Enclosed you will find the chartering petition for the University of South Carolina-Coastal Carolina College Colony. While this is a super colony and near ready for chartering, I must point out that there are several issues that need to be highlighted:

A. The petition lists only 44 members as opposed to the current average of the other two fraternity chapters of 53-54. The colony's class distribution for this is relatively good at 7-seniors, 12-juniors, 14-sophomores and 11 freshmen.

Sigma Phi Epsilon currently has some 44 members (including approximately 13 pledges). The Sigma Phi Epsilon national policy is that their chapters will be the "largest" in numbers on each campus and they are penalized for failure to accomplish that goal. Therefore, I believe they will almost work to pledge sufficient numbers of men to immediately top the Sigma Nu's, the other chartered fraternity on the campus, and thus bring the average size to more than 61!

Sigma Nu is a relatively recent acquisition by that national of a former "local" fraternity. The Sigma Nu group stands at approximately 61, including some 25 pledges.

B. Are we committed to ensuring our chapters are fully "competitive" size-wise when we charter them? Our present policy which was unanimously adopted at our February 2, 1992 Grand Council session in Columbus reads: "Any group applying to Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity for a charter must have a minimum of 50 undergraduate male members and be enrolled at the school requesting the charter. An exception to the above rule may be obtained upon petition to the Grand Council if either of the following criteria is met: 1. The Chief Student Affairs Office of the College supports the request for a lower chartering size, or 2. The average size on the campus is below 50; based on available data. If an exception is granted to the petitioning group, in no case would the required chartering number fall below 30 or the all campus average fraternity chapter size, whichever is higher, with the numbers to be verified by the Chief Student Affairs Officer."

I could not find any place where the Colony petitioned to be chartered below the 50 man rule, though the Chief Student Affairs Officer clearly would support such a request.

C. Administratively, I feel the petition fails to specifically address the following sections of our By-Laws, Article XI:

Section 4:

Paragraph B. There are no general comments or information on the other fraternities at the college other than as it relates to housing.

Paragraph C. There is no statement of the group's finances, though an overview of the administrative portions of the treasury were included.

Paragraph D. The requirements to list full name, home and college addresses, date of birth, etc. are not fully included.

Paragraph F. A group photograph was not included, though one is readily available of most of the petitioners.

Paragraph H. The petition signed by each individual was not included.

Section 5:

Charter fee was not included.

I wholeheartedly concur with approving the Coastal Carolina Colony's petition for a charter. It is just my opinion that we have relaxed our standards in the past two or three petitions in the interest of expediency and I now want to get back to following our procedures. I do not think that penalizing this colony would be in our best interest. They desire to charter in early February 1993.



HISTORY OF THE COASTAL CAROLINA COLONY

The inception of Alpha Sigma Phi at the University of South Carolina - Coastal Carolina College began in early March of 1991. Nine men came together to express a sound common interest. They were dissatisfied with the two existing fraternities (Sigma Phi Epsilon & Kappa Tau Omega local), and felt the need for a quality society. The group looked at several national fraternities but found some major draw backs to each one.

Adrian Smith (Upsilon'89), a transfer student from Penn State University caught word of the group's intentions and offered his assistance in starting a chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi. A few men in the group knew other Alpha Sigs at different schools and contacted them to find out more information. Intrigued by what he had learned, Jeffrey DeLong contacted Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity Headquarters to inquire about the process of chartering. John R. Chaney, Executive Vice President of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity Inc. sent the necessary information needed to begin the process of chartering.

The group then petitioned to become the Phi Lambda Interest Group. Although not yet recognized by the University, word grew of the new group and it's intentions to charter with Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity. Many people became interested wanting to join the cause. But the founders kept to their original ideals in striving for Brotherhood and quality not quantity. They kept the Brotherhood small at that point to see if it would hold together. Dr. Eric Koepfler (Toledo'78) advised the men that "The whole exceeds the sum of the parts." This phrase was something that each Brother held and strove for, which even continues to this day.

In August 1991, three of the founders were given the opportunity to attend the 1991 National Leadership Conference, at Penn State University. The three men returned to Coastal with a new sense and a better understanding of Alpha Sigma Phi. In the beginning of the Fall 1991 semester Phi Lambda was visited by one of the Chapter Leadership Consultants, who helped set the nine men on the right track.

