Movember 21, 1919.

To the Chapters of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

Gentlemen and Brethren:-

Herewith I transmit with comments of the Grand Prudential Committee ammended thereto the results of our negotations with Washington House of the University of Chicago. From my careful investigation of facts, conditions and surrounding circumstances, I have to say investigation or my part has disclosed:

(a) That the University of Chicago is of proper collegiate grade.

(b) That the University of Chicago is the proper environment in which a chapter of this Fraternity can succeed.

(c) That the personnel of these petitioners is all that we can reasonably demand.

Their reputation over a series of years for scholarship, clean living in and out of college and success when they have become alumni following their successful carriers as students and the fact that the petitioning bunch are of the type that we demand causes me to enthusiastically commend them to you. I regard them as a strong body of men and worthy of membership in our Fraternity.

There are additional reasons why we should go into the University of Chicago at this time. They are purely and entirely on the side of the Fraternity and are independent of the petition itself. These are that Chicago being the cross roads of the continent, its geographical location is ideal and it will give the Chicago Alumni Council something to father in that great city. I believe it will be a very great advantage to our Fraternity to have this Council aid these boys in this chapter and in addition to that I believe it will be a most excellent neighbor for both Eta and Kappe Chapters.

The University of Chicago was Sounded in 1880, and spends its deers to students October 1, 1892. The corollment the first year was 762 students. The orrelaments for the fifth, tenth, fifteenth, twentleth, and twenty-fifth years were respectively 1800, 4400, 5070, 5000, and 10,446 students.

The University company, consisting of minety-two sorse, is appendictly located about air miles south of the central part of Chicago along the Midway (a boulevard a block wide and a mile long) and between Jackson and Washington Parks. The total cont of the company is \$4.862,000. There have been erected (including the Yerker Observatory at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin) forty-two buildings at a cost of over \$6.000,000. The value of the books in the University Libraries and of ccientific equipment and supplies is to exceen of \$2.000,000. The invested amount indiget is never by the new ever \$27,000,000, and the annual budget is never \$2,000,000.



Washington House, at the present time the only local fraternity at the University of Chicago, was founded on February II, 1850, at the Instigation of the late President Harper. Throughout its existence its history has been eventful and for matrice.

As evidence of the strength of the House even in the early years groups departured from Washington Moune to form charters of three national froternities which are prominent on the sample today:- Phi Chamma Deith in 1901; Bigma Alpha Mysilon in 1902; and Phi Kappa Signa in 1904. The reports of the investigating committees, recommendations of members of faculties, other fraternities, etc. together with a finding from the G. J. P., etc., are attached.

These should be studied by every member of your Chapter to the end that he will be prepared to give proper consideration to the petition. Remember copies hereof are in the hands of your fellows in every Chapter and a prompt reply is not only due the petitioners, but also all within our own circle. Your reply should be in the form of a report under the hands and seals of your president and secretary directed to the G. J. Pr and sent-to him. Observe the provisions of the Fraternity Constitution in taking and reporting these votes. A majority vote of the members present decides the way in which your Chapter votes. Petitions can only be considered at regular meeting of your Chapter unless every active member is present at a special meeting called for that purpose.
