

name before the Nominations Committee for consideration.

Brother Miller reviewed the Convention Committee assignments and informed them of where they would hold their formal meetings.

Following a few announcements by Field Secretary Forney, the Convention was adjourned for the day.

The after-dinner speaker was Father Richard Byrne, Grand Chaplain of the Fraternity, who presented a most interesting and challenging address to the Delegates.

Beginning at 9:00 p.m., the Grand Council and Brothers of Theta Chapter hosted a reception at the Theta Chapter House.

Thursday, August 24, 1972

The Convention was called to order at 8:30 a.m. by Grand Senior President Miller. Roll call was taken and a quorum found to be present.

George Lord presented the Report of the Credential Committee as follows:

The 1972 Credential Committee would approve the seating of Delegates from Chapters who are current in their payment of Convention fees but who may be in arrears for other fees. However, any Chapter who is not current in all fees prior to the 1974 National National Convention would not be permitted to be seated at the 1974 Convention.

Passed.

Committee assignments were re-read and the Convention adjourned into committee work at 9:00 a.m.

The Convention reconvened at 11:00 a.m. and primary committee reports were received. Actions taken as a result of the primary reports were:

1. Delegates from Eastern Michigan University and Findlay College were permitted to be seated with the understanding that these Chapters would pay their past-due Convention fees within 30 days.
2. The Agenda was amended to permit Delegates to meet by Province at 2:00 p.m.
3. A committee was formed to study the question of Little Sister groups.

The Convention was adjourned for lunch at 11:50 a.m. The balance of the afternoon was spent in committee meetings and chapter conferences.

An Exemplification of the Initiation Ritual was presented at 8:30 p.m. to the Brothers of the Convention in the Betsy Barbour House.

Friday, August 25, 1972

The Convention was called to order at 8:55 a.m. by Grand Senior President Miller. Roll call was taken and a quorum found to be present.

Reports were then received from the various committees:

FINANCE:

The Report of the Finance Committee was read and approved (see attached Exhibit 1).

1. It was recommended that the "To Better The Man" Pledge Manual be sent to each pledge upon receipt of his pledge fee and membership record. Passed.
2. It was also recommended that the title of "Field Representative" be replaced with "Chapter Consultant". Passed.

RITUALS:

The Report of the Rituals Committee was reviewed. Discussion followed concerning the proposed changes, and the issue was referred to a Ritual Committee comprised of George E. Lord, Grand Marshal, three alumni and three undergraduates, for further investigation. This Committee is to report to the Delegates of the 1973 Educational Conference (see attached report, Exhibit 2).

PUBLICATIONS:

The Report of the Publications Committee was read and approved (see Exhibit 3). In relation to this report, the following motions were made:

1. The Committee recommended: that the TOMAHAWK should remain in magazine format; that the chapters cooperate in sending more articles; and that the staff be commended for an excellent issue. Passed.
2. The Committee recommended that advertising be accepted in the TOMAHAWK; the proceeds, from which if sufficient, could then be used to hire a full-time Editor for the TOMAHAWK; and that a report be made to the 1973 Educational Conference. Passed.

LITTLE SISTERS:

Motion was made and seconded to amend constitution by the deletion of the word "male" in regard to membership qualifications. Roll call vote; motion defeated.

Motion to use Alpha Sigma Phi pledge ceremony for "Little Sisters" after appropriate adaptation. Motion made to table this consideration - passed.

1. Motion to notify administration at schools where Chapters are located of the policy of the Fraternity in regard to membership qualifications; i.e. Rutgers, Stanford, etc. Passed.
2. Motion that the Grand Marshal prepare for consideration of the Chapters a Little Sisters uniform Ritual Ceremony. As per the 1970 resolution, that a Little Sister Pin be presented. Passed.

PROVINCE:

The Report of the Province Committee was received as presented (appended as Exhibit 4).

UNDERGRADUATE ADVISERS:

Motion presented that the position of Undergraduate Adviser to the Grand Council be eliminated. Defeated.

Motion that the Undergraduate Advisers to the Grand Council be given voting rights. Roll Call vote. Defeated.