Early in the Fall 1991 semester, the Phi Lambda Interest Group's constitution was set before the University for approval. Alpha Sigma Phi became an official part of the Coastal Community on October 4, 1991. The Inter-Greek Council unanimously accepted the new group, which became a very active and motivating member. The original nine men were successful in rushing twelve new men, which boosted the total membership to twenty one men. John R. Chaney visited to interest group

in early November to pledge them to the Seven Points. Another pledge class of four new men was initiated on December 6, 1991. The Brothers of Phi Lambda also preformed the Black Lantern Processional to induct these new men into the growing Brotherhood. With the increasing membership, the organization of the group developed even more. Brotherhood retreats, and organizational workshops were held to strengthen and better Phi Lambda internally.

Due to the hard work and effort on all twenty five men's part, the Phi Lambda Interest Group became the Coastal Carolina Colony of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity on March 21, 1992. This event served as a tremendous morale booster, the sense of Brotherhood seemed to increased ten fold on that night alone. The Spring 1992 semester saw the emergence of very active Brotherhood enrichment, service and pledge education programs. Nine new pledges were taken into the Brotherhood.

In August 1992, four Brothers were able to attend the 1992 National Leadership Conference & Convention at the University of North Carolina - Charlotte. At this Convention, the Coastal Carolina Colony received the Hospitality Award and the Recognition Award for participation in the Roadmap to Success Program. When the men returned to the Colony, they started to implement the things learned at convention. This helped every member to achieve a better understanding of Fraternity operations.

The Fall 1992 semester was met with special enthusiasm. The Brotherhood set two major goals for the 1992-93 school year. The first and foremost goal is to become a chapter in good standing with Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity, and the second foremost goal is to develop a strong alumni corporation/association to ultimately purchase a Fraternity House. Coastal Carolina Colony also had a fantastic Fall rush, ending up with fifteen quality pledges.

Currently our Brotherhood has been participating in many different programs and events throughout the Coastal Community. We feel that we are truly ready to carry on the traditions and heritage of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity and make Alpha Sigma Phi at the University of South Carolina - Coastal Carolina College a shining example of the ideals set forth by our Founders 147 years ago.

HISTORY

In July of 1954, a group of Horry County citizens met in Conway for the purpose of determining a means of providing additional educational opportunity for the people of the county. These men of vision, cognizant of the mounting expenses incurred in obtaining a college education, and aware of the relatively small percentage of Horry County high school graduates pursuing higher education, determined among themselves to do what they could to rectify the situation.

The first organized meeting of these citizens was called on July 23, 1954, at the Horry County Memorial Library in Conway. These assembled delegates declared themselves to constitute an association for which the purpose of operation would be the advancement of higher learning within Horry County.

At a meeting on August 6, 1954, the decision was made to form an eleemosynary corporation, and the designation "The Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc." was adopted. At this meeting a Constitution was formulated and adopted.

A committee representing the Foundation was authorized to enter into negotiations with the College of Charleston, Charleston, South Carolina, with the proposal that a two year junior college in Horry County be maintained under the auspices of the Charleston institution. Under the enthusiastic sponsorship of Dr. George D. Grice, President, an off-campus branch of the College of Charleston, known as "Coastal Carolina Junior College" was established. The Coastal Carolina Junior College opened its doors at Conway High School on September 20, 1954, with an enrollment of fifty-three students.

History (cont'd)

From September, 1954, through June of 1958, the Coastal Carolina Junior College served as an off-campus branch of the College of Charleston. During this four year period the school slowly increased its enrollment and added significantly to its course offerings. The services of Dr. E.J. Woodhouse were secured as the first Director of the College.

On November 4, 1958, a referendum was held on the question of raising county taxes by three mills to provide funds to support the school and the vote was carried in the affirmative by a margin of four to one. Because of the Constitutional prohibition against levying a public tax for a private purpose, the Horry County Higher Education Commission was created by legislative act on April 9, 1959, with the members of the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., coming the first members of the Commission. The newly created Commission in turn was given the responsibility of administering the funds derived from the tax levy.

