate their feeling of isolation. I suggest that a copy of this part of the report be sent to alumni in Santa Barbara, Ventura, Carpinteria and Santa Maria.

## 2. University of California at Riverside

We already have quite a file on this splendid, growing university which now has also been made a general campus with all university departments and is destined to grow. I had another fine conference with the Dean of Students, Thomas Broadbent, who sends his regards to Ralph Burns and Bill Holmes. As I reported last year, the campus will not be opened to national fraternities until the male enrollment reaches at least 1000. At present, the male enrollment is 662 of which 150 are married men. At first, only 4 national colonies will be permitted, of which Alpha Sigma Phi can be one. I hope by that time I may be a resident of Riverside, and I'll help push it along. At present, there are no clubs

resembling local fraternities although one may be trying to organize.

We have exchanged information with Dean Broadbent in the past and this time he wanted to reciprocate. He said:

- a. Land has already been acquired at La Jolla for a University of California there;
- b. Another University of California is contemplated for Monterey;
- c. He said we should give consideration to California Tech, a state college near Covina.

He then gave me information on California Western, a Methodist College at San Diego with an enrollment of 614, where Brother Byron Welch from Atlantic Christian is a member of the faculty. This I passed along to Brother Sturgis, Province Chief, at Ralph's request.

### 3. University of California at Davis

I suggest that we put Davis on our extension calendar for 1963, so the situation there will have time to jell. The present Dean of Students is hostile to fraternities and particularly Alpha Sigma Phi. He said one of our men went over the heads of the Faculty and tried to revive an old local and threw a monkey wrench in the campus machinery, relating to social fraternities. I told him there must be some mistake as no one from our national office had been to Davis although one of my own chapter mates, Dr. J.B. Powers had been for years Professor of Agricultural Engineering at Davis but had transferred to U.C.L.A. This surprised him that Powers is a member of Alpha Sigma Phi as Powers was one of their strong faculty men. Brother Schurr later told me that another Sig is on the campus, Brother Paul Riddle a laboratory assistant. I further said that such action would have been contrary to the spirit if, not the letter of our Constitution, which requires us to conform to the rules of the respective colleges where we operate and I believe this is expressly prohibited by our By-Laws. The Dean then appeared to be somewhat mollified but said that the fraternities on the campus are in a precarious condition and may have to disband. The University has an ambitious dormitory building project, and the Dean said that all students may be required to live in dormitories and the fraternities would have to relinquish their houses. (One of Irene's acquaintances, a widow from Madison, Wisconsin, is housemother at one of the men's dorms at Davis. Irene remained with her for lunch while I attended the Big Ten Luncheon at Sacramento. Her son-in-law is on the faculty at Davis.

At Sacramento, George Schurr explained that while the present Dean of Students was on sabbatical leave, he had contacted the acting dean and with his knowledge and approval, had attempted to revive an inactive local at Davis. Apparently

the present Dean had received a garbled report of the matter from other than official sources. George had no thought of doing anything unauthorized or behind the back of college authorities. He may not, however, have been aware of I.F.C. rules governing the establishment of fraternities on the campus, as indicated by his letter jointly to Ralph and me of April 12. This is the usual I.F.C. rule, based on an N.I.C. suggestion which provides that "Any social fraternity which has been duly recognized by the proper college authority and the Student Body, and which has been approved by a three fourth's vote of the Interfraternity Council, may become a member of this organization (IFC) by subscribing to its constitution and by-laws." Interestingly enough, I had asked Dean Weir if the local IFC at Davis had adopted a constitution and he said, "No." Brother Schurr is sincerely devoted to Alpha Sigma Phi and gives liberally of his time and money. I'm convinced he acted in good faith.

