NORTHERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY

Morthern Michigan University, founded in 1899, is located in Marquette, Michigan, an industrial city of 25,000 on the scenic shores of Lake Superior.

Northern was established by act of the State Legislature as a two-year state-supported normal school to serve the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. The school opened with 32 students and six faculty members on a campus of twenty acres.

A four year collegiate program was introduced in 1915 and the first Bachelor of Arts degree was awarded two years later. The Bachelor of Science degree was introduced shortly thereafter.

In 1928, Northern became Northern Michigan College of Education, and by 1955 had grown into a multi-purpose institution with emphasis on instruction, research, and public service. In that year the "of Education" designation was dropped. The Northern Michigan College campus then consisted of eight buildings on 70 acres, and the enrollment stood at 600.

A Public Services Division was established in 1956 for the purpose of applying knowledge to the needs and problems of people and communities of the Upper Peninsula and the state. This has resulted in an Area Training Center for the retraining of the unemployed and under-employed, and programs for the training of VISTA and Head-Start volunteers.

In 1960, a graduate program leading to the Master of Arts degree was introduced, and in 1963, Northern attained University status with a separate Board of Control under the provisions of the new Michigan Constitution.

The first Job Corps Training Center for Women operated solely by a university on a university campus was established at Northern in June, 1966.

PALSENT CONDITION

Northern Michigan University is an accredited member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, and programs for the preparation of elementary, secondary and service school personnel are accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. The University is noted for its School of Education which has traditionally turned out top-flight instructors for the elementary and secondary levels. A rapidly growing business school has also come into acclaim, with the potential to become one of the better in the nation.

Northern Michigan is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and offers an ever-expanding program of intercollegiate sports on the varsity level. Northern plays full schedules in football, basketball, wrestling, swimming, skiing, gymnastics, track, tennis and golf.

MATERIAL WORTH

Today Northern Michigan encompasses nearly forty buildings on a campus of 207 acres. In addition it owns 120 acres in the nearby Longyear Forest. The value of the physical plant is placed at more than \$32 million.

The University is nominally divided into the central and west campuses. Among the major buildings located on the former are Kaye Hall, the University administration building; Longyear and White Halls, containing classrooms and office space; J.D. Pierce Laboratory School; Lee Hall, housing the instructional Communications Center, WNMR-FM, WNWR-TV, and the offices of the Peninsula-wide microwave cable television system; The Thomas Fine Arts Building and Little Theater; and Olson Library, housing the University library, an extensive education library, and the first law library in the Upper Peninsula.

Also on the central campus are Spooner, West, and Gries Residence Halls for approximately 1,300 students, and Carey Hall, which houses the Job Corps Center for Women: The Don H. Bottum University Center provides dining facilities, lounges, game rooms, bowling lanes, banquet and general purpose rooms, offices, and the "Wildcat Den" snack bar.

Located on the west campus are the Hedgecock Physical Education Building and Fieldhouse, seating capacity of 5,000, which is equipped with a portable basketball court, gymnasiums, natatoriums, indoor track, offices and classroom facilities. In addition, Gant, Spalding, Halverson, Payne, Meyland, Magers, Van Antwerp and Hunt Residence Halls, accommodating approximately 4,000 students, have been constructed on the west campus since 1964.

Under the long range expansion program revealed in 1966, which calls for a vastly increased student enrollment within ten years, construction of several major buildings is planned or now

under way. Construction of the Learning kesources Center, which will house the university library of 300,000 volumes and provide 2500 reader stations, has begun, with completion scheduled for 1969. A classroom facilities building is also presently being constructed. Also under consideration for the future are a Teaching Education and Learning Laboratory Center; a School of Business Administration; a new Vocational and Applied Sciences Building; and an Outdoor Physical Education area.

CURRICULA

Northern Michigan University offers programs in five divisions, the Schools of Business, Education, Arts and Sciences, Nursing and Graduate Studies.

Courses are offered under twenty-two departmental headings.

In addition, a School of Mursing was added to the curriculum in the fall semester of 1960-69, with a four year program leading to a Baccalaureate. The remainder of the undergraduate programs lead to the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degrees. Graduate programs lead to the Master of Arts degree, but groundwork has been laid to establish advanced study leading to a doctorate.