The first day of August, 1959, was an historic one for the college. On that day, Joseph W. Holliday, Chairman of the Horry County Higher Education Commission, and William H. Patterson, Dean of Administration of the University of South Carolina, affixed their signatures to an agreement that joined the two parties in the operation of the Coastal Carolina Junior College. The College thus became a branch of the University of South Carolina. This contract was to go into effect with the fall semester of the academic year of 1960-61.

In 1961, a one hundred and eighty-five acre site was secured on U.S.

ighway 501 between Myrtle Beach and Conway. The major portion of this land was donated jointly by the Burroughs Timber Company and the International Paper Company. An additional sixteen acres of land bordering South Carolina Highway 544 was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Claude E. Dusenbury.

Formal ground breaking ceremonies were held on October 12, 1962. Coastal Carolina Center of the University of South Carolina opened the doors of its first building in September of 1963 and welcomed 110 full-time, regular students to its campus. Edward M. Singleton, Superintendent of the Conway City Schools, had been appointed the new Director of the College in July.

The college assumed the responsibility of providing higher education for the military personnel of Myrtle Beach Air Force Base in August of 1968. A contract was signed with the Federal Government for this purpose and 60 students agistered for the first term of study.

By special legislation, Coastal Carolina added a junior year to its educational program with the Fall 1973 semester. Subsequently, beginning with the Fall 1974 semester, Coastal Carolina became a four-year campus of the University of South Carolina with authority to award baccalaureate degrees in several areas.

Since 1963, USC Coastal Carolina College has grown from a one building college with 110 students to a twenty-three building campus, including residence halls, with an undergraduate enrollment of 4,000 students. The emerging status of Coastal as one of the major 4-year colleges in the state was evident when the Commission on Higher Education approved changes in Coastal's mission to allow the construction of residence halls on campus. Ground-breaking ceremo-

History (cont'd)

nies were held for the first dormitories on October 30, 1986 and on-campus housing became a reality in September 1987.

On October 10, 1990, site preparation began for the E. Craig Wall Business Administration Building. It is anticipated that this 100,000 square foot building will be completed and in use for the Spring 1993 semester.

USC Coastal Carolina is one of the fastest growing 4-year public institutions in the state. In Coastal's 2001 plan, full-time enrollment for the year 2001 is projected to exceed 5,000 with a full-time faculty of more than 200. Located in the fastest growing county in the state, and with the current enrollment around 4,000, these figures could prove to be conservative.

In 2001 and beyond, changing society and advancing technology will require adjustments in the manner in which the institution's mission will be accomplished, but Coastal will continue to be faithful to its primary mission of service to the citizens of the Waccamaw region. The college will remain dedicated to the economic, cultural, and social needs of local and state residents and to the assurance of the highest quality post-secondary education possible for our students.

CONSTITUTION OF THE COASTAL CAROLINA COLONY

OF

ALPHA SIGMA PHI FRATERNITY

ARTICLE 1 - NAME

The name of this organization shall be the Coastal Carolina Colony of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

ARTICLE 2 - PURPOSE

Section 1

The aims and purposes of this colony of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity shall be to develop a spirit of brotherhood; to inspire loyalty to the ideals and traditions of Alpha Sigma Phi and the college in which this colony is located; and to encourage scholastic, athletic, social, and special activities.

Section 2

The Coastal Carolina Colony of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity (hereinafter called CCC) will be subject to the Constitution and By-Laws of the Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity, Inc., (hereinafter called National), and to the rules and regulations contained in the Constitution of the Inter-Greek Council of Coastal Carolina College.

ARTICLE 3 - MEMBERSHIP

Section_1

Any male student of Coastal Carolina College is eligible to pledge membership in CCC, subject to the following qualifications:

- (A) The student must comply with the academic average set by C C C
- (B) Pledging must take place in accordance with the CCC, National, and College regulations.
- (C) Pledges must be qualified for membership under Article II of the National Constitution.

(D) A pledge, to become a brother, must have no more than three unexcepted votes by the brotherhood of CCC.

Section 2

Honorary and social membership in Alpha Sigma Phi is prohibited.

Section 3

Faculty membership may be conferred upon a candidate as outlined in Title II, Section 4 of the National Constitution.

ARTICLE 4 - PLEDGING

Section 1

A pledge must first be eligible as per Article 3, Sections and 2.