B. Newly established or reorganized State Colleges

Until a few years ago, the California State Colleges were normal schools with 2-3 year courses, designed for the training of teachers for secondary schools. They were under the State Board of Education. Later, the Legislature made them 4-year state colleges, broadened their curricula, authorized the granting of higher degrees and appropriated large sums for land and buildings. They are still under the State Board of Education with local trustees but have been multiplying rapidly and for those which have opened their campuses to national fraternities, there are now from six to fourteen nationals established on them. This is near the present capacity of some of the colleges. The following are the ones I visited:

1. San Diego State
2. Long Beach State
3. Fresno State
4. Sacramento State
5. Chico State
6. San Francisco State
7. San Jose State

Others are being established with the rapid growth of California's population which some think now equals or exceeds that of New York. San Francisco State campus which I visited at the request of Emmet Hayes is not open to nationals. San Jose State with 7 nationals and 10,000 students has closed its campus for two years to see how it succeeds in filling its new dormitories. The present climate at Fresno State is not good for further extension at the present time. Out of 8 nationals, 3 became inactive last fall due to failure to attract rushees. While there are 3200 males, 36 % are married and only about 300 were interested last fall in joining fraternities. Dean Gordon Wilson suggests we wait 4 or 5 years before entering this campus. This leaves four state colleges for present consideration:

1. San Diego State

I would rate San Diego State in the no. 1 spot. First,

because I think it's the oldest and best; second, because we have a Brother on the faculty, Dr. Alfred E. White, Nu '18, (which unfortunately, I did not know at the time of my visit and not until I had been informed by Frank Hargear) and third, because Dr. Pfeiffer, Dean of Students likes Alpha Sigma Phi, knows it well, served at Bethany under Dr. Cramblet when he was President at Bethany, and knows and sends his regards to Wilbur, Ralph, and Lloyd Cochran.

The male enrollment at San Diego State is about 5,000 with 14 nationals and no locals. Two nationals, Phi Kappa Tau and Phi Sigma Kappa have become inactive through lack of leadership and alumni support, even though the college tried to help them.

Fortunately for us, we have a large alumni group in San Diego, including Brother Henry A. Dietz, Nu '25, formerly Assistant Attorney General of California and now General Counsel of the County of San Diego, with a population of over a million, Commissioner of Agriculture Dean F. Palmer, Psi '21, and Superior Court Judge Joseph L. Shell, Nu '13. Perhaps the best man to start the ball rolling is Brother Dietz, with Ralph suggesting that he persuade Brother White to start a colony and enlist alumni support. The I.F.C. has tight rules for new fraternities, but under the circumstances above set forth, I'm confident we can qualify. The IFC rules accompanied my individual report on San Diego State.

### 2-3. Chico State and Sacramento State

I am putting these together because Brother George Schurr, president of the Sacrament Alumni Council, has since my conference with him and my visit to the two colleges, has been in touch with a local at each college. He is attending a chapter meeting at Kappa Sigma Phi on April 18 at Sacramento State and, I believe, Delta Psi Delta at Chico State on April 25, as the latter is the one cleared for us by Associate Dean of Students Fagin who, in my conference at Chico, authorized me to visit the house at 316 Hazel Street, Chico, California. As there was no one home at the time, I left in the mail box a copy of the Tomahawk with a picture of Brother Flemming and a note that Brother Schurr would get in touch with them and I relayed the information to him from Stockton. We have contacts there through members of Tau Chapter.

At Sacramento, Kappa Sigma Phi is the oldest local (10 years) and it once had an affiliation with a Teacher's College national which it dropped when Sacramento State became a full-fledged general college. It now has a fine plant. This local may be interested in the similarity of names - they would need to change only one letter and that may intrigue their alumni. Both George and I had an extended

conference with Dean Robert V. Edington and we were able to satisfy his queries which included supervision from the national office. I explained our system of Province Chiefs and Grand Chapter Advisors and that we have had two traveling secretaries which we lost to great corporations; that I had filled the gap temporarily last year in visitation on the Pacific Coast and that our National Office was at the moment training a full time assistant. I also said that our Executive Secretary is available for emergency visitation. This seemed to satisfy him. He gave George permission to contact a local if he were notified.

Accordingly, Chico and Sacramento might possibly materialize before the end of the current academic year with steps toward a petition from one or both locals. Perhaps this is too optimistic. If we could get on either campus, it would help us with other state colleges.