NOMINATIONS:

The Report of the Nominating Committee was presented as follows:

Three members of the Grand Council have terms expiring this year: W. Gardner Mason, Robert Allen, George Trubow. Of these three, Brother Mason is ineligible for re-election. Robert Miller, George Lord, Al Wise and John Blackburn's terms expire in 1974.

Moved that Robert Allen, George Trubow, and Lou DeLuca be elected to four-year terms on the Grand Council. Passed.

John L. Blackburn resigned his position on the Grand Council which did not expire until 1974.

Moved to elect Richard Dexter to a 2-year term as a Member of the Grand Council. (Nominations received from the floor -

Robert Cabello and Stan Thurston. Parliamentarian, Past Grand Senior President Raymond E. Glos, determined that a plurality will elect.) Richard Dexter elected.

The committee reported:

Four Brothers had approached them concerning the position of Undergraduate Adviser to the Grand Council: Dean Diller, Toledo; John Fowler, Pennsylvania; Jim Bloom, Michigan; and John Godinsky, Rio Grande. Three vacancies exist.

Nominated from the floor: Al Sidenberg, Morris-Harvey. Voted proceeded by ballot; elected were Bloom, Godinsky, and Sidenberg.

The committee nominated the following as officers of the Fraternity:

Robert E. Miller, Grand Senior President; George B. Trubow, Grand Junior President; Robert A. Allen, Grand Secretary; Alfred B. Wise, Grand Treasurer; and George E. Lord, Grand Marshal.

The above nominated officers were elected.

Brother Blackburn expressed his appreciation for the opportunity to serve as Grand Senior President and a member of the Grand Council. He pledged his continued support and counsel.

The Convention was adjourned for the balance of the day at 11:55 a.m.

Saturday, August 26, 1972

Grand Senior President Miller called the convention to order at 8:45 a.m.; roll call was taken and a quorum was found to be present.

Reports of Convention Committees were received:

EXTENSION:

The Report of the Extension Committee was received as reported (see Exhibit 5 appended).

EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE AND CONVENTIONS:

It was recommended that future Conventions be held in sites where housing and meetings were provided in one site. The time of the Convention and the Educational Conference were felt to be desirable in the last half of August. (see report attached, Exhibit 6).

PLEDGE TRAINING:

After considerable discussion, the motion was made to table the report of this committee - passed.

Motion by Ohio State, seconded by Westminster, to have the

Grand Senior President appoint a National Pledge Training

Coordinator and outline his specific responsibilities. Passed.

ALUMNI RELATIONS:

The Report of the Alumni Relations Committee was received as reported (see Exhibit 7 appended).

RESOLUTIONS:

The Resolutions Committee presented the attached Resolutions (see Exhibit 8) which were passed by the Convention Delegates.

CONVENTION ATTENDANCE:

Moved by Cincinnati, seconded by Ohio Northern, that the names

and addresses of Delegates be included in Minutes of the Con-


vention sent to Chapters so that Delegates may communicate with

REPORT OF PUBLICATIONS COMMITTEE

August 25, 1972

Chairman: Bill Klaban, Grand Province Chief
John Mann, Loyola; Rich Olesin, Rutgers; and Mal Cairns, Ohio State

The Publications Committee recommends that the Tomahawk remain in magazine format, 16 pages, four times yearly. If financial problems arise we would recommend using non-gloss paper, trying to maintain the magazine form as first priority.

The Committee also recommends strongly that Chapter H.A.E.s cooperate fully with the Tomahawk Editor in submitting articles promptly and of a nature in which the articles are timely and interesting, but brief.

Feature articles about unique chapter and/or campus activities should be solicited. Individual and group photos are desired in reference to outstanding undergraduate and alumni accomplishments.

The committee sees a need for the Tomahawk Editor to emphasize strongly deadlines and to try to publish regularly, paying closest attention to fall rush season.

Concerning the new interpretation by the Internal Revenue Service that the Tomahawk is no longer an educational magazine and that advertising would be desirable and necessary to support that magazine; also considering the fact that the Finance Committee has made a similar recommendation, we, therefore

Move that Bill Klaban, along with the best available firm of fraternity

magazine sales representatives, be directed to approach the National

Interfraternity Conference to present plans for selling advertising

by a national network of fraternity magazines on a voluntary group basis.