- (A) The pledge must first receive a bid from the brotherhood of C C
- (B) Pledging will be subject to the rules and regulations of National and the Inter-Greek Council.
- (C) The Pledge Educator must submit a complete itinerary for the pledging program, and upon approval by the Prudential Committee, implement that program.
- (D) Three different times during the pledge period, the brotherhood of CCC will, by secret ballot, vote on a pledge for the brotherhood of CCC.
- (E) The pledge class will be under the supervision of the Pledge Educator and his committee.
- (F) The length of the pledge period will be determined by the President and the Pledge Educator with approval of the Prudential Committee.
- (G) All voting concerning pledges will be secret.
- (H) Each pledge must pass through three blackball voting periods. Removal of a pledge occurs if such a person incurs three blackballs based on the following criteria:

First vote

Second vote 3

Third vote 3

Such voting will take place no later than 1 week before pinnacle week and their dates will otherwise be up to the discretion of the President upon consultation with the Pledge Educator.

- (I) There will be no proxy or absentee blackball voting of any nature.
- (J) Any active brother may request a meeting concerning any number of pledges at any time with the approval of the President and Pledge Educator provided the Big Brother is present at such a meeting.

- (K) Any decision to call a special blackball vote will be up to the President. Any appeal of the President's decision must be brought before the full Prudential Committee.
- (L) No blackball shall be removed without previous discussion and definite reasons. This is a matter of Fraternal Honor. Upon the inception of a blackball a discussion and re-vote will be allowed only by motion from the Big Brother and a second from the floor. Robert's Rules to Order will then be followed for discussion.

POSITION REGARDING INDUCTION PRACTICES

CCC will not condone nor accept any active member who engages in behavior in which he knowingly or recklessly organizes, promotes, facilitates or engages in any conduct, other than competitive athletic events, which places or may place another person in danger of bodily injury.

ARTICLE 5 - VOTING

Section 1

All voting shall be in accordance with Robert's Rules to Order.

Section 2

All active brothers of CCC who are in good standing shall be eligible to vote.

Section 3

The election of the President, Vice President and Treasurer shall be done by closed ballot. All other offices shall be conducted by a show of hands unless otherwise requested.

Section 4

The blackball system shall be used in casting votes in the following matters:

- (A) The voting of pledges into the brotherhood of CCC.
- (B) All other matters deemed necessary by the Prudential Committee.

ARTICLE 6 - OFFICERS

Section 1

The elected officers of CCC shall be:

- (A) President
- (B) Vice President
- (C) Treasurer
- (D) Recording Secretary
- (E) Corresponding Secretary
- (F) Scholarship Chairman

- (G) Editor
- (H) Alumni Director
- (I) Marshal
- (J) Sergeant at Arms
- (K) Pledge Educator
- (L) 2 Prudential Committee Members at Large

The positions listed below and any other positions deemed necessary by the Prudential Committee shall be appointed be the President and approved by the brotherhood of CCC at the first colony meeting after the installation of the newly elected Executive officers.

- (A) Inter-Greek Council Representative
- (B) Student Government Representative
- (C) All Committee Chairmen
- (D) All other positions deemed necessary by the Prudential Committee

Section 3

All officers shall pledge to fulfill the duties of their respective offices as outlined in the Alpha Sigma Phi Chapter Officers Guide.

ARTICLE 7 - MEETINGS

Section 1

Meetings will be held on a regularly scheduled basis or as deemed necessary by the President.

Section 2

All meetings will follow parliamentary procedure as outlined in Robert's Rules to Order.

Section 3

Quorum shall consist of 50% plus 1 of the Prudential Committee and all members present.

Section 4

An unexcused absence is defined as any absence without reasonable circumstances or prior advisement to any member of the Prudential Committee.

Section 5

Discipline for meeting attendance shall be proscribed under Article 10 - Discipline.

ARTICLE 8 - COMMITTEES

Section 1

The standing committees of the Fraternity are as follows:

- (A) Prudential Committee as outlined by National
- (B) Social Committee as selected

- (C) Service Committee as selected
- (D) Scholarship Committee as selected
- (E) Rush Committee as selected
- (F) Pledge Committee as selected
- (G) Brotherhood Enrichment as selected
- (H) Intramural Committee as selected
- (I) Alumni Relations Committee as selected
- (J) Public Relations Committee as selected
- (K) Ritualism Committee as selected

Special assessments may be levied by a 2/3 vote of the Prudential Committee.