#### 4. Long Beach State

This college has an enrollment of 10,000 of which 5,100 are males. There are 6 nationals and 1 local (as of 2/19/60). I had a fine conference with Dr. Karl A. Russell, Dean of Students, in the absence of Dr. Clyde Johnson, Fraternity Advisor. Dr. Johnson later wrote me at Riverside that he had advised the national office, in August, 1958, of an available local, but as he did not hear from us, he assumed we were not interested. I wrote him a thank you letter and believe I advised him that up to 1958 our fraternity had not gone into state colleges because until recently they were not full four-year colleges granting higher degrees per Section 3, Article II, Title III of our Constitution. I'm afraid we haven't kept in touch with the rapid development of state colleges in California and certain other states and their present full accreditation. Now, in the light of present knowledge, our policy had changed and we now will be proud to be on as fine a campus as Long Beach State. I am, therefore, hopeful that we can take steps to establish a chapter at Long Beach. We have a large body of alumni at Long Beach, in the adjoining parts of Los Angeles, and nearby suburbs.

Long Beach State is located far out from the city almost within Los Angeles. The nationals there presently are renting their houses waiting for the crystallization of a policy by the college to provide land for fraternity housing which they apparently may be authorized to do.

#### College of the Pacific, Stockton, California

m This is a small private college (Methodist), male enrollment 750, which has received more attention from our alumni in Sacramento and Stockton and our alumni and actives in San Francisco Bay area than I believe it deserves. A well-housed local, Rho Delta Phi, has been rushed at Nu Chapter,

failed to acknowledge invitations to Tau, and has been visited by many alumni, not only in Stockton and the Bay Area, but also by as important an officer as Past Grand Senior President Emmet Hayes. Through it all, Rho Delta Phi has played the role of "hard to get" and I think in all dignity, we should drop all contact with this local. With this, I believe Brother George Schuur, who has spent much time and his own money in rushing the group, is now inclined to agree. I have submitted a separate report on the College of the Pacific.

C. New Mexico State University, University of New Mexico, Arizona State University (Tempe) and Arizona Northern State College (Flagstaff)

1. New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, New Mexico

Formerly a state engineering and agriculture college (New Mexico Agricultural and Mechanical) this is now a full-fledged university within the confines of Las Cruces, New Mexico. It is still shown on the map as State College, New Mexico, although I believe the name has been changed to University Park. It has a fairly large but unattractive campus with new buildings under construction. The male enrollment is 1600; there are 7 nationals and no locals. Three fraternities own their houses on university property valued at about \$30,000 and one has merely a lodge. The University has applied for federal assistance to provide fraternity housing. We have only one alumnus at Las Cruces whom I was unable to contact, Brother E.O. Bruce, Nebraska '24. If a chapter were established at Texas Western, 40 miles away, some interest might be generated in a chapter here, perhaps in 1962 or sooner. I have since learned that we may have an alumnus on the faculty, Curtis B. Coleman, Mount Union '40. He should be contacted by correspondence by our national office.

2. University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, New Mexico

We ought to have a chapter at this fine, growing University. We're fortunate in having an alumnus on the faculty, Dr. Paul A.F. Walter, Jr., Professor of Sociology, Stanford '19. Unfortunately, I was unable to see him at the time of my visit as he was in Santa Fe. Other likely Sigs were not home on that Saturday morning so I wrote Brother Walter and sent him our Albuquerque alumni cards. I had mentioned his name to Associate Dean of Men, William Chase, who knows him. Of an enrollment of 7,000, there are 5,000 men, 11 nationals and no locals. I suggest that we make a formal application to the University of New Mexico to organize a colony and endeavor to enlist the help of Brother Walter in organizing such a group. Brother Walter should be informed of the organization of colonies by our alumni on the faculty of Michigan State and elsewhere.

Dean Chase said they would like to have another good fraternity on the campus and appears to be interested in Alpha Sigma Phi and the idea of Dr. Walter organizing a colony there. This matter should be followed through by the national office under the guidance of the Chairman of Extension. I believe a letter from Dean Blackburn to Dr. Walter on his University stationery might help. The University plans to acquire land to turn over to fraternities on 99-year leases.

