History of North Carolina State College

The North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering was created by an act of the General Assembly on March 3, 1887. The college was then known as the "North Carolina College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts."

The cornerstone of its first building, Holladay Hall, was laid on August 22, 1888. Within the last ten years many new buildings have been erected. By means of appropriations by the General Assemblies in 1921, 1923, 1925, and 1927 a new engineering building, gynasium, library, power plant, animal industry building, and dormitories have been built. Several of the older buildings have been remodeled, one of them having been converted for the use of the Ceramic Engineering department.

The college is located within the limits of the city of Raleigh, a mile and a quarter west of the State Capitol. Of the four hundred and eighty-six acres of land owned by the college, thirty acres are in the campus, thirty-six acres in orchards and gardens, fifteen in the poultry yards, and the remainder in the experiment farm. This land was donated to the college by R. S. Pullen, after whom one of the main buildings is named.

The college opened October 3, 1889 with seventy two students and a faculty of eight. Its first president was A. Q. Holladay, 1889-1899; followed by G. T. Winston, 1899-1908; D. H. Hill, 1908 -1916; W. G. Riddick, 1916-1923; E. C. Brooks, 1923--.

The institution now has an enrollment of about 2,000 students, and a faculty of 150.

COLLEGIAL RELATIONS

Athletics:

State College is rapidly coming to the front in athletics. In the last three years the college has taken its place among the leaders of the South. Well supported by the students, the athletic teams have captured many honors in football, basketball, and baseball. The students and alumni of State College are proud of the records that their teams have made.

In football, during the past few years, State has been well represented, especially in 1928 when our team tied for the Southern Conference Championship. This year the Freshman football team won the State Championship, which assures us of bright prospects in the future.

Basketball is a very outstanding sport here. Last year our team won the Southern Conference Championship, and had three men on the All Southern Team. Godwin, our star center lead the country in scoring. State also won the Championship in 1925.

We have turned out very good baseball teams during the past few years. The records have always been impressive, but they have only won the Championship once--that was in 1929.

Track, although not so spectacular, has received a great deal of support. No championships have been won, but State has managed to keep space with with the other teams in the South.

Freshman athletics is becoming a popular phase of the greater college athletics. From the freshmen are picked the members of the varsity, who after a years experience are able to carry on. In '29 the freshmen won the State Championship in basketball and football.

State college also maintains teams in wrestling, marksmanship, tennis, golf, and cross-country. The rifle team is again headed toward a National Championship, having won all of the twenty matches shot this season.

Forensics:

Public speaking engages no small part of the interest and activity of the students of North Carolina State College. Inter-collegiate competition in forensics is now prominent in the life of the college. Debates are held annually with colleges, universities, and professional schools in North Carolina and neighboring states, and with prominent universities of the North. For three of the past five years, speeches delivered by State College debaters have been produced verbatim in the University Debater's Annual, a publication which contains fewer than ten of the best contests among American college student, representing the South. A State College student again represented the South in 1929. Thus by sending three speakers to the Nation Contests State College has established a record which is likely to stand for many years in American inter-collegiate oratory. No other institution has so good a record.