Also strongly recommend that, contingent upon the fact that advertising revenue could equal production costs, an editor be considered at the Educational Conference in 1973 with his salary or hourly wages, as necessary, to be derived from the anticipated production costs of \$9,000 for 1974.

PROVINCE COMMITTEE REPORT

John Godinsky, Lou DeLuca, Co-Chairmen

Committee Members: Dr. E.A. Rasberry, Jr. Grand Province Chief; Milton Herchenrider, Jr., Lycoming; Doug Cravens, Northern Michigan; Martin Young, Ohio Northern; Gary Anderson, Westminster; Craig Rowans, Atlantic Christian; Jimmy Edmundson, Atlantic-Christian; and Brad Wise, Lehigh, Secretary.

It was the finding of this Committee that the understanding and cooperation of the Province System has been greatly neglected. The means of increasing the Province System are the goals of this Committee report.

Firstly, to educate the undergraduate body in the functioning of the Province System, Brother Louis DeLuca, Province Coordinator, will write an article for the Tomahawk, explaining the province system.

In addition to this, it is recommended that copies of this article be sent along with regular correspondence to the individual chapter's HCS or HJP thus insuring the exposure of the province system to the largest number of undergraduates.

The Province System as viewed by this committee is an integral part of the Fraternity because it allows more "Alpha Sigs" to come together and exchange ideas. The main problems within this system were found to be geographic distances and communication between institutions.

The following recommendations were made by this committee to help alleviate these problems:

1. This committee suggests that the extension committee seek chapters in areas where we have isolated "Alpha Sig" Chapters.
2. It is recommended that each of the Delegates from a given province get together to meet each other (Thursday, August 24, at 2 p.m.)
3. We recommend the formation of the Province Executive Committee as outlined in the "Duties and Responsibilities of the Province Chiefs."
4. We suggest that the fall and spring reports that are filed with the National Office contain space to indicate province officers along with house officers.
5. We recommend that individual Chapters include in their pledge program more information concerning the Province System.
6. At future conventions, it is recommended that the province committee should have one representative from each province in order to facilitate input to this committee.

The role of the Province Chief was also a concern of this committee. When faced with the question "Are we using Province Chiefs effectively?", the answer was "Are we using him at all?" Although most province chiefs seem to be trying

to remedy the situation, one member of the committee claimed his chapter hasn't been visited by their Province Chief in over two years. Some members of this committee felt that it might be better to search out alumni near their college or university to assist with chapter problems. Experience shows that alumni, when asked, are more than willing to help. This feeling was expressed by committee members who came from provinces with little or no contact with their province chief.

The structure of the province system was also reviewed by this committee and the following recommendations were made:

1. The moving of Northern Michigan University from Province III to Province IV.
2. Possibility of moving American University to another province.
3. "To Better The Man" include map of province system opposite the listing of provinces.

Future considerations:

The following two considerations are ideas that were expressed during our committee sessions, but upon which no action should presently be taken:

1. The "undergraduate advisers to the Grand Council" be discontinued. Instead, establish assistant province chiefs who would be undergraduates and would be the province adviser to the Grand Council.
2. We feel that the mini-educational conferences in different regions of the country are a good idea, but we don't feel we have reached the stage when it is now practical.

REPORT OF EXTENSION COMMITTEE

August 26, 1972

1. Present Extension activities by National Extension Chairman and Fraternity Staff should be continued.

Future extension possibilities should be investigated with major assistance and follow-thru by local interested & active alumni and nearby chapters.

2. Alpha Sigma Phi - Phillipines

Due to the many, many different aspects of total affiliation with our Fraternity, it would seem improbable they would consider normal regular chapter status.

It seems most logical that some type of affiliation between us should come into being.

It would also seem that they have a relatively loose association of chapters, having just recently had their first national convention. Our observation would be that they probably are under-financed - note five peso initiation fee with monthly dues of 25 centavos.

Recommendation:

- A. That the Convention empower the Grand Council to further investigate and arrange for a loose affiliate status with Alpha Sigma Phi Phillipines.

Any information of the Fraternity may be provided except badge, crest, ritual and ritual paraphernalia.