3. Arizona Northern State College, Flagstaff, Arizona

The enrollment here is 1800, of which 1015 are males. There are five nationals and no locals. I had a satisfactory conference with Dean of Men Joseph C. Rolle who is acquainted with our alumnus on the faculty, Dr. Francis C. Osborn, Columbia '21. The College has embarked on an ambitious building program and will build small unit houses for the fraternities, none of which are housed at present. After these units are completed and filled, more will be attempted and the Dean will let Brother Osborn know when the time is ripe to start organizing an Alpha Sigma Phi colony. After the conference, I succeeded in locating Brother Osborn who had been conducting a demonstration at the Flagstaff High School. Brother Osborn is a fine, loyal Sig and immediately consented to try to organize a colony when the time is ripe. I spent some time in conversation with him and also picked up a letter at his office which Ralph had sent me in his care. I am sure we can depend on Brother Osborn and he should be reminded from time to time to keep in touch with the Dean regarding the formation of a colony.

4. Arizona State University, Tempe, Arizona

This University is located on a fine campus about 10 miles from Phoenix where we have a large number of alumni. There are 2800 males enrolled; 18 nationals and 3 locals. I had a satisfactory conference with Dr. Gary Anderson, Dean of Men on February 10, 1960. He said that three fraternities own their houses, 1 has no house and the rest rent. The University is working on a plan to obtain federal money to house the fraternities something like that of the University of Tucson, described in my last year's reports. I spent two hours trying to get in touch with some of the Phoenix alumni without success, as my time here was limited. I had been informed at our chapter in Tucson that the most active alumnus in Phoenix was Brother George Hoy, Athletic Director of Phoenix Junior College, so I drove to the college only to find that he was tied up in classes for a couple of hours. Accordingly, I wrote Brother Hoy a long memo, left the Phoenix alumni cards for his use and stated that I would ask the National Office to send each of the Phoenix alumni a copy of my report on Arizona State University. In my report on this University, I requested that this be done so that Phoenix alumni could start some action with respect to one of the locals at Arizona State University. I hope that they

have received this report.

SUGGESTIONS AS TO FOLLOW UP

BY NATIONAL OFFICE

1. Immediate attention is recommended as to my suggestion of selling Brother Walters of the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, faculty, the idea of organizing an Alpha Sigma Phi colony on that campus, giving him examples of similar Alpha Sigma Phi faculty action, such as Michigan State. Along with this, formal application should be made to the Dean of Men, accompanied by information material about Alpha Sigma Phi, for authority to organize a colony at the University of New Mexico. A letter from Dean Blackburn on his official Alabama stationery would also help.
2. My recommendation above, and on page 2, with respect to Arizona State University, Tempe Arizona.
3. My recommendation with respect to the formation of a colony by Brother White of the faculty at San Diego State College.
4. Prompt assistance in furnishing Brother Schurr with requested Alpha Sigma Phi material in his work with locals at Chico State and Sacramento State. Keep in close touch with the work he is doing there.
5. Encourage at once, Shreveport, Louisiana alumni in their proposal to visit and evaluate the local at Louisiana Polytechnic and encourage the Dean of Men to organize another, if Lambda Tau does not measure up or is not interested in us.
6. Send a copy of that part of my report herein relating to University of California at Santa Barbara to our alumni at Santa Barbara, Carpinteria, Ventura and Santa Maria, California, suggesting that they organize and undertake to form an Alpha Sigma Phi colony at U.C.S.B. (also send a copy to Frank Hargear and Alpha Zeta)
7. Send letter of apology and explanation from national office to Dr. Johnson of Long Beach State for not acknowledging his communication of August, 1958. Also send copy of my report on Long Beach, herein, to Long Beach and Los Angeles alumni and Brother Sturgis with suggestion that steps be taken to form an Alpha Sig colony at Long Beach, if local has already gone national - otherwise investigate local. A copy of this memo should go to all Province Chiefs.
8. Write Brother Curtis B. Coleman on the faculty at New Mexico State University, University Park, (Las Cruces) New Mexico, and sell him the idea of forming our Alpha Sigma Phi colony there. Send him our El Paso alumni list and the name of Brother E.O. Bruce of Las Cruces.
9. Keep in touch with Brother Osborn on faculty of Arizona Northern



State College to keep in touch with the Dean and to continue his interest in forming an Alpha Sig colony when the time is ripe.