Section 3

Any special committees will be appointed by the President and shall operate as long as deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 9 - DUES

Section 1

The sum to be assessed as CCC dues shall be determined by the Prudential Committee and shall be reviewed annually and approved by the last meeting of the Spring semester.

Section 2

Special assessments may be levied by a 2/3 vote of the Prudential Committee.

Section 3

Brotherhood begins with the payment of dues. Any brother of CCC who is unable to meet his financial obligations by the date set by the Prudential Committee shall appear before them to explain the circumstances and make arrangements for payment.

Section 4

Brothers with outstanding debt shall be put on suspended status if by majority vote of the Prudential Committee it is felt that they are not attempting to meet their financial obligations in "good faith".

Section 5

Through privilege granted by the Prudential Committee any brother may reactivate his membership if his dues are paid in full to date or arrangements are made with the Treasurer and approval of the Prudential Committee.

ARTICLE 10 - DISCIPLINE

Section 1

All discipline shall be imposed by the Prudential Committee.

Quorum for a disciplinary hearing shall be 50% plus 1 of the Prudential Committee.

Section 3

Any brother shall have the right to request a disciplinary hearing if there is reasonable cause for such a hearing through the information presented or any heresay he may have knowledge of.

Section 4

The President or his proxy shall have the right to impose any "necessary but reasonable" sanctions upon accused members if the alleged offense deems it necessary. This is to be carried out under the most serious circumstances and only until a hearing can be convened.

Section 5

(A) Unexcused absence or failure to attend regularly scheduled colony meetings shall result in the following disciplinary procedures:

First Unexcused Absence - Warning Second Unexcused Absence - Suspension Third Unexcused Absence - Depledge

(B) Unexcused absence of failure to attend any mandatory event, provided there is two weeks notice prior to said event, shall result in the following disciplinary procedures:

First Unexcused Absence - Warning Second Unexcused Absence - Suspension Third Unexcused Absence - Depledge

Section 6

The Prudential Committee shall discipline with "necessary but reasonable" sanctions, any member found to be in violation of the CCC Conduct Policy.

Section 7

A brother mat appeal any of the above disciplinary sanctions to the full brotherhood at the first membership meeting after institution of the penalty.

Section 8

Any brother is entitled to representation before and throughout the entire disciplinary process provided that he is a member of Alpha Sigma Phi.

Section 9

Reinstatement will occur after restitution has been performed as mandated by the Prudential Committee.

ARTICLE 11 - IMPEACHMENT

Section 1

Any officer who in any way detracts from the reputation of CCC is subject to impeachment.

Section 2

A vote of 2/3 at any two consecutive colony meetings shall allow for the impeachment of any officer. After the first vote an Impeachment Committee will be formed to conduct a hearing and present the findings of the hearing to the colony prior to the second vote. Upon presentation of the information and any necessary discussion a closed ballot vote shall ensue and the results announced.

ARTICLE 12 - ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

Section 1

All members are required to maintain an academic grade point average (GPA) of at least a 2.0 (on a 4.0 scale) for both semester and accumulative GPA's.

Section 2


Any member who's GPA falls below a 2.0 will be put on academic probation for one semester, the maximum probationary period will be two consecutive semesters.

Section 3

Any member who fails to achieve a 2.0 GPA at the end of his probationary period will be suspended until his GPA improves.

ARTICLE 13 - AMENDMENT CLAUSE

The articles of this constitution may be amended, revised, altered in part or in whole by 2/3 vote of the membership of CCC provided such an amendment or amendments have been discussed and tabled until the next colony meeting.



BY-LAWS

OF

COASTAL CAROLINA COLONY

1-1 SOCIAL PROGRAMMING

- (A) All social events will be planned and executed following the guidelines outlined in the F.I.P.G. Policy.
- (B) Social events must be registered with the office of Student Activities four weeks prior to the event.

2-1 RUSH PRACTICES

All rush functions shall be in accordance with the rules and regulations set by the office of Student Activities and or the Inter-Greek Council.