The 1965 enrollment stands at 7,170 and includes students from 24 states, 15 foreign countries and 60 of the 63 counties of michigan. Marquette and Wayne (Detroit) counties have the highest number of students enrolled, with 1,000 and 886 respectively.

The fourteen fraternities have combined membership of 475 or approximately 10 per cent of the male enrollment. The seven sororities have combined membership of 253 or approximately 10 per cent of the female enrollment.

THE FRATLRNITY SYSTEM

The Northern Michigan University Administration has icreasingly recognized the importance of an emergent fraternity system. The appointment of the Men's Counselor to the position of Special Advisor to the IFC served to underscore this recognition. This has resulted in greater dialogue between Greeks and the Administration on vital subjects such as housing. Furthermore, the Administration authorized, in 1967, the creation of a special Judicial Board under the auspices of the Interfraternity Council to handle disciplinary cases affecting member fraternities. This and other such actions have strengthened the Greek system at Northern tremendously and this can be seen in the rate of growth.

Fraternities have existed at Northern Michigan University for over forty years, yet it has been only during the last six years that the Greeks have awakened to the potential of this campus. Since 1961, when the first national fraternity was installed, twelve other fraternities have appeared, including seven additional nationals. With an anticipated enrollment of more than 20,000 within the next decade, the future of the Greek System looks very favorable at NMU.

Under 1967 IFC Rushing Regulations, open rush will be held between specific dates, once in the fall semester (October) and once in the spring semester (March). Pledges may be pinned anytime during these periods.

In general, the high rate of growth within the fraternity system, exemplified by the increasing number of new fraternities on campus, would seem to indicate an even stronger Greek System in the years to come.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT SYSTEM

Student government consists of the Student Senate, members of which are elected directly, and represent constituencies in each of the eleven residence halls, the City of Marquette and the Job Corps Center. In addition, commuting students from certain communities in the surrounding area near Marquette are represented.

A Student Supreme Court, with limited jurisdiction, has been set up to hear student grievances and to review certain cases of student conduct.

Northern students also have non-voting representation on the Faculty Senate and University Center Board. The latter organization, comprised of elected student representatives, largely determines the activities and events within the Center.

The Interfraternity Council and the Panhellenic Council are the governing bodies of the Greek System.

STUDENT PUBLICATIONS

The Northern News, published weekly, is the award winning official student newspaper. The Peninsulan, the university annual, provides a pictorial record of campus life. Driftwood, published each semester, is an anthology of the literary and artistic creativity of Nau students.





ALPHA SIGNA

ALPHA SIGNA was founded at Northern Michigan University on Tuesday, May 21, 1968. At the time of this writing, Alpha Signa is the youngest of the fifteen fraternities on the Northern campus.

In the fall of 1967, members of the Delta Omega Nu Fraternity at Northern began writing to various national fraternities to see what national affiliation would offer the local chapter. Letters were written to fifteen of the largest and best-known of the national groups. After much debate, those who favored national affiliation decided that Alpha Sigma Phi was the best of the national fraternities, and work was begun to pave the way for petitioning for a charter from Alpha Sigma Phi.

When the idea of national affiliation for Delta Omega Nu was first conceived, the chapter was very weak, and to most it seemed like an impossible dream. But there was much energy within the group to be tapped, and within the short span of two semesters the strength of the fraternity grew immeasurably. Local chapters on Northern's campus were traditionally small and weak, and the chapters of national organizations were traditionally strong and powerful, and so those who favored national affiliation felt that Delta Omega Nu should affiliate while she had the chance. However, loyalty to the old name proved to be quite strong, and when the vote was taken, Delta Omega Nu decided not to petition Alpha Sigma Phi by a majority of one.

Rivalry between the "local" and "national" factions within Delta Omega Nu had been intense for the past semester, and on the night of the crucial vote, emotions ran high. That night after the meeting, three men of the "national" group, Robert Roehrig, John Showerman and Mark Worth, laid out plans for a new fraternity, one in which all members would share roughly the same views on national affiliation. Members who were dissatisfied with Delta Omega Nu met with a number of independents and on May 21 voted to take the name Alpha Sigma. Alpha Sigma received recognition from Northern's Interfraternity Council during the Spring Semester Final Exams Week, on May 29, 1968.