10. Early steps should be taken to organize Atlanta alumni with a view to ultimate action at Emory and other Georgia schools.
11. Give Brother Collins and Columbia alumni continued encouragement to form a colony at the University of South Carolina.
12. It is suggested that the National Office give due consideration to recommendations in other parts of this memo for later action. If it is practicable to separate the information herein as to Texas institutions and send it to all Texas alumni, it might stimulate their interest in promoting extension efforts in Texas schools.
13. The last suggestion involves some detective work on the part of the national office. I suggest that the Office send to every University and college, (except where we have chapters) listed in Appendix "A" a request for their student and faculty directory, or directories. When received, the alumni and active cards of the city where the college is located should be checked against the respective directories to ascertain the names of any Alpha Sigma Phi faculty members or Alpha Sigma Phi student transfers, so these might be the basis for requesting steps be taken by Alpha Sigs in the respective schools to form Alpha Sigma Phi colonies. I believe there are many instances where our members give only their home address and we do not know that they are in a school where we do not have a chapter. I'd like to know, for example, whether any of our alumni in Baton Rouge are on the L.S. U. faculty.

In closing, I wish to thank the Grand Council for this opportunity and privilege of service to Alpha Sigma Phi. It has been an exciting and rejuvenating experience to get back into the academic world once more.

P.S. Re: VISITATION OF SIX ACTIVE CHAPTERS

1. California

First, I want to register the thrill I had on my visit to Nu Chapter. A year ago I did some intensive work there when I found them faltering in scholarship. I had just come from Tau where they had exceeded not only the all-fraternity average, the all-men's average and even the all-university average in scholarship. The Dean of Men showed me a chart on which Tau Chapter had continued as one of the top three fraternities at Stanford over a period of 25 years. Another Dean had told me that Tau Chapter had a tradition of high scholarship which would even show in their pledging as it would draw to it many who are studiously inclined. So I used this as an example at Nu - talked to officers and members and at meetings, emphasizing the importance of their raising their scholastic record. Maybe it helped - at any rate at the end of the semester they exceeded not only the all-fraternity average (50 fraternities) but also the all-men's average. They proudly showed me a large, beautiful trophy and achievement cup award to Nu Chapter for the greatest improvement of any fraternity on the campus.

But that isn't all, the rushees last fall were scholarship conscious and evidently were so impressed by the visible evidence of achievement that Nu pledged the largest number of any of the 50 fraternities even though there were fewer rushees on the campus than ever. The men also reported increased alumni support this year, with which they were very much pleased.

2. Stanford University

I was here a fairly short time (Sunday) and did not return as the men were in the midst of exams. The President reported, however, that he believed that they were keeping up to their usual high scholastic record.

Brother Mosiman, Treasurer of the House Corporation, stated that they were within about \$30,000 of the fund necessary to put them in the second housing project.

3. U.C.L.A.

The men here were somewhat disheartened at their failure to have expected alumni support in the crisis following

the gruesome calamity on the U.S.C. campus last fall at the Kappa Sigma initiation. It put a damper on rushing and pledging in Los Angeles. The parents of one of the Alpha Zeta pledges made him depledge after that incident on the other campus. This I reported to Brother Sturgis, Province Chief, who had asked me to visit the chapter. It was a real tragedy for the Southern California fraternities where the Dean of Men told me that 7 fraternities failed to have any pledges (partly because of depledging) and others had 1, 2, and 3 pledges only.

4. Arizona

The chapter has decided to defer until it is stronger, the matter of entering into the University building project for housing. Brother Joe Picard, Eta '37, met me at the house for dinner and had a private session with the officers to which he invited me. The Treasurer said that he expected to finish the year in the black.

5. Alabama

Brother Blackburn has this in fine shape with a splendid group.

6. Presbyterian

I attended a chapter meeting with Brother Collins - dignified, well-run, ritually correct. The chapter has rooms but no house. It has an excellent group of men.

We have supplied them with booklets and sources for information concerning such plans now operating on other campuses.

Subject: Tomahawk and the Mystic Circle Newsletter

As you are aware, an experimental issue of the "newsletter" proposed by the Magazine Committee has been issued and a remarkably large number of comments have been received. Those received by April 1 have been personally reviewed and analyzed by the Committee Chairman. To avoid repetition, it is wished to incorporate in this memo as an attachment, the memo on "Comments on Mystic Circle" from the Executive Secretary to the Magazine Committee, dated March 31, 1960, and labeled Exhibit "A".