2-2 BID EXTENSION PROCESS

- (A) A rushee must be interviewed by the Prudential Committee before any voting is to take place.
- (B) The results of the interview are then presented to the full brotherhood for voting.
- (C) All bid extension voting is to be conducted by secret ballot.
- (D) A bid may be extended to a rushee if he receives no more than three unexcepted votes.

2-3 LEGACY POLICY

- (A) A Legacy is defined as a person who is related to a member of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.
- (B) All Legacies who qualify for membership, will recieve an automatic bid extension.
- (C) If a Legacy accepts a bid, he will be governed as any pledge would, and will be subject to pledging, and the standard blackball procedure.

3-1 THE GRAND CHAPTER ADVISOR

- (A) The office of Grand Chapter Advisor (GCA) may be conferred upon any alumnus of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.
- (B) The election of the GCA is to be conducted by secret ballot.

- (C) Upon the colonies approval of a candidate, he must be approved by the Grand Province Chief of Province VII. Grand Senior President.
- (D) GCA term of office shall be for two years.
- (E) Impeachment of a GCA shall follow those procedures outlined in Article 11—Impeachment of the CCC Constitution.
- (F) The GCA will pledge to fulfill the duties of his office as outlined in the Grand Chapter Advisor's Handbook.

3-2 THE FACULTY ADVISOR

- (A) The office of Faculty Advisor (FA) may be conferred upon any male faculty member at Coastal Carolina College.
- (B) The election of the FA is to be conducted be secret ballot.
- (C) FA term of office shall be for one year.
- (D) Impeachment of the FA shall follow the procedures outlined in Article 11 Impeachment of the CCC Constitution.
- (E) The FA will pledge to fulfill the duties of his office as outlined by National and the office of Student Activities of Coastal Carolina College.

4-1 COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS

One on campus and one off campus service project shall be conducted per semester as approved by the CCC Faculty Advisor.

5-1 CAMPUS INVOLVEMENT

Each member must be involved in one other campus activity, organization, or event per semester.

6-1 EDUCATIONAL SERVICE REQUIREMENTS

Each member must attend 4 educational programs per year (one from each of the 4 categories; Health Issues, Sexuality, Alcohol and Drugs, and Legal Liability). There will be 4 total offered per semester.

TREASURY

TREASURY

The treasury of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity at Coastal Carolina College is run according to the rules and regulations of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity.

At present we have a checking account with checks that require the signature of both the Treasurer and President. We have filed with the I.R.S. stating that we are a non-profit organization and therefore have received our account number with them.

Financial plans are currently being utilized, and those Brothers who are on the financing plan have the obligation to meet four(4) payments throughout a semester. Brothers financing are required to sign a promissory note, witnessed and signed by both the Treasurer and President. Copies are then made and given to the maker and also kept on record. Late payments, over one(1) week, will be subject to a five(5) dollar penalty for each week it is late.

Personalized bills and receipts have also been made to further ease the position of Treasurer and also to have more records to look upon in case of problems.

Discounts have also been established in order to provide prompt payment and scholastic improvement among the Brothers. Brothers who earn a 3.0 or better grade point average are entitled to a 15 percent break in their dues for the following semester. If Brothers pay their dues prior to the start of the semester, another discount will be applied.

The Treasurer keeps all records on file including: all receipts, bank statements, promissory notes, expenses, and income. In the Treasurers ledger book, is a page for each Brother acknowledging all payments and/or financial status. Also included in the ledger are all budgets of committees and officers, along with their financial status. Kept with these reports are dates paid and check number, if necessary. The Treasurer keeps no more than \$100.00 cash, available at all times in case of emergency or other financial need. Records of deposits and withdrawals are kept in the checking book and also in the ledger, under Income and Expenses.

Recently ordered was a check register book with checks that are personalized with the Phoenix logo. This register book includes 600 checks, 250 envelopes to encompass the checks. Started this semester was a sinking fund for prospects of purchasing a house in the near future. This fund is run at a rate of \$1.00 per man per semester. In the future, we would like to set up a savings account and also a separate account for the possibility of a house or emergencies.

RUSH

RUSH

The Rush program for Alpha Sigma Phi's Coastal Carolina Colony has been very successful. Our smallest pledge class consisted of nine men. Since our existence at Coastal, the rush committee has organized over fifteen rush events that encourage one on one rushing.