- B. That the Grand Council establish a service fee to Alpha Sigma Phi Phillipines consistent with normal fraternity expenses.

REPORT OF ALPHA SIGMA PHI FRATERNITY 1972 CONVENTION COMMITTEE

ON EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE & CONVENTIONS

as accepted by the Convention, August 26, 1972

RECOMMENDATIONS DEALING WITH CONVENTIONS:

We recommend that:

1. A number of convention centers be designated at a variety of geographic locations throughout the country and that a set pattern of convention locations be established to rotate regularly among these centers.

(Explanation: The recommendation suggests that, perhaps three or four cities, campuses, or similar places be chosen by the Grand Council as regular sites for all future conventions. A plan would be devised whereby all concerned would be aware of the convention site years in advance. Plans could be made, contracts for rooms, etc. could be negotiated long in advance. It is felt that efficiency and cost savings would be achieved.)

2. The Conventions be held in a hotel, motel or campus convention center, or in a comparable setting where housing, food service, meeting facilities and recreation facilities are available in a single building or very close proximity.

(Explanation: Single-unit convention facilities would produce a greater feeling of unity among delegates, alumni, and others attending. Convenience would be achieved for all concerned.)

3. Majority: The time of the year when the convention is held should remain unchanged with the date in the latter half of August.

Minority: A date in October should be tried in order to enlarge attendance, produce immediate feedback to Chapters, and provides chances for newly-initiated Brothers to become involved.

(Explanation: While the Committee felt that the present timing produces problems in the face of numerous calendar changes in colleges and summer work activity of delegates, the majority felt that an October date would be difficult because of the need for those attending to miss classes and because of the many activities found on all campuses in the fall.)

4. The National Office pay the entire room and board charges for Delegates and pay Delegate travel expenses by providing a fixed and reasonable rate per mile of distance from the Chapter House to the Convention site. Furthermore, a proportionate increase in this rate would occur as mileage from the Convention site increases.

(Explanation: The intent here is that, if sites were established in the

regular pattern suggested in #1 above, financial planning could take place to allow the setting of a lasting mileage rate for Convention Delegates to the next several Conventions. The reason given for a proportionate increase is that we did not feel the National organization could underwrite total mileage costs. Differences between amounts provided and actual costs would become greater for those coming longer distances.)

5. The Grand Council have the 1974 Convention site and schedule of mileage rates mailed to each Chapter by the time of the next Educational Conference.

(Explanation: Advance notice of at least a year should encourage planning.)

6. The Delegates be informed in advance of the next Convention of the Committees on which they will serve and that the suggested tasks for each Committee be provided in advance in order to allow time for study and preparation.
7. An advance and detailed agenda showing topics to be considered and providing for the addition of topics by the Chapters be mailed to the Chapters by April of the year in which the next Convention will take place.

(Explanation: It was felt that such a procedure would allow for discussion by all Brothers in each Chapter; could create more interest in the Convention; and would demonstrate the democratic process of our Fraternity.)

The following information is presented without specific recommendations by the Committee:

- a. Ohio State University has expressed interest in hosting the 1974 Convention.
- b. American University has expressed interest in having the 1976 Convention because of its location during the national celebration of that year.

RECOMMENDATIONS DEALING WITH THE 1973 EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE:

We recommend that:

1. The 1973 Educational Conference be held during the latter half of August.
2. The theme for the 1973 Conference be: "AN ALPHA SIG TODAY AND FOREVER".
3. The general format of the 1973 Conference be as follows:
 - a. Sessions be devoted to presenting the history of Alpha Sigma Phi as it has responded to changes on campus and in society.
 - b. "Involvement" workshops in which each participant would learn his own strengths and weaknesses as an individual Brother of the Fraternity. (These would be a modified form of the encounter group methods.)

c. "Socio-drama" sessions to deal with specific fraternity problem areas, such as pledging, rush, etc. (These would be much the same as some of the sessions of the 1971 Conference.)