It is apparent from this response from an entirely adequate statistical cross-section of the fraternity, from active chapter HSP's to really old grads, that the reaction is overwhelmingly in favor of a newsletter type of communication at frequent intervals during the college year.

It is therefore recommended that the Grand Council authorize the continuance in principle of the Mystic Circle newsletter as an official publication of the Fraternity. Following is a proposed publication schedule:

1. Publish 6 communications each year to go to all alumni whether they are a Tomahawk life subscriber or not. These communications to be known as the Tomahawk.
2. Beginning with August, 1960 these communications would be published in the following months and would have the following format:
 

1960	August	- 48-64 page Tomahawk
	October	- 4-page newsletter
	November	- 4-page newsletter
1961	January	- 32 or more page Tomahawk
	March	- 4-page newsletter
	May	- 4-page newsletter

It is quite remarkable that so many of the responses, without prompting, noted the financial aspects of the proposed change and "guessed" that this was an economy move rather than its major purpose of improving communications. Regardless, they were in favor of it.

The cost of the 2475 Mystic Circles was \$162.39:

Printing	\$94.76
Engraving	43.46
Postage	<u>24.17</u>

Total            \$162.39

We could print 17,000 Mystic Circles for \$313.00, and with the increased cost of postage, could send the 4-page newsletter type of Tomahawk to everyone for about \$500.00.

This type of program of two magazine type of Tomahawks and 4 newsletter type of Tomahawks would result in a savings of approximately \$1,000.00 to \$1,500.00 per year and would, we believe, do a better communications job.

Comments on the shape, size, content and presentation of the newsletter are not considered pertinent at this point. Any publication evolves and progresses with experience. It is believed and hoped that this will be true of the Mystic Circle and the subsequent issues will enlist even more and greater support than did the first.

It was also most significant that the responses from active, even though there were only three, chapters were most enthusiastically in favor of the proposal.

If the experiment shows member favor for such a newsletter, the Magazine Committee will urge the Grand Council to give the main communications effort to issues of such a newsletter during the year and reserve the magazine-type publication for a single major issue per year.

Subject: Report of Scholarship Committee

1. It has seemed to me that the Province Chiefs might be able to do a more effective job along the line of chapter scholarship than anyone as distant from the scene as national officers. However, unless these chiefs know something about the scholarship of the chapters under their jurisdiction, they are working in the dark or, at least, under a handicap.

To repair the deficiency, I have prepared the enclosed letter which has been sent out to the province chiefs.

2. A 1958-59 summary of fraternity averages has been distributed by Mr. Robert W. Krovitz, Scholarship Committee Chairman of the National Interfraternity Conference. This shows Alpha Sigma Phi in 35th place out of 60 fraternities. Of 48 chapters reporting, 20 were about the all-men's average for a percentage of 41.7. This is not an outstanding record but it is nothing to be ashamed of either. There are some 25 organizations with poorer records and in this list are many excellent names in the fraternity world. In brief, we have lots of room for improvement but our record is not disgraceful.
3. Attached is a summary of 50 chapters of Alpha Sigma Phi for the spring semester, 1958-59.

Letter to Province Chiefs:

Date

Dear Brother \_\_\_\_\_

Please accept my apologies for this more or less form letter but time is fleeting and it seems more important to forward the enclosed materials than it does to stand on ceremony.

As a province chief, one of your concerns about the chapters under your jurisdiction is scholarship. The more information you have on this subject about your chapters, the better the job you can do. This letter is an attempt to provide as much information as is in my files, which may or may not duplicate reports you already have. In the future reports will be forwarded on an individual basis.

There are two major sources of information about chapter scholarship that are funneled through the National Office to me. One of these is the NIC Scholarship Reporting service located in Storrs, Connecticut. Reports issued by this service are on an annual basis and show the rank of each fraternity, the average number of men, the average grade, and an index.