Starting in the Fall 1991 semester, we conducted five rush events during the second week of school. Our Inter Greek Council monitors formal rush week with strict guidelines. These events included bowling, putt-putt golf, pizza night, serious night, and billiards night. All of these events went over very well, and we had a really good turnout of rushees. On the nights we went bowling, and putt-putt golfing, we rushed with a sorority to make it more enjoyable for the Brothers, and rushees. After Fall 1991 rush we had fifteen young men wanting to pledge Alpha Sig.

In the Spring 1992 semester, we also had five rush events scheduled for the second week of school. Since it was so cold, we were not able to play putt-putt golf, which alot of the Brothers really enjoyed. This time, our events included bowling, movie night, pizza night, serious night, and billiards night. We used the same rush events as the Fall, because they seemed to really work for us. Bowling, and billiards night allow the Brothers and rushees to mingle and meet one another in a relaxed atmosphere. The serious night is used to inform the rushees about what Brotherhood is, and the costs, and other important issues of pledging. It also serves as a time for rushees to ask questions about the Fraternity. The movie night event will not be used again because it does not give Brothers and rushees a good chance to get to know each other. Although Spring rush was light, we did manage to pledge nine good men.

The same basic format for rush was used in the Fall of 1992, with the addition of one big event. We hosted a Hawaiian Luau with one of the local sororities which proved to be our best event ever. We rented a camp site on the beach, roasted a pig, and served Hawaiian punch. Everyone seem to have a great time. This semester we had a total of twenty two rushees. All of the men we gave bids to accepted them, with the exception one one person who will be pledging next semester.

We have also enacted a new strategy for rush which is being implemented this semester. Realizing that rush is a 365 day a year operation, and the life blood of the Fraternity, we have developed a series of events scheduled throughout the semester at which we will invite more potential members. We have compiled a growing list of men who are already wanting to join next semester. Our goal is to boast our membership numbers to 60 men by the Fall 1993 semester.

In all, we feel that our Rush program here at Coastal is top notch. In the future, we plan to continue our rush practices and eventually reach our goals. The future of Alpha Sigma Phi at U.S.C - Coastal Carolina College looks very promising, and I know that we will reach what ever goals we set.

PLEDGE EDUCATION

Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity Coastal Carolina Colony Pledge Education Report

Realizing that the pledge education program is the foundation of the Coastal Carolina Colony, the committee set goals to make sure that the program would produce men that were prepared to accept the responsibilities of brotherhood. Our goals are to make men by improving the members intellectually, mentally, socially, and physically.

The first step of our pledge education program is to familiarize the new members with Alpha Sigma Phi, the history, traditions, and the purpose. The first few meetings are geared towards teaching history of fraternities and Alpha Sigma Phi. The next few week the new members attend brother meetings in addition to the pledge meetings. This gives them the chance to observe and participate in meetings while learning the procedures. In the final weeks the new members then take positions in the committees, and assist the officers in their duties. This is the final stage of preparing them to take over any position available to them after their final initiation.

Alpha Sigma Phi was founded as an intellectual society. In keeping with these traditions, the Coastal Carolina Colony's pledge education program strongly supports increasing the grades of it's members. The pledge education program is supported by faculty members who lecture to the new members on improving grades, drug and alcohol abuse, and benefit of staying in school. The members are also given a few hours per week in which time they can help each other, as well as receive help from the current members, with courses they are having trouble in.

The new members are also encouraged to become socially active with the college and it's community. With the colony's active service and social program, the new members are introduced to the members of the surrounding community as well as their fellow students. This is especially beneficial for the students new to the college. The activities designed by the pledge committee also involves interaction with other Greek organizations on campus.

An additional option for the new members is to interact physically within the college. The pledge committee encourages the new members to participate in intramural activities as well as other activities involving the current members. The new members are kept aware of these activities and are kept available to participate.

We, the members of the pledge committee, feel that this is a strong program that will produce great men who are ready to take on any challenges that await them. We feel that after completing this program, the new members will be ready to take on any role within the colony, college, and community. This program is designed to develop men, intellectually, physically and socially.