4. A regular Newsletter dealing with Conventions and Conferences be established to appear four times per year and to be mailed individually to each Brother. In any given year, two issues would report in detail on the immediate past Convention or Conference and two would report on the upcoming Convention or Conference with returning check list sheets for feed-back.
5. For the 1975 Educational Conference, an investigation be undertaken to determine the possibilities for a joint conference with one or several other national fraternities or for the trading of staff between several national fraternities in order to enrich idea sources for our own Fraternity.

No recommendations for a site for the 1973 Educational Conference are made. However, several members of the Committee saw no disadvantage in holding the Conference again at Purdue (if the Chapter there were willing to host it) because of the convenient location for so many of our Chapters.

1972 NATIONAL CONVENTION

REPORT OF ALUMNI RELATIONS COMMITTEE

The following is the Alumni report submitted and passed at the 1972 Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity National Convention held in Ann Arbor, Michigan August 23-26, 1972:

This report from the Alumni Committee is broken down into three sections:

1. Purpose of Alumni
2. Chapter Obligation
3. The Alumni Organization

Each section will be discussed individually with a summary concluding the report.

PURPOSE OF ALUMNI

The alumni and past members of any organization can organize and benefit; our case being the undergraduate members of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity. Every Chapter in attendance at our Convention possesses some type of alumni structure. Now we are faced with the question of what is alumni responsibility? Immediately most individuals think in financial terms, which is logical. As alumni become financially stable they often contribute to the fraternal chapter of their affiliation. The funds are generally utilized to purchase undergraduate housing, formulate scholarships, or for the general expenses of the chapter. The monetary aspect is important but should not overshadow the other potential alumni contributions.

Advice from our alumni during times of a poor rush or hard times can often bring solutions to light. Some chapters reported assembling three to five former HSPs or HJPs together to meet with the undergraduate officer holding said position. Former policies, successes, and failures can be discussed, and probable solutions recommended.

Some chapters seem cold to the idea of direct alumni involvement. They feel alumni suggestions are a mandate rather than Brotherly advice.

Within the Alumni Association proper we find an organization of professionals - educators, doctors, administrators and others formulate the alumni ranks. Often they seek out each other in their professional capacities. Any gathering of alumni provides valuable insights into employment potential as well as renewing old friendships.

CHAPTER RESPONSIBILITY

The Undergraduate Chapter's attitude towards the alumni organization often spells the tale of the relationship. Several instances were presented where alumni have entered the chapter house and no effort was made by any undergraduate member to introduce himself or produce an ounce of Brotherhood. Several alumni also stated after such an experience they would not go near the chapter house for several years. These examples show the need for the undergraduate chapter to educate its members to treat the alumni as Sigs and human beings, not to ignore them as ancient relics on the shelf. Common courtesy is the key to this situation.

Often the alumni will hear from the undergraduate chapter at Homecoming of '72, and they hear nothing else until Homecoming of '73. It could be likened to the

Chapter President attending one meeting a year. When communication is weak, interest is at a minimum.

Some type of newsletter seems to be the best means of reaching the alumni. Monthly or bi-monthly publications with social calendars and chapter news could stimulate a check to be dropped in the mail, or an offer of help (if needed).

A number of activities should be undertaken as joint alumni-undergraduate productions. Delegates could be present from both groups at their respective meetings and carry the news back to their chapters. Another possible idea would be for the alumni and undergraduates to exchange phone lists.

The Alumni Organization

For those Chapters with a non-existent or weak alumni organization, the undergraduate chapter should take the initiative to begin or restructure the organization. Often an up-dated list of former alumni can be obtained from the University Alumni Office on your respective campuses. If this service is unavailable, your Chapter can contact the alumni whom they do know of and hope they can feedback other addresses to the chapter. Rosters of alumni with known and bad addresses are available from the Fraternity Office.

The undergraduates can organize meetings for stimulation purposes once the alumni witness a true interest within the undergraduate group. This could provide the spark needed to kindle the alumni.

SUMMARY

In summary, we find Alumni Relations are a resource often as untapped as the mineral fields of Alaska. The potential to formulate a lasting alumni-undergraduate bond, which will be carried on for years, is not a fallacy but a reality for those who can (will) put forth the effort. The strength of Alpha Sigma Phi must be derived from the alumni and undergraduate chapters. Explore your chapter's position and act accordingly.