I'm not sure that I understand the index but for those of you who are mathematically minded it is computed as follows:

$$\frac{100 (\text{All men's average} - \text{Chapter average})}{\text{Maximum Grade} - \text{All Men's Average}} = \% \text{ Variance from All Men's average}$$

The main value of the index is that it provides a measure of the plus or minus variance from the all men's average. There is an implied assumption that fraternity men should certainly be able to equal or exceed the average attained by all of the men on campus.

Another source of information consists of releases made from the campus - frequently from the Dean of Men's office. These are normally for a quarter or semester and sometimes are divided between actives and pledges. Another advantage of the campus reports is that they are more current than the NIC reports. For example, some 1958-59 NIC releases are still missing whereas many universities have made reports on 1959-60 first semester or quarter fraternity scholarship.

So much by way of explanation, With this letter I am forwarding all of the reports in my possession covering the chapters in your province. As a matter of record, I am itemizing these below together with any comments that seem pertinent. It is my hope that with this information in your possession you can do a more intelligent job as province chief. Good chapter scholarship is one sign of a good chapter that is a credit to us and to the institution at which it is located. The responsibility rests with the actives but a little prodding now and then may help. For example, does each of your chapters have a scholarship chairman and is he given support by the officers and the other brothers?

Any steps you can take to improve chapter scholarship will be a real service to Alpha Sigma Phi. If I can help, please write me.

September 10, 1960  
Marietta, Ohio

1. Call to Order

Meeting was called to order by Grand Senior President Donald J. Hornberger. Those in attendance were Grand Council members Akre, Coburn, Donnan and Mason; Past Grand Senior President Hayes; President and Secretary of A-S-P Corporation Dunham and Hammial; Province Chiefs Hawkins and Wise; and Executive Secretary Burns.

2. Chapter Discussion

Several chapters were discussed by members of the Grand Council and Province Chiefs:

Ohio Wesleyan - indicated that this chapter's scholarship needed to be improved.

Ohio State - Province Chief Wise was requested to follow through on the matter of the bond sale with the hope that this could be gotten off the ground and a satisfactory adjustment between the chapter and the present owner of the property, Brother Jahn, could be made with regard to the House.

Bethany - Brother Mason was requested to follow up on the refinancing of the Bethany House so that some relief could be secured on the Reserve Fund loan.

Coe - Province Chief Hawkins discussed the matter of the need of the Coe Chapter for a loan of \$500 to assist in the purchase of some furniture for their chapter rooms. However, he thought this might be able to be worked out locally.

Iowa State - Brother Hawkins pointed out that Phi Chapter needed to secure a good rush resulting in a large pledge class this year because of the large senior class which would be graduating.

Toledo - It was moved by Brother Donnan, seconded by Brother Coburn and passed giving authorization to the Grand Senior President to spend up to \$300 to assist this Chapter in rushing this year if it was requested.

Pennsylvania - The Executive Secretary was requested to check to see whether the money which had been loaned to the alumni corporation from the Reserve Fund in the spring of 1960 had been used for the purpose for which it was requested.

3. 1960-61 Budget

It was moved by Brother Akre, seconded by Brother Donnan and passed that the Fraternity continue to operate on the budget set up for 1959-60 for at least another ninety days.

4. Bank Authorization

It was moved by Brother Akre, seconded by Brother Donnan and passed that the Executive Secretary proceed to secure changes in the bank authorization forms to meet the changes in the national officers as elected by the Convention.

5. Responsibilities of Grand Council Members

The Executive Secretary was requested to inform the new members of the Grand Council as to their responsibilities.

6. A-S-P Corporation

It was requested that the A-S-P Corporation review the critical situations regarding chapter housing and proceed to develop a pilot situation for the sale of A-S-P bonds.

7. Tomahawk

The Grand Council expressed the request that the Executive Secretary should proceed to secure assistance on the editorial work of the Tomahawk.

8. National Office Staff

The Executive Secretary was instructed to attempt to secure an additional man for the staff as well as to secure men who might transfer to other schools for the purpose of strengthening a chapter or in colonization or extension efforts.

9. Committee Appointments

Any changes in the Chairmen of Committees or the election of new Province Chiefs would be the responsibility of a committee composed of Brother Hornberger, Akre, and Burns.