Since the beginning of the Fall 1991 semester, the progress of the Alumni committee of Alpha Sigma Phi, Coastal Carolina Colony, has been quite successful. An introductory letter was sent to 164 alumni within a 50 mile radius of U.S.C. - Coastal. I have received several responses and kept in contact with these alums. Key responses are Dr. Eric T. Koepfler, BP chapter, David Welch, ΔK chapter, David Byrd, ΔK chapter, and Ronnie McBryde, ΔK chapter. This introductory letter explained our present progress and the beliefs by which we founded out group. A few of the alumni attended some of our meetings. While Dr. Koepfler and Mr. McBryde have become integral members of our colony, they have shown us different ways of doing things through their years of experience. Koepfler is now our Faculty Advisor, and Ronnie McBryde is our Grand Chapter Advisor. In the future we hope to build a lasting relationship with all interested alumni. Both Dr. Koepfler and Ronnie McBryde attended our colonization banquet, in which they shared an important moment with each and every member of the colony.

The members of Coastal Carolina Colony are preparing for their time when they can be interacting alumni. They are learning this by communicating with alumni now and also by learning techniques that can be taught when they have graduated. These include rush recommendations, advice, job placement, and financial support. We are also preparing to be supportive alumni by trying to conduct atleast one alumni event a year, involving the skills and experience of alumni within our group and keeping a list of alumni within the area.

We would also like to establish an Alumni Corporation. I think with the help of the members of our colony our advisors, and all interested alumni that can be quite possible. We would also like to establish an Alumni Broad of Directors. In doing this, we intend to follow the Chapter Alumni Corporation Guidelines set forth by Alpha Sigma Phi. The focus Alumni Corporation would be in obtaining and maintaining an establishment in which members of the chapter may reside, hold meetings, and rituals. Other focuses of the group would be on Rush, Alumni Spirit, and a link between headquarters and the chapter. Through the help of these Alumni, we can promote the feeling of Brotherhood spirit, stability, and financial responsibility. Job placement is another area in which an Alumni Corporation can

help, as well as chapter expansion, and a referral service. The corporation would act as references for chapter members after graduation. I think we are off to a good start in our quest for and Alumni Corporation by our undergraduate support and our interested Alumni.

The goals and plans for the future of Alumni support within Coastal Carolina Colony is extensive. We intended to send out a newsletter, including news of the colony as well as news of interested Alums. Invitations to colony functions will be mailed to Alumni. One event, in particular, is a social with Alumni within the area and the undergraduate members. Under this non-formal atmosphere, I believe support by Alumni will increase. There will be a lot of written and oral contact among the Colony and interested Alums.

All in all, the Alumni Relations Committee of our Colony is young but very dynamic. As the Colony grew and as it grows, I believe Alumni Relations will grow in comparison with all other aspects of our group. This will happen with the help of undergraduate members, Alpha Sigma Phi Headquarters, and presently interested Alumni.

Currently at the Coastal Carolina Colony we have only 5 brothers who live in the dorms and 24 brothers who live off campus. This is one of the reasons that we have begun to look into the possibility of fraternity housing. It is strongly believed by all of our members that, a fraternity house would bring the brothers closer together. It would also strengthen the already strong bond of brotherhood all of our members share. Also due to the nonexistence of fraternity housing on campus, an Alpha Sig house would definitely make us tops on campus.

It has been realized that housing is a difficult bridge to cross, and for this reason there is an attempt underway to found an Alumni Corporation. The only thing holding this back is a lack of support from alumni in the area. Since the CCC is still a new group of brothers, we are still in the learning process and are not set in our ways when the concept of fraternity housing is mentioned. We view this as a plus because we are open to ideas other chapters have to offer us and it is easy to try them out.

A bit of good news in our housing situation is the fact that the school has given us a 1-2 acre lot on school grounds. This land is to be given to us upon the completion financial arrangements. The terms of the deal include a \$1 fee for the land for a term of 99 years. We hope to be able to put a house on this land as soon as possible and deemed fit to do so.

Last year, we tied for second place with Sigma Phi Epsilon, and Sigma Nu received the first place prize. We are planning to enter every intramural activity this year, so that we will have a better chance of winning first place. We feel that Intramural participation is a great way to compete with the other Greek organizations on campus. It also adds to and enriches our Brotherhood.
